

MACGUIRE CALLED IN "FASCIST PLOT"

Wall St. Bond Salesman Declares That Gen. Butler's Story of a Dictatorship Is False.

New York, Nov. 21.—(AP)—Behind a thick veil of secrecy, the Congressional committee on un-American activities called General C. MacGuire, a Wall street bond salesman, to testify further today in connection with General Smootley D. Butler's purported charge of a "Fascist plot" to create a United States dictatorship.

The story given to the committee yesterday, the charge was dubbed "a publicity stunt," "a lie," "perfect nonsense" and "a conspiracy by various prominent men whose names have been drawn into the story."

Prior to calling MacGuire to resume his testimony before the committee yesterday, the committee studied briefly "certain aspects" of alleged Communist activity among workers of the fur trade industry.

Chairman John W. McCormack of the committee did not mention details, but it was understood the committee planned to look into the organization of fur workers and past workers activities.

Recently, an organization of fur workers left the American Federation of Labor to affiliate with the Fur Trade Workers Industrial Union, of which Ben Gold is National secretary. The move was understood to be a Left Wing shift.

Other Connections

It was also learned today that the committee's investigation of the C. C. Camp in Ellsburg, Md., had some connection with the hearing of General Butler's reported "Fascist plot." Captain Ernest Glazier, camp commandant, testified before the committee yesterday in what was understood to be "collaboration" with the committee's study. The committee had previously investigated the camp.

While the atmosphere surrounding the hearing has been thick with conjecture, the most popular conception of the camp connection with the dictatorship "plot" has been to regard the camp as the "concentration point" for the supposed "Fascist army" before moving on Washington.

Members of the committee refused to divulge the nature of any of the testimony and met the majority of inquiries with lifted eyebrows or invitations to "draw your own conclusions."

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THREE INFANTS' BODIES ARE FOUND IN TRUNK

Woman Who Owned Luggage, Questioned by Police, Says She Knows Nothing About It.

New York, Nov. 21.—(AP)—Discovery of the bodies of three infants in a trunk which had been in a Brooklyn warehouse on June 15, 1932 was disclosed today in the line-up at police headquarters.

The discovery led to the arrest of a woman who identified herself as Ruby Clarke, 36, of Rocky Road, Upper Nyack, N. Y. Questioned in the line-up, she said the trunk belonged to her, but denied she had known what it contained.

Since the summer of 1932 the trunk had gathered dust in the warehouse, located at 25 Lexington avenue, Brooklyn. Suspicious workmen finally opened it and made their grisome find yesterday. Police speedily traced ownership of the luggage.

Traced Maiden Name

Miss Clarke said that she was married 15 years ago to a man named Mahod, and that on his death six years later she resumed her maiden name of Clarke.

At the time she sent the trunk to the warehouse she lived at 1000 President street, Brooklyn.

Miss Clarke said she was a graduate of Vermont Teachers College, and that she taught school in Wilmington and Cabot, Vt., prior to 1924. After that and until three years ago, she said, she was employed as a bookkeeper by various Long Island banks, including the Jamaica branch of the Bank of the Manhattan Company.

Upon learning Miss Clarke's present address, police communicated with her parents in Upper Nyack and learned she was on a hunting trip near Lake George, N. Y.

Returns Voluntarily

Detectives got in touch with her there, and she returned voluntarily to Brooklyn last night.

The condition of the three bodies prevented immediate determination of their age or sex.

Miss Clarke appeared extremely nervous during questioning by Detective Joseph Donovan, toward the end of the hearing.

SEE GREAT CHANGE IN RAIL EQUIPMENT

Steel to Replace Wood Even in Freight Cars in the Near Future.

New York, Nov. 21.—(AP)—Sweeping changes in standard rail road equipment may be made as a result of the recent successful use of alloy steel in high-speed passenger transportation.

Coming at a time when much of the rolling stock of the majority of railroads is made of wood, the development in the transportation industry is believed in railway equipment circles to indicate definite swing to the use of lighter, but stronger metal in constructing equipment for the transportation of passengers at high speed, and economical hauling of freight at any speed.

Nine high-speed trains are now under construction at various shops of equipment makers, three of which are being built of stainless steel, three of low alloy, corrosion resisting steel, one uses both the high tensile steel and aluminum, and two are being built entirely of the latter metal.

