UNION DIDN'T VOTE TO CENSURE DANZ

Confusion at Close of Meeting of Local 2125 Saturday Morning Allowed Motion to Go by Default — Small Percentage of Membership Present — Danz Defends His Action in Statement.

Despite reports to the contrary Local 2125, United Textile Workers of America, in a special meeting Saturday morning did not vote to demand the resignation of the Connecticut Federation of Labor, in retaliation for his message to workers to repudiate Governor Cross at the polls. A motion to that effect was seconded but a long address that was delivered when "remarks" were called for brought about confusion and the meeting adjourned without a vote having been taken.

Saturday morning's meeting was attended by less than 300 members and was composed largely of members of the Local favoring Democratic candidates. It was admitted by Union leaders here that the greater percentage of the membership had stayed away simply because the meeting would be just another Democratic rally. Deputy Labor Commissioner William J. Fitzgerald was a speaker at the meeting as was James Dick, of Rockville, both Democrats. Republican members of the Union, who are in a great majority, have assured G. O. P. leaders that they had no intention of following the dictates of Union leaders who obviously were seeking Democratic patronage.

The Union meeting was not an open one. Admittance was by membership books however, a number of Republican members who attended were incensed when they learned that the Union as a whole here had been labeled as Democratic when the opposite is the fact. After hearing the talk by Senator Fitzgerald the meeting discussed the Dana statement, in which the president of the Connecticut Federation of Labor, had urged the repudiation of Governor Cross as an enemy of labor, one of the members moved that the resignation of Dana be demanded. It was seconded. Under "remarks" President Short called upon James Dick, of Rockville, a socialist named by Rockville Democrats as a candidate for the Legislature. FOUR MEN KILLED AS TRAINS CRASH

Three Others Are Injured When Locomotives Collide in Clinton, Mass., Today.

Clinton, Mass., Nov. 5.—(AP)—Four men were killed and three others injured today when two locomotives collided on the main line of the Boston and Maine Railroad here today. Officials of the railroad said the injured were expected to recover. The dead were: William S. Moore, engineer of Clinton; Charles S. Winslow, engineer of Rockville, N. H.; Allston G. Colby, brakeman of Alliston; T. Mason, fireman of Rockville, N. H. The injured: Carl Plagg, engineer of West Boylston; William Leighton, fireman of Concord, N. H.; C. M. Smith, fireman of Worcester. The accident occurred as the single locomotive pulled out on the main line on its way to the depot to take on water before picking up a passenger train.

Officials of the railroad said the collision occurred at 10:15 a. m. The locomotives were carrying a 2,048-mile freight car when the collision occurred. Damage was estimated at \$75,000. Railroad officials gave no immediate explanation of the tragedy beyond saying some one had "made a mistake" and an investigation would be made. Bradman Colby was pinned in the wreckage and chatted with Mrs. Mary Bennett who rushed from her nearby home to the scene, before a steam line broke and he was scalded to death. Colby told his legs were held fast in the wreckage. Two priests crawled through the wreckage and gave last rites to the church to the dying.

FIND SMUGGLED CHINESE IN NEW JERSEY CELLAR

Half Starved They Had Been Brought Into This Country Sewed Up in Potato Bags.

Keansburg, N. J., Nov. 5.—(AP)—Seventeen frightened, half-starved Chinese got their first square meal in weeks on Ellis Island today while Federal agents searched for leaders of a smuggling gang that brought them off a ship in potato sacks to a dank cellar prison here where they were offered "for sale" to relatives or friends at \$1,000 a head, cash. A dozen heavily armed narcotic agents raided an apparently deserted house yesterday expecting to confiscate a large quantity of smuggled drugs. Instead they found the human contraband, huddled behind the locked door of a nearby black cellar guarded by a Trinidad negro train drawn by two locomotives. The tip-off on the activities of the smuggling game came several weeks ago from the United States consul at Trinidad. Yesterday's raid was the climax of a concentrated effort by a score of agents in New York, Newark and Philadelphia.

Death and Privation A story of death and privation on the voyage to the dream of freedom in a new land was told in disjointed fragments by the Chinese prisoners and the captured guard. Originally there were thirty-odd in the smuggled shipment of human merchandise. Four of them became ill, however, according to stories told the agents, and it was considered a miracle that the rest survived.

Radicals in France Predict Civil Strife

Paris, Nov. 5.—(AP)—A wave of political death in the election which would follow Doumergue's promised dissolution of the Chamber, newspapers predicted bloody rioting, even civil war should the government be overthrown. CLEVELAND STORES OF A & P TO OPEN

Dispute Settled and 2,000 Employers to Go Back to Work in 300 Stores.

