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**DETROIT MURDERER STILL AT LARGE**

Merton Goodrich, Charged With Murder of 11-Year Old Lillian Gallagher

Detroit. (AP)—A two-month search for Merton Ward Goodrich, charged with the murder of 11-year-old Lillian Gallagher, continues—inspired by the statement of psychiatrists that he is a menace to children.

Lillian Gallagher, known to her neighbors as Lily, walked from her home in Detroit the afternoon of September 20, a charity punchboard under her arm. She was one of many children going from house to house selling chances to aid their parish school.

Five days later police found her body in a trunk behind a bed in a small two-room apartment here. Evidently she had been slain by fire. In the apartment was found a pile of photographs, all of little girls, obscene scribbles on them, Goodrich, a trap drummer in a beer garden orchestra, and his crippled wife had lived in the apartment. They were last seen together after Lily disappeared. He is charged with murder, and his wife is wanted for questioning.

Records showed Goodrich was released from a hospital for the criminal insane at Lima, Ohio, in January that he had been committed there twice for molesting school children.

**Rewards Total \$2,500**

A manhunt was organized; rewards amounting to \$2,500 were posted; descriptions of Goodrich and his wife were printed and broadcast—but there are no clues to the Goodriches despite the penalties that marked the two.

Goodrich, 38 years old, is thin-faced and tall, with protruding ears and bad, broken teeth. His wife, Florence, is small and has brown, bobbed hair. She has a small mole on her upper lip and is very perceptible because her right foot was crippled by infantile paralysis.

Goodrich was believed able to raise enough money to leave the country.

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MAYORS DISCUSS LABOR TROUBLES

Armed Forces Needed Only to Protect from Invasion, Says One Speaker.

Chicago, Nov. 23.—(AP)—Mayor Charles L. Smith of Seattle, speaker before the United States Congress today before the House committee on labor, said that because of the increased demands made upon them officers should be well paid.

"I am convinced that they are steadily took sides for or against the strikers."

PHYSICIANS BACK PRESIDENT'S STAND

His Attitude on Old Age Pension and Sickness Insurance is Praised.

Chicago, Nov. 23.—(AP)—The Journal of the American Association in its current issue editorially declares President Roosevelt's stand on old age pensions and sickness insurance to have been "the most encouraging words" to the medical profession to come from the recent National Conference on Security.

President Roosevelt told the conference that while organizations promoting fantastic schemes have increased the difficulties of getting sound legislation he hoped might secure for the aged could be provided through a sound and unimpaired system.

Concerning sickness insurance, he said: "I am confident that we can devise a system which will enhance and not hinder the remarkable progress which has been made and is being made in the practice of the professions of surgery and medicine in this country."

Editorial Comment: "These words are to the medical profession among the most encouraging to come from the conference held in Washington November 14 and 15. They recognize the fantastic character of many of the schemes that have been proposed for these types of economic security systems. They indicate also a realization of the necessity for developing changes in the nature of medical practice that will neither break down the quality of medical care nor impede medical progress."

The headquarters of the Medical Association, the editorial said, has been besieged with telephone calls, telegrams and letters on the subject ever since the plans for the conference were made public.

"Some physicians are apparently opposed to all change and feel the American Medical Society should officially make itself felt in opposition to the entire program of the government," it said.

"While the House of Delegates of the American Medical Society, which has repeatedly voiced its opposition to the socialization of medicine, is indicated in its sessions at Cleveland last week, its belief in properly controlled experimentation without new forms of medical practice, subject to the retention of basic principles recommended by its own profession, is well known."

"This is the policy which the Joint Legislative Committee on the subject has supported to its utmost."

MUST BE RE-BAPTIZED OR RESIGN HIS POST

Louisville, Ky., Nov. 23.—(AP)—Finding his immersion "irregular," the Kentucky Baptist General Association is demanding that Dr. Henry

Noble Sherwood, president of Georgetown college, at Georgetown, Ky., be re-baptized or resign. The Courier-Journal, in a special dispatch from Georgetown, said the newly installed college president refused to do either and that the college trustees "to take immediate steps to correct existing conditions."

The resolution provided that "in case the conditions of irregularity be ascertained on January 20, 1935, the State Mission Board for immediate action, according to the spirit of the resolution, which would prevent the further distribution of funds to any institution out of line of Kentucky Baptist principles and practices."

Placing the mission board's annual contribution to the college at about \$8,000, the Courier-Journal said its trustees were "authoritatively reported to believe" they could act along without the assistance.