Other high-tensile alloy steels are being used to increasingly great extent for freight car building where their low ratio of weight to strength is said by engineers to be an average of 8 per cent to 10 per cent lighter than the conventional type of hopper car weighing 44,000 pounds will carry only 125,000 pounds. The new car's ratio of payload to gross load will get a 62.2 per cent as compared with the ordinary car's ratio of 74 per cent, representing a conversion of about 7 tons of dead weight into revenue-producing capacity. Even greater decreases in weight are being sought by the use of steel in passenger cars.

60 MILLION SUIT STARTED BY REC

State Auditors Examine Funds of Big Chicago Bank—Charges in Suit.

Chicago, Nov. 21.—(AP)—The Central Republic Trust Company was in the hands of examiners from the state auditors office today after a suit for \$60,000,000 had been filed against the institution by the Reconstructing Finance Corporation.

The suit, filed in Federal and Circuit courts, alleged that \$60,000,000 balance remains undeposited in 1932.

Both courts were asked to determine the liability status of the bank's 4,000 stockholders who include Gen. Charles G. Dawes, former vice-president and at one time chairman of the RFC.

The bank, meanwhile, was closed for examination, but State Auditor Edward J. Hardest said that a receiver had not been appointed.

Restraining Order

Other creditors were prevented from filing similar suits by a temporary restraining order issued by Federal Judge John P. Barnes. The order was signed yesterday.

FOUR MEN KILLED AS VESSEL SINKS

Steamers Collide on Lake Huron in Heavy Fog—14 Sailors Saved.

Alpena, Mich., Nov. 21.—(AP)—Four members of the crew of the steamer W. C. Franz were lost early today in a collision 30 miles south of Thunder Bay Island, Lake Huron, between the Franz and the Edward E. Loomis on the evening of Nov. 19.

A message from the steamer Franz Brothers, standing by, verified by O. K. Talar, operator of a radio station at Rogers Point, said the Franz sank and that 14 survivors of its crew had been taken aboard the Loomis, which was proceeding south under its own power, with considerable water in its foreward hold.

The Franz had a crew of 18. Radio messages said the Loomis was badly damaged forward in the collision.

The sea was moderate, the message said, but visibility still had not cleared in the early morning hours in a heavy fog.

When crews were rescued, the exact location of the collision was given as 30 miles south of Thunder Bay Island, or 17 1/2 miles from the shore.

MASS PRODUCTION AS RECOVERY AID

Edward A. Filene Claims It Means More Jobs and More Money.

Pittsburgh, Pa., Nov. 21.—(AP)—Edward A. Filene, department store executive of Boston, who sees mass production as a depression breaker, remained in Pittsburgh today for another address.

In a speech tonight at the Community Forum, Filene is expected to deal further with current business problems.

Filene told 400 Pittsburgh retail merchants and department store officials last night that "there never were such opportunities for business as now."

He lauded the "wage-boosting side" of the New Deal for aiding recovery, and criticized the "price-factor side" for retarding it.

Mass production, Filene predicted, will mean greater purchasing power for the people, and this in turn will mean more employment for those who manufacture goods, and more money for them to use in purchasing their own needs.

"We retailers," he said, "must keep in mind that mass production is the key to changes which are now occurring in retailing."

Pointing to an announcement of Henry Ford's of a proposed new steel mill, Filene suggested that the automobile manufacturer "is going to beat mass production to Pittsburgh."

Ford has found, he alleged, that the United States Steel Corporation (which has several plants in the Pittsburgh district) does not understand mass production, and hence charges more for its products than Ford thinks fair.

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HOPKINS BACKS HOUSING PLANS DESPITE RULING

Relief Director to Continue Construction of Low Cost Homes to Aid Unemployed.

Washington, Nov. 21.—(AP)—Henry L. Hopkins, the relief administrator, showed no intention today to abandon construction of low cost homes and rural-industrial communities for the destitute unemployed.

Use of relief money for such purposes was called illegal yesterday in an opinion by the attorney general, the comptroller general, who blocked a relief grant for a low cost housing project in the District of Columbia. Legality of the relief administrator's National program of providing low cost homes for families on relief rolls was vigorously defended by Hopkins.

Hopkins' Statement

Referring to the housing project in the National capital which the attorney general refused to approve, the relief administrator said in a statement: "It is submitted that the grant of the funds in question comes within the classification mentioned. The construction of the building itself will furnish employment for those who would be otherwise unemployed and would furnish work relief."

