

SLAYER MAY PLEAD "UNWRITTEN LAW"
Student Cleric Shoots His Girl Bride and Priest in New York Hotel After Drinking Bout—Attorney Plans Justification Defense—Young Wife, Hollywood Dancer, Prompted Purchase of Weapon.

New York, Nov. 27.—(AP)—Disheveled and apparently on the verge of complete collapse, Joseph L. Stelmets, 22-year-old theological student, was arraigned in homicide court today on the charge that he shot to death yesterday his 17-year-old bride and Rev. Joseph J. Leonard, Catholic priest.

Shortly after he was remanded without bail for a hearing next Monday, Stelmets' attorney, Meyer Machlis, intimated he might use the "unwritten law" as a defense for his client.

Through his attorney, Stelmets declared he found his bride less than a month "in an embarrassing situation" in the priest's hotel room yesterday before he seized a pistol and slew her and the cleric.

Ernest Bayler of claim Machlis said Mrs. Stelmets, former dancer in Hollywood, had known the priest for several days. "I don't want to go into that now," he added.

A bizarre twist to the honeymoon tragedy was given by the attorney's statement that the slain bride had urged her husband to purchase a little more to taxes than have a plan of this kind intimated. Dr. Welton was the only individual accused in the Stelmets case.

Police Checking Up On Story Told by Man—Identifies Victim of Suicide-Murder Case.

Carlisle, Pa., Nov. 27.—(AP)—Police seeking the identity of three little girls found dead in a lonely wood last Saturday studied a cross-country agent today on the strength of the story of Larry Carney, a Philadelphia man who says he once lived in San Francisco.

Today Carney identified a photograph of a man found dead at Dunsmuir as that of Horace Hughes, about 27, of San Francisco, a former Salvation Army officer, who had three children whose ages, he said, correspond with those of the mystery girls.

"That's him! That's Horace Hughes," exclaimed Carney when he saw the picture.

A woman was found dead alongside the man at Dunsmuir on Monday on a small farm charge. It was a homicide case, Carney said, and police have intensely studied the theory that there is a definite link between the two.

Dunsmuir is 100 miles west over the mountains from Carlisle, in the general direction of Pittsburgh.

Carney said he met Hughes, whom he knew six years ago, on a Philadelphia street on Monday of last week. Hughes told him, said Carney, that he had hitch-hiked here from the Pacific Coast with his "retired wife," about 21, and his three daughters by a former marriage. The children, he said, were Geraldine, about 15, Dorothy, about 12,

Government Experts Are Studying Bankruptcy Indictments Against Him.

Washington, Nov. 27.—(AP)—Attorney General Cummings said today a further study of the bankruptcy indictments pending against Robert M. Hutchins, president of the University of Chicago, was being made by the United States Attorney Dwight Green before the government decided whether to prosecute the former university trustee.

Cummings made this statement at a press conference after he had held a 20-minute conference with Green, who directed the prosecution of Hutchins last week on the charge that he had perpetrated a fraud on the government by obtaining a \$100,000 loan from the United States.

MARKET TRADING EASES UP A BIT

Many Stocks Droop Under Profit Taking - Called a Healthy Correction.

New York, Nov. 27.—(AP)—Many stocks dipped under profit taking today, but the trading volume also showed appreciably the moderate decline.

In view of the fact that the equities list had advanced for four consecutive sessions, an irregular setback was not at all unexpected and was interpreted by most market analysts as a "healthy correction" of a position that had become a little too heavy.

The utilities, which yesterday performed with some of their old-time vigor, bore the brunt of selling in the early hours. Although they were unable to come back to any great extent, they turned extremely quiet. Scattered speculation broadcast the current and the rails were noticeably resistant. News of a new specialty stimulating character was scarce.

Grains were somewhat improved, but cotton and most other commodities did virtually nothing. Bond markets were fairly firm, foreign exchanges held to a restricted range.

International business machines advanced more than a point to a new year's high. Union Pacific, Santa Fe and Santa Fe N. V. Central, Southern Pacific and Northern Pacific were about unchanged to slightly higher. Losses of fractions to more than a point included American Telephone, Consolidated Gas Western Union, Public Service of New Jersey, American Can, American Tobacco B. Universal Leaf, American National Bank, Chrysler, U. S. Steel, National Biscuit, U. S. Smelting, International Harvester, Case and Goodys.

The rail appeared to be heartened by expectations that the next Congress will do something to put them on their feet. At the same time current net operating income of most of the lines showed little betterment. Some of the New York utilities were depressed by reported plans of the city to impose a 3 per cent tax on gross earnings of these corporations.

Notwithstanding the realistic movement in some groups, sentiment was generally bullish for selected equities. Some market commentators expressed the belief that while stocks may undoubtedly look high when measured by earning power, money is so abundant and easy to come by that any extensive liquidation from present levels is not indicated.

Wall Street displayed much interest in the statements of Senate leaders who visited Springfield, Mass., and other places present at the routine Federal budget for the coming year while holding extraordinary regular expenditures to a "reasonably conservative" figure at 9:30 Thursday morning at 9:30 a.m. Dr. Enoch F. Jail or a \$1,000 fine faces the Manchester Board of Selectmen "sounds a bit startling, but Walter Mahoney of the Manchester Taxpayers' League made this chilling revelation at the Selectmen's meeting last night.

Mr. Mahoney said he had shown a book setting forth the law to Selectman Sherwood G. Bowers.

"Men at the mills have been talking about taking the town figures to Mr. Alcorn to get the 'told-down' on this thing," Mr. Mahoney said. "As a matter of fact," he continued, with the ghost of a smile on his face, "court proceedings face you honest men."

The jail threat vanished into thin air, however, when Town Treasurer George H. Wadwell stated that the aggregate saving on the town budget last year was \$11,000.

HOW EXPLAINS LIST OF SUSPENDED TAXES
