KIDNAPING CHARGE MAY NOT BE MADE

Report Has It That State's Attorney Has Not Enough Evidence in the Darien Case.

Bridgport, Nov. 18.—(AP)—State's Attorney William H. Conley in his investigation into the hand to hand battle and capture of three Rhode Island thugs in the home of Gustave U. Westheim in Darien, Friday, has practically eliminated an attempt at kidnaping.

The state's attorney, it is understood from authoritative sources has to this time refused to accept as final, the theory that the three men entered the Westheim home in an attempt to kidnap Westheim's 13-year-old stepson, Robert Lewis.

As Mr. Conley remains silent on the matter, it is understood that while he has not dropped the kidnaping theory as yet, the office is now preparing a case against the three arrested on charges of attempted robbery and breaking and entering in the day season.

Despite the fact that the state's attorney has refused to disclose just what his office has learned, it is understood that there is no substantial evidence upon which the kidnaping charge can be based.

At noon today the "mystery" of the location of Mrs. Lillian Borg, 23, of Providence, wife of the late three men now held at the Fairfield county jail, was cleared up. She was held by County Detective William S. Kearns and had been brought to this office by State Police Sergeant Irving Schubert and Trooper William Vansay, who took an active part in the capture of the three.

These held in default of bonds are Joseph Borg, 26, and John Collins, 21, of Providence, and Edward Menard, 33, of Pawtucket.

State's Attorney William H. Conley said this morning: "There isn't a shred of evidence produced that would reveal an attempt to kidnap the boy. It was a legitimate scheme, in my opinion, to commit a robbery, as they made certain that the family was out and gone unharmed."

San Juan, Puerto Rico, Nov. 18.—(AP)—For three days and nights a physician labored to save the life of a patient he may never see and neither of them today probably knows even the other's name.

The American steamer *Algie* was steaming toward the Barbados, 223 miles southwest, last Thursday. The chief engineer doubled up with abdominal pains. His Captain ordered him to bed.

Fragments of 5,646 tons gross register do not carry a ship's physician, but the captain knew a very sick man when he saw one.

He sent out a wireless message for advice, and the United States Coastguard Cutter *Unaga*, stationed here, responded. The *Algie's* shipper described his patient's symptoms and the medical officer aboard the coast guard cutter told him what to do.

Instructed by doctor he prepared and alternated with hot water bottles on the patient's abdomen. Then, as the sick man's condition changed, he ordered stimulants, then opiates, then orange juice, then brandy. At five o'clock he ordered the patient placed in a half reclining position and at other times he directed him to take his bed.

The freighter's captain watched his chief engineer closely and reported, across hundreds of miles of sea, his temperature, pulse, and respiration together with the relative degree of pain and ease.

Meanwhile the engineer crew, about his chief, labored to hurry their ship toward port. They made Bridgetown at 2 a. m., yesterday. As the *Algie* dropped anchor she pulled up alongside. In it were doctors who took the patient ashore, put him in a waiting ambulance, and hurried him to a hospital.

Then, and not until that moment, the United States medical officer on the *Unaga* signed off.

EDWIN BROUSSARD, LONG'S FOE, DIES

Former Senator Passes On in Louisiana After a Short Illness.

New Iberia, La., Nov. 18.—(AP)—Former United States Senator Edwin D. Broussard, of Louisiana, died today at his residence here. He was defeated for re-election in the last Senatorial election by Senator John H. Overton, of Alexandria, who was supported by the political organization of Huey P. Long.

Mr. Broussard died from a sudden attack after several days of illness. He was 59 years old and was a native of New Iberia Parish. He was a veteran of the Spanish American war and served with the 7th Connecticut in the Philippine islands at Manila in 1898-1901.

A law graduate of Tulane University and president of the 1921 law class at the college, he was elected United States senator in 1924. He was re-elected in 1926. In 1928 Broussard was defeated in the Overton campaign and he filed charges with the Senate which brought a prolonged Senate investigation into the Overton election.

He charged corruption at the ballot box by the forces of Senator Long in the election of his successor, Overton, and those charges led to the impeachment of Long. Broussard was a member of the University of Chicago. He is reported to be the opening session of the Academy's autumn meeting here.

Waterbury, Conn., Nov. 18.—(AP)—Benjamin F. PICK CALIFORNIA FOR GRANGE MEET

National Body Names West Coast for '35 Convention; Today's Business.

Hartford, Conn., Nov. 18.—(AP)—The National Grange selected California as the site for its 1935 convention today as it settled down to dispose of a mass of business after six days devoted principally to ritual and preliminaries.

Two ballots were required with the first ballot getting 24 votes, four short of the necessary majority on the second ballot. Michigan scored 13 votes on the first ballot and 17 on the second, while Illinois polled 13 on the first and eight on the second. Ohio got eight on the first and eight on the second.

The organization, entering the sixth day of its convention, re-elected Eugene A. Ackert of Massachusetts, Ill. to the national executive committee for a three-year term.

The delegates began their deliberations today to clear the program of a great deal of routine business listening to addresses by Dr. George Warren of Cornell, secretary of the National Grange, and Governor Wilbur Cross of Connecticut.

Many invitations for the 1935 and subsequent conventions were received from various states. The delegates were invited to meet in some future year, while J. Kerr Scott, past master of the same state as the site for one of the future meetings.

GASPARRI RITES TO BE THURSDAY

Federal Date of Former Papal Secretary of State Set by Pontiff.

Rome, Nov. 18.—(AP)—Pope Pius today ordered the funeral of Pietro Cardinal Gasparri, former Papal secretary of state, who died last night, to be held at 10 a. m. Thursday.

The service will take place in St. Peter's Basilica. The pope said that the New Deal is permanent and called for co-operation from the "obstructionists" to get the country back to prosperity.

Warm Springs, Ga., Nov. 18.—(AP)—President Roosevelt, with the announcement that "all is well" and that the New Deal is progressing in its present program, particularly for cheaper power, settled down in his "winter home" today for Thanksgiving visit. Traveling across the southern after an inspection of the Tennessee Valley Power and Land Utilization program, Mr. Roosevelt said yesterday in two significant statements that the New Deal is permanent and called for co-operation from the "obstructionists" to get the country back to prosperity.