"It would, furthermore, in supplying decent living quarters at low rental, constitute relief to the needy. The inability of the majority of the unemployed to obtain a decent place to live is one of the most serious consequences of the present emergency."

"It seems clearly within the power of the administrator to relieve the situation by providing for low cost and hence low rental apartments, the construction of which would be a higher standard than could be provided for by direct relief at lower ultimate cost to the government."

Whether Mr. Carter's decision regarding the housing project in the National capital will affect the National program remains a matter of speculation.

It probably will not be answered definitely until the relief administrator goes to the Treasury for funds to meet December relief grants to the states.

Washington, Nov. 21.—(AP)—First accurate descriptions of the two bodies found Saturday on a waterside rock of the Galapagos Archipelago established today with apparent certainty that the strange "Empress" of Charles Island—Business Elites' House—was not one of the victims.

A radio message to the Associated Press from the British government, which found the bodies, gave a description of the smaller body which fitted Alfred Rudolph Lorenz, of Paris. Lorenz's passport was expressed here by a man familiar with all the figures there.

The second body was reported by Captain Rodriguez to be a tall, thin man with a head band and a slight tuft of brown hair in back.

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CONSUMER DEMAND MUCH IN EVIDENCE

Department Store Head Declares Depression Did Not Stifle, But Starved It.

Atlantic City, N. J., Nov. 21.—(AP)—Paul M. Hollister, executive vice-president of R. H. Macy and Co., New York, today told the 20th annual convention of the Association of National Advertisers that because all income has slumped, advertisers have fallen into the error of concluding consumer demand has dwindled.

"It is as plain as the nose on my face that the only thing depression could not kill was consumer demand for the goods you make, the goods we sell," he said.

"There never was such a passion for the possession of goods as there is today. The depression did not stifle demand—it starved it to a point where today it is ravenous."

He pointed out that despite this demand merchants and manufacturers have been endeavoring to raise the price of goods beyond what the consumer can pay.

Sam Little Money

"The consumer," he went on, "can buy no more than he can pay for. He is increasingly embarrassed by the goods shown, by the glories of them as proclaimed in advertising. All he needs is the money. That he hasn't got. And he's sore. And he's right."

"Such a state of bitterness between us and the body which holds our very commercial life in its hands, calls for a joint rescue party, and a very swift one, unless we elect to commit commercial suicide."

Result of Seven Years' Work Contained in Bulky Document Now Being Studied by Heads of Various Parties.

London, Nov. 21.—(AP)—A book which may hold the immediate future of the government of 300,000 persons and which may prove a bombshell in English politics was available for circulation today. The book, believed destined for "best seller" ranks perhaps exceeding any British government document in history, is the bulky report of the joint select committee of Parliament on Home Rule for India. The issuance of the report marks the close of nearly seven years of the most exhaustive examination of proposed constitutional changes ever undertaken in the British Empire.

Opens New Phase

At the same time it marks the opening of a new phase, it was expected, in Great Britain's relations with India, for the 300 page report, with accompanying minutes of the proceedings, will be the basis of the reform bill, which will be the leading measure before the current session of Parliament.

Simultaneous with the issuance of the book here, 20,000 copies were released in India. The government is so interested in obtaining wide dissemination of the report in both countries, that it is taking a deliberate loss in its sales. In India the document can be purchased for six shillings (approximately 18 cents) and in England the price is a shilling (approximately 25 cents).

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ESTIMATING COSTS OF WAR PENSIONS

Survey Shows That World War Veterans Die at Rate of 80 Daily.

Washington, Nov. 21.—(AP)—World War Veterans are dying at the rate of more than 80 every day or about 30,000 a year.

These figures with many others have been furnished the Budget Bureau by the Veterans Administration in compiling estimates for the next fiscal year. The estimates will not be made public until submitted to Congress in January but officials express the opinion it is to be much higher than the current year's \$46,758,000.

The figure does not include the \$100,000,000 estimated as necessary to pay for benefits voted by the last Congress over President Roosevelt's objection.

If deaths and liabilities continue at the present rate the increase will probably shoot the 1935-36 cost.

BEHIND THE SCENES IN Washington

Washington, Nov. 21.—Long distance political predictions now are likely to be inaccurate as the election made after the election of 1928.

