

COUNTRY-WIDE COUNTERFEITING RING UNCOVERED

Forty Federal Agents Have Been at Work for Three Months; Two Millions Are Involved.

New York, Nov. 22.—(AP)—Seventy men, charged by government agents with being the mainprings of a gigantic counterfeiting ring, stood in the police lineup today as Secret Service men claimed to have smashed completely a \$2,000,000 illegal enterprise.

In addition to being charged with flooding the country with millions of dollars worth of spurious currency, the ring leaders were accused of intercepting their counterfeiting activities with post office bombings in various parts of the country.

The seven in police lineup here were taken yesterday by agents operating in New York City, while three men and a woman were dragged into the Federal net in simultaneous raids in Newark and Tarrytown, N. Y.

None of the seven in the lineup today admitted complicity. One of the number said he had been in the United States since 1906 and was "completely innocent of a crime."

Two men and a woman were taken in a raid by Secret Service operatives and New Jersey police in a house in Tarrytown, and another man in Newark.

The raids ended a three-month investigation into the activities of the counterfeiters in New York City, under the direction of Robert G. Godby, in charge of the northern and western Federal districts of New York.

Bridgeport Officials To Be Tried Nov. 30

The four who were arrested on warrants Monday were Fritz K. G. Weber, president of the Board of Public Welfare; Edward P. Quinn of the Board of Public Purchases; Dr. Philip L. McLaughlin, former president of the Board of Education and Charles T. Puley, former member of that board.

PLAN FURTHER PROBE OF PLOT SEEN BY BUTLER

Committee Will Renew Quiz of MacGuire on "Fascist" Treason Charges Made by Marine General.

New York, Nov. 22.—(AP)—The Congressional committee investigating un-American activities prepared today to continue its sifting of charges on General Smedley D. Butler had been asked to head a Fascist movement to get up an organization to support the cause.

After he heard Gerald P. McCormack, New York bond salesman, reiterate his denial yesterday that he had made such proposals to the retired marine corps general, the committee ordered MacGuire to reappear tomorrow for continued examination.

Today the committee, according to representative John W. McCormack, its chairman, will not consider the matter officially, directing its energies toward other phases of un-American activities.

McCormack said that the committee will call for present witnesses, aside from MacGuire, who Robert Sterling Clark, New York broker named by general Butler as being associated with MacGuire, Clark is not at present in the United States.

Rep. Samuel Dickstein, vice-chairman of the committee, said yesterday in a statement which he later said he did not intend to publish that MacGuire was having difficulty explaining money he had handled that ran "well into five figures" and was "hanging himself by contradictions and admissions during his testimony."

U. S. ASKED TO CUT WHEAT PRODUCTION

Budapest, Hungary, Nov. 22.—(AP)—The United States was asked to make a complete right-about-face in its wheat acreage program under a draft agreement presented today to the commission of the Big Four nations (the United States, Canada, Australia and Argentina) at a meeting here.

The United States has already completed most of its 5 per cent increase under a program announced by the Department of Agriculture August 23 in which wheat sowing, which is punishable by six years imprisonment.

Under a proposed plan the Big Four nations (the United States, Canada, Australia and Argentina) would each promise to plant no more wheat during 1934-35 than they did during the past year, in which all of them made substantial reductions.

WHAT TO DO

When it is fully realized that the NRA, the AAA, the PWA and the CWA...

There is a starting point. We know that in this land there is enough of everything for everybody...

But from that starting point how to proceed to get rid of the artificial barrier that has produced poverty in the midst of plenty?

Obviously the Roosevelt program consists of 125 men—perhaps not enough for a really adequate road patrol, certainly not enough for both road patrol and general State Police force.

An entirely new one must be evolved. And because of the enormous complications and besides that which have swamped thousands of able, energetic and honest men in their efforts to make that intricate yet purposeful machine work, the new one must be contrastingly simple, ease the people will have none of it.

Fifteen million workers can produce all the consumer goods that this country needs—enough for everybody. That makes fifteen million others superfluous, far as consumer goods production goes.

Secretary Letch has it figured out that at an outlay of ten billion dollars a program of public works could be carried out that would give employment to five million workers for a year.
