FIGHT OVER FLAG BROUGHT TO COURT

Teacher and Trustee of Rural School in Bitter Quarrel; Details Made Public.

Syracuse, N. Y., Nov. 15.—(AP)—A summons in the appeal of *Esther De Lee*, 21, teacher at the one-room Pompey Hollow school who was dismissed in an argument over display of the American flag, was handed this morning to James M. Armstrong, rural trustee who dismissed her.

Armstrong immediately started for Syracuse where, he said, he would meet the district superintendent, George T. Fuglie, and "file the complete set of charges against the teacher."

Fuglie, who was in the audience when a hearing was held on the "flag incident" occurred, has taken the side of the trustee.

Soon afterward J. Francis Scarle, attorney for Miss De Lee, made public to some the appeal and forwarded to the State Department of Education.

It recites in detail Miss De Lee's side of the flag incident, saying that Armstrong in her absence hung a large flag "on some nails in the entrance to an alcove in the school room where it interfered with school activities and was in the way and likely to be soiled or scorched." She took the flag down and hung a small one "that was safe and unobjectionable on the nails."

Flag is Removed

"On October 31, Armstrong, in appellant's absence, ordered the small flag removed and another one self removed and put it in the alcove," an affidavit informed.

On November 2, Armstrong brought a new flagpole rope, said he was going to repair as trustee, and asked for the key to the school so he could check up on the supplies, and asked if the appellant was going to put the flag up in the said alcove. But appellant informed him that there was no need, inasmuch as he had a rope and it could be hung on the flagpole. He said appellant could put up the flag or hire it done.

Dismissal School

The appeal also says Armstrong ordered the children to go home on November 5, saying the school was closed, and told the teacher to leave.

She, however, continued to teach until Nov. 14 when Superintendent Fuglie ordered her to cease.

"Appellant has been guilty of neglect of duty, incapacity to teach or immoral conduct, and believe or misconduct on her part that constituted sufficient cause for her dismissal."

ANOTHER FACTORY TO QUIT PATERSON

Dyeing Plant Employing 600 to Go to Rhode Island Because of Strike.

Pateron, N. J., Nov. 15.—(AP)—With the dispute between some 20,000 silk and rayon dyers and their employers still unsettled after a three weeks strike, owners of another large dyeing plant today announced plans to move immediately to Rhode Island because of "labor troubles."

The concern is the Inhoff-Berg Dyeing Company, which normally employs between 600 and 700 workers.

The owners stated they were going to sign a lease this afternoon and expected to be moved out of Pateron in a week.

PECORA SUGGESTS FEDERAL CHARTERS

Noted Lawyer Declares It Is the Best Protection for All Stockholders.

Washington, Nov. 15.—(AP)—Federal charters for business corporations were advocated today by Ferdinand Pecora as a protection to stockholders and the public.

Pecora, whose investigation of Wall street for the Senate won him national fame, said that such a change would be a further fruit of that inquiry.

Such incorporation means that the charters empowering corporations to do business and prescribing what forms that business may take would be granted by the central government, rather than by the states.

DOUMERGUE OFF TO PRIVATE LIFE

Ex-French Premier Slips Quietly Out of Paris to Go Back to Country.

Paris, Nov. 15.—(AP)—Gaston Doumergue, elderly and beloved statesman, slipped quietly out of Paris today into private life as his successor, Premier Pierre Flaudin, sought to carry on the task of making France strong within and without.

Unobserved and unannounced, the 71-year-old former premier and president of four years, left the Capitol to which he was called last February to save the country from threatened revolution.
