## DUKE AND DUCHESS OFF ON HONEYMOON

### Old London Celebrates Until Early This Morning — Monster Crowds See Royal Pair Depart.

London, Nov. 30.—(AP)—Staid London celebrated until an early hour today the wedding of Princess Marina and the Duke of Kent, while the royal couple were in honeymoon retreat at Hillyear Hall, country home of the Earl of Dudley.

They were received only by servants when they arrived at the large country home last night after a trip through the English countryside before cheering throngs.

Excited crowds in London kept up the celebrations until long after midnight.

Lord Trenchard, chief commissioner of London police, expressed gratification at the success of the handling of the immense crowds and the protection given foreign royalty against possible assassinations.

Home for Christmas

The Duke and Duchess are expected to join King George and Queen Mary at Sandringham for the Christmas holidays. Then they will extend their honeymoon to the continent, traveling ultimately to Italy.

Today is Marina's birthday—her 25th. The Duke will be 32 December 20. The exodus of many of the more than 70 members of visiting royalty here for the ceremony began this morning.

Marina's parents, Prince and Princess Nicholas of Greece, left for Paris accompanied by Prince Paul, regent of Yugoslavia, Prince and Princess Christopher of Greece and the Count and Countess Tsering.

King Haakon and Queen Maud of Norway are remaining for a few days.

Crowds at Station

A huge crowd saw Marina and the Duke off when they left Paddington station on a special train, following the double ceremony at the Angelican at Westminster Abbey and the Greek Orthodox at Buckingham Palace.

The new Duchess wore a fur coat of a green hat when she boarded the train and carried a large bouquet.

The Duke and his Princess were married yesterday with two ceremonies, that of the Church of England in Westminster Abbey and that of the Greek Orthodox in a private chapel of Buckingham Palace.

## WIDOW OF NELSON OBJECT OF SEARCH

### Federal Agents Ordered to Show Her No Quarter — Hamilton Sought.

Chicago, Nov. 30.—(AP)—Find the woman and show her no quarter.

This was the stern order Federal agents were under today as they hunted Mrs. Helen Gillis, 44, found synthetic blonde widow of George (Baby Face) Nelson, leader of the rapidly diminishing remnants of the John Dillinger gang.

Through her capture officials hoped to bring to justice John Hamilton, believed to have been with Nelson's widow when Nelson was fatally wounded late Tuesday in a machine gun battle at Barrington in which Inspector Samuel P. Conway and Special Agent Herman Holtz perished in the government's drive against the Nation's public enemies.

Mysterious Call

There was a growing belief among officials that it was she who was responsible for a mysterious telephone call received by Philip Sadovnik, an undertaker, which led Federal officers to the discovery of the body of the Chicago slayer in a ditch near suburban Niles Center.

Sadovnik is Mrs. Gillis' family undertaker.

### Has Two Children

Mrs. Gillis, 21 years old, is the mother of two children, Arlene 4, who is at the home of Nelson's mother, Mrs. Mary Gillis in Chicago and Ronald 2, reported living with one of Nelson's sisters in Brentwood, Wash.

The hunted woman formerly had brown hair, but is understood to have bleached her hair to blonde.

Government agents stood guard at the county morgue where Nelson's body lay on the same slab that held the body of John Dillinger.

Inspector H. H. Clegg, who flew here from Washington to aid in the investigation of the slaying, said the tale of Hamilton being dead was "unfounded rumor."

"We are searching for him," he said, "and will continue to do so until we have absolute evidence that he is dead."

## HAWAII DENIES RADIO REPORTS OF TIDAL WAVE

### Severe Earthquake Shocks Starts Rumors — Troops Held in Readiness But Nothing Happens.

Honolulu, Nov. 30.—(AP)—A severe submarine earthquake sent alarming radio reports to the states that a tidal wave would sweep the Hawaiian Islands but caused scarcely a stir in Honolulu.

The shock, centered about 2,000 miles at sea, was recorded last night on the seismograph of the Hawaii National Park observatory on the slopes of Kiluaea volcano.

Observers said the disturbance was not a tidal wave, but the possibility was so slight they expected nothing. A midnight deadline (5:30 a. m., eastern standard time) reportedly set by the hydrographic office for the crest of water to sweep upon the islands passed without a ripple of a disturbance was exceedingly rare in this Pacific crossroads.

Reports Unfounded.