Cleveland, O., Nov. 5.—(AP)—More than 2,000 clerks and managers, bakers and truck drivers returned to their places at counters, ovens, steering wheels and desks today in New York city held by the wild. The Supreme Court, in an earlier case last session, held the approval of parts of the Roosevelt program. Most Important Of Year Campaign in 80 Years Nears End — Expect 30 Million to Vote — Some High Spots of Recent Campaign.

Washington, Nov. 5.—(AP)—The most momentous off-year campaign in eighty years—rushed to a climax today with the signs pointing, by and large to a victory for the Democrats tomorrow. As New Dealers, Antis and Middle of the Ground Men composed their final plans to the 30,000,000 persons, expected to cast ballots, the question in the minds of practically all the experts is not whether the Democratic party in general will emerge triumphant but how emphatic its endorsement will be. Though they will have their victories in individual states and cases, the Republicans even in their recent reverses do not hope to approach control in either House of Congress. They do dispute the smiling prediction of their foes that Democrats will have a two-thirds sweep when the gavel falls next January 3. It is such questions as these that already are engrossing observers: Will a process of disintegration, already detected by some, break the two old parties into a new alignment of "Liberals" and "Conservatives"? If there is a pronounced swing to the "left" will Mr. Roosevelt try to curb the Leftists and will he be successful? Will the Republicans get enough of a foothold to make it a real fight in 1936? The elections involve the administrations of 33 states and the selection of 46 members of the Seventy-fourth Congress. Forty-seven states will elect 432 House members. Thirty-one will send 34 Senators to sit with 61 holdovers and Senator Hale, (R., Me.) who was re-elected September 10. In addition 314 important state office holders will be selected from 150 candidates. These do not include legislators. Twenty-four states will decide some 60 constitutional proposals, including prohibition repeal in Florida, Idaho, Kansas, Nebraska, South Dakota, West Virginia and Wyoming. Among the 135 candidates for the 33 Senate seats are many political figures. Of the 135 gubernatorial candidates, Upton Sinclair, the Democratic nominee in California has been the most spectacular by reason of his sensational "End Poverty" program. The administration turned a cold shoulder to the candidacy which most observers believed weakened the former socialist's chance. His defeat is claimed by his Republican opponent, Governor Frank P. Merriam. The vigorous contest between Governor Herbert H. Lehman in New York and Robert Moses, Republican, gained nation-wide prominence, when President Roosevelt, appealed for the re-election of his friend. 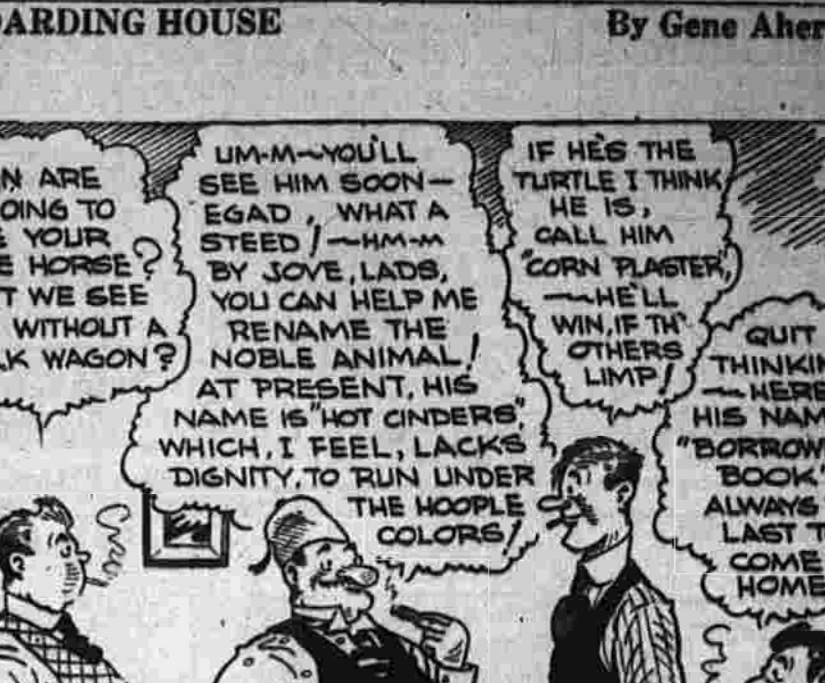