No one denied that we were in for eight years of Roosevelt. But along came a stock market crash, the depression, the Roosevelt election, the New Deal—its little surprises such as the abandonment of the gold standard—and now this unprecedented Democratic landslide in 1934, which threatens the existence of the Republican Party.

The forgotten party. These unexpected events have come along so rapidly as to make monkeys of the professional prophets. There isn't any sign that the accelerated tempo of national affairs is not continuing as the best you can do is to point out the direction the wagon was traveling when last glimpsed.

The New Deal landslide was the product of widespread restlessness, a great popular hope reposed in Roosevelt and continued reaction against a Republican party which didn't offer anything but pleasant memories and non-constructive criticism.

Few leaders had predicted even a partial recovery for the G. O. P. unless it changed character or, in any event, anything but an overwhelming Roosevelt re-election victory in 1936.

We're On the Gallop. The country, mentally and politically is on the move. There is a mass movement away from conservatism and no one knows where or at what point it will stop. Reaction isn't anywhere on the horizon. One of the election's clearest lessons is that the voting masses won't stand still unless they're attached and that they don't mind galloping ahead of the New Deal. Unless Roosevelt succeeds in his ambitious program to make everybody happy, there's likely to be a lot more such galloping.

Probably none of the results is more significant than the amazing fact that Union Sinclair received more than 700,000 votes in California, a year ago, anyone who had predicted that would have been considered mad. 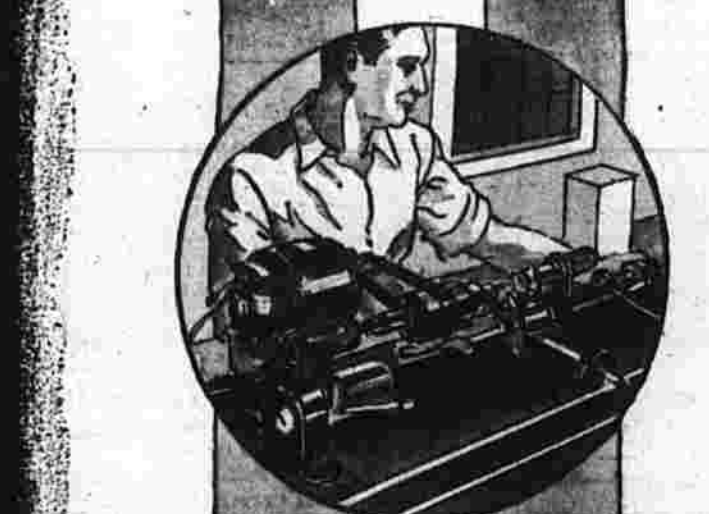
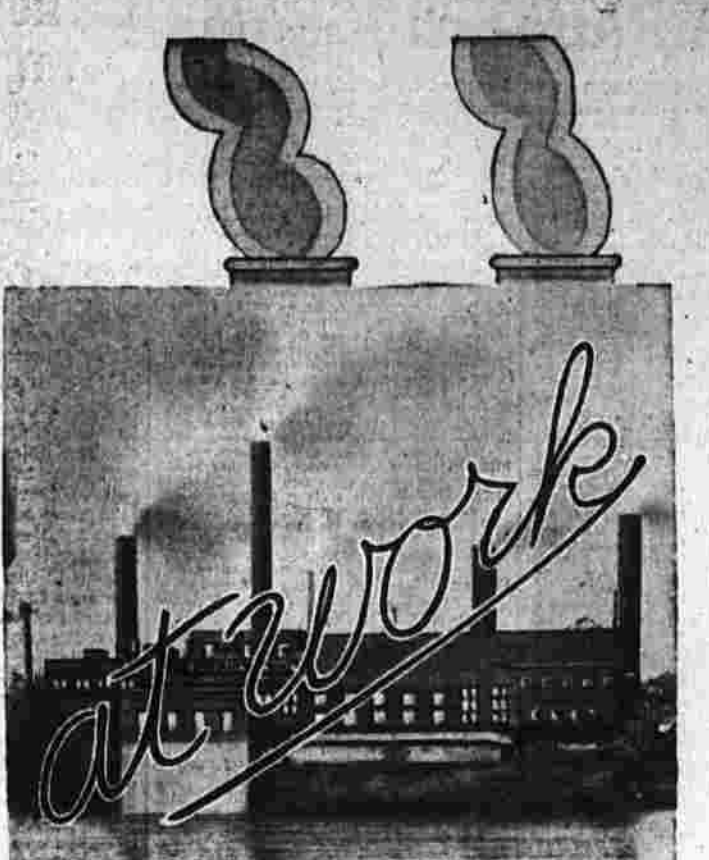

Countess Tolstoy Tells Of Her Father's Work

By Countess Alexandra Tolstoy

Who wrote "The Tragedy of Tolstoy" and "I Worked for the Soviets."

Though only a girl of thirteen, I could not help realizing how much the life of our whole household—our whole world—was concentrated in the little room at the end of the long corridor. It had low ceilings and black leather furniture. Paper after paper, draft after draft, corrected galley after corrected galley, came out. "Resurrection" was being finished.

All helped. My older brothers and sisters helped in the copying. I was too young, so for consolation, I received letters and pressed them in a huge book bigger than I was.

Aging and ailing, my father wrote to his friend, Chertkov: "As a cannon ball reaching the earth, augments its speed, this is with me. Now that life is nearly at an end, I cannot, no not cannot, I can but I do not want to think about anything else but 'Resurrection'."

Many years have passed since "Resurrection" was written, and something of the new world that it prophesied has been born. Perhaps not much. But we are closer.

I have just seen the painting picture that has been made of it under the new title of "We Live Again."

Not only do the vivid performances of Anna Sten and Frederic March bring memories to life, but the atmosphere, the feeling and the mood of the picture suggest and remember as much.

Hurried. "Resurrection" so great that in the hurry and the confusion, trying to get corrected galley to foreign publishers and take care of the camera in Russia, no copy that carried the imprint of his final approval appeared for many years. I remember the expression of mischief in his eyes as he said: "Look, I have made a mess of the galley again!"

AUTO GROUP FLIES FLAG OF TRUCE

Permanent Peace Hinges On Study of A. F. of L.'s Auto Craft Demands.

Detroit.—Extension of the automobile code for 90 days—until Feb. 1—is a truce, not a permanent peace.

The fate of the huge auto industry, main prop of such recovery as has been achieved to date, will rest there, what uses for stabilizing and improving it can be worked out before that time by a detailed study of its problems.

Foremost in urging such a study is Francis James Dillon, recently-appointed American Federation of Labor organizer who has drawn up a study comparable to that made by the textile industry in necessary.

Such phases of the industry as the 20-hour week, the replacing of men by women workers, abolition of the merit clause, the speedup and the timing of operations, an annual wage, and a statutory board for the industry instead of the present presidential board, are among the things which Dillon believes must be exhaustively considered.

Leaders Drafted From Other Crafts Dillon, who represents the auto industry as the No. 1 A. F. of L. man in Detroit when Collins was shifted to the New York office, is the organizer who at Flint produced a solid front of 30,000 members who struck when a strike threatened last spring. "The great man" of the A. F. of L. federal union in 17 states.

No leader of organized auto workers is likely to come up from the auto workers' ranks for some time to come, for until last year the industry was practically unorganized. Experience is lacking in the industry, and the auto field has all got their start in Detroit. Collins was the first street-car conductor. Dillon is a modeler.

Extension of the present auto code without modification is looked upon by the organized auto workers as a minor setback, especially as it puts off any day of negotiating until after the tool and die-making season for the new models. But the new expiration date, Feb. 1, is right in the midst of the spring production season, and just the time for a strike if the studios and bearings on projects of the industry do not open up direct hope of changes favorable to labor after February 1.

The struggle to unionize the auto industry has been sharpened by pointed efforts of Alfred P. Sloan, Jr., president of General Motors, to encourage a new employee representation or company union plan in the G. M. plants. The unions have flooded the town with petitions, a counter-barrage, and rebuffed their own organized efforts.

Union Workers Let Out, Charge Organized disaffected with the present code as extended will continue to grow unless studies during the critical coming three months open the way to change after that time. "Every man, woman and child who has lifted his voice in favor of the auto union is walking the street," declares Dillon. "That was the very thing we were told the president would protect us from when we agreed to a truce last spring. It hasn't come. We haven't given up hope yet, but we're going to expect that the problems of the industry will be tackled in a serious way this winter, or else we can't answer for what will happen in the spring."

STARCH OF SWEEP POTATO

PURIFIED FOR INDUSTRIES

Washington—(AP)—A suitable market for sweet potato starch may be provided in cotton mills for staining and in other industries, according to department of agriculture scientists who have succeeded in purifying the product.

Sweet potato starch produced up to this time has been of good and poor quality because of colored compounds and non-starch substances. The scientists have learned how to wash out these substances by a solution of dilute alkaline sulphite, producing a starch of good quality and excellent color. The process also results in a more complete removal of starch from the sweet potato pulp.

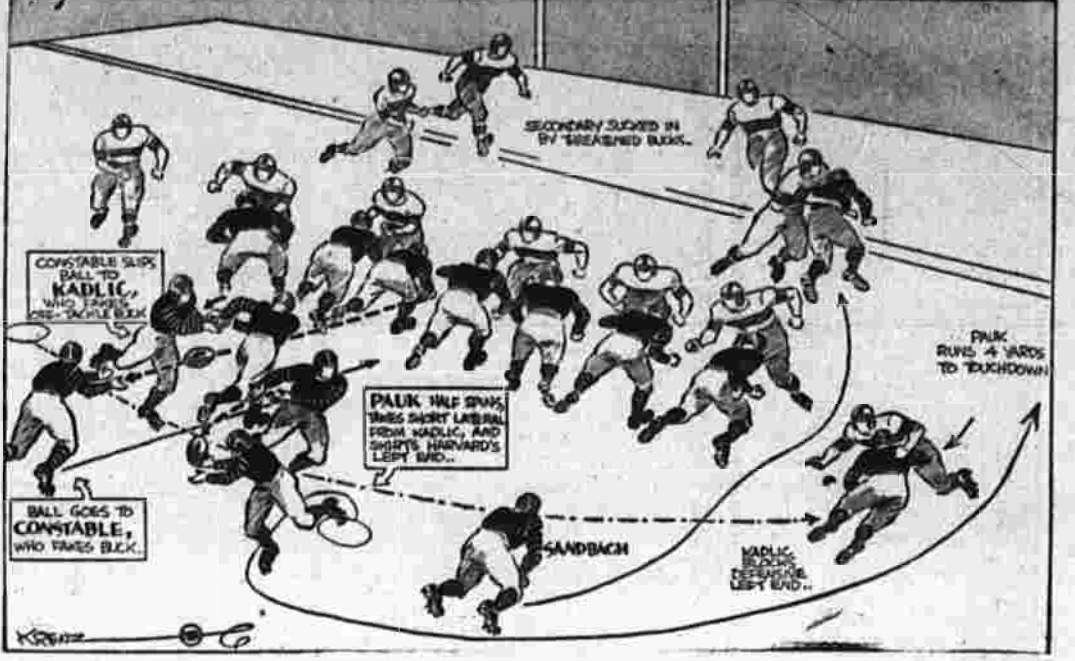

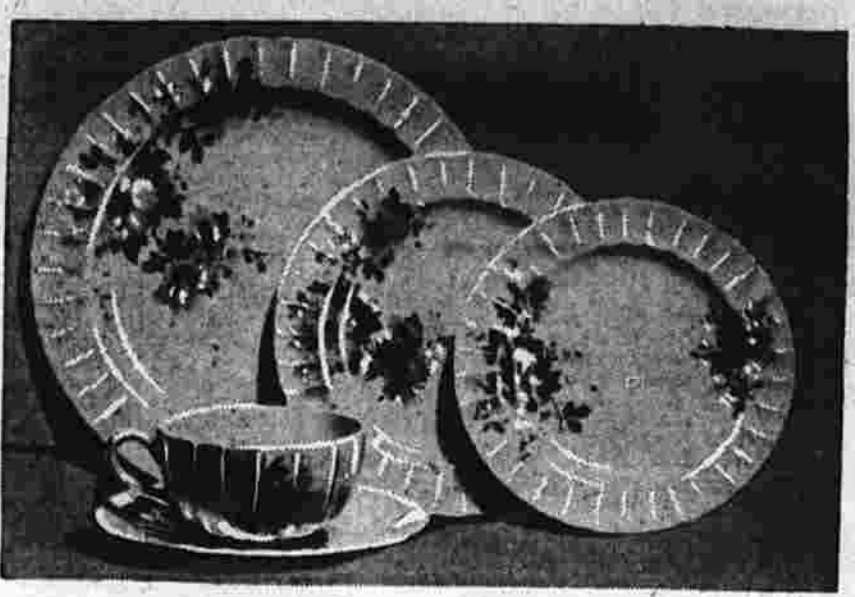