Reports that all military forces on Oahu (Honolulu) island were called into the readiness for any possible emergency, were denied at Schofield Barracks, 30 miles from Honolulu.

Most Hawaiians were not even aware of the quake and apparently few heard of the possibility of a tidal wave for life on an island, possibly a bit gayer since it was the close of Thanksgiving Day.

Even Kiluaea volcano, so easily disturbed by submarine earth movements, remained quiet.

Naval radio and amateur operators in San Francisco and San Pedro, Calif., early today reported receiving messages from Hawaii that a tidal wave was started by the earthquake on the island before midnight.

Military forces on Oahu island were reported held in readiness for an emergency.

Later amateur operator Frank Barber, in San Pedro, told of picking up parts of a broadcast from radio station KGU in Honolulu, saying it was a tidal wave had passed their barracks. The broadcast, he said, urged Hawaiians not to become alarmed.

These reports were reported yesterday by talking with the Army radio station at Schofield Barracks, where he said he learned troops were held in readiness for speedy transportation to Honolulu in case of an emergency.

The San Francisco naval radio station received a warning of a tidal wave.

## BABES IN WOODS CASE IS VIRTUALLY SOLVED

### California Man Suffocated His Children, Shot His Niece and Then Commit- ted Suicide.

Carlisle, Pa., Nov. 30.—(AP)—Positive identification of the man found dead in the Pennsylvania mountains as Elmo J. Noakes, of Roselle, Calif., was announced today by Harry L. McElroy, chief of detectives of the state police.

The man was found shot to death with a woman near Altoona, while three little girls believed to be his daughters were found in the woods near Carlisle.

Identification was made through records of the Marine Corps at Washington, McElroy said.

Noakes enlisted in the Marines at Mare Island, California, on April 20, 1920, and was honorably discharged April 19, 1922.

McElroy said Marine Corps fingerprints showed that those of the man found in the mountains and of Noakes were identical.

Carlisle, Pa., Nov. 30.—(AP)—The mystery of "The Babes in the Woods" has been virtually solved.

Authorities were convinced today that the bodies of three sisters and a man and woman slain in a shack near Altoona were those of Elmo J. Noakes of Roselle, Calif., his niece, Winifred Pierce, 18, and his three daughters, Cordeia, 8, Devilla, 10, and Norma, 12.

State police investigators also held the conviction that the man killed in the woods was Noakes.

## FIVE DAYS ADRIFT IN AN OPEN BOAT

### Two Fishermen Lived On Small Keg of Water and Raw Fish.

Canoe, N. S., Nov. 30.—(AP)—Their grueling experience of five days floating helplessly in an open boat, living on raw halibut and a small keg of water, were related by Archie Lundmen and John Rogers, Canoe fishermen as they rested in their own snug cottages today.

At sea since Saturday, when they put out in their motor launch to fish, they were brought home yesterday by the Canadian government steamship Arctura to which they were transferred from the Lumbering sail-banker Ronald J. Kinickie, their rescue ship.

They had been given up for lost after the Arctura and two Royal Canadian Mounted Police planes scanned the territory for a distance of 100 miles along the coast and out to sea, without sighting them.

The Mounted Police seaplane swooped overhead but had no message for them, but they were unable to attract the attention of the pilot.

Bitter Cold

It was bitterly cold Monday night as they drifted aimlessly but hoped the wind would carry them toward Liscomb Light which they could dimly see.

## BOLIVIAN REGIME CHANGES HANDS AS FIGHT IS RENEWED

### NATION'S BUSINESS SLOWER THIS WEEK

### Unconform Report Says President of Bolivia Is Prisoner of His Own Sol- diers — Vice President Directs Affairs — Para- guay Joyful Over News.

(By ASSOCIATED PRESS)

Heartened by an unexpected sudden change of the Bolivian government, Paraguayan forces pressed forward today in the Chaco Boreal, seeking a quick end to the war which has raged furiously for the last two and a half years after half a century of animosity.

Vice President Jose Luis Tejada Serrano of Bolivia issued a decree three days ago in which he declared himself to be in charge of the affairs of the nation. His president, Daniel Salamanca, was absent from La Paz, the nation's capital, at the time, inspecting the Bolivian troops in the jungle battle territory.

Dispatches from Buenos Aires and from Assunção, the capital of Paraguay, indicated that Salamanca had been made prisoner by his own soldiers.

No Confirmation

There was no confirmation of this report from Assunção, however. On the contrary, the Bolivian government announced that the vice president's assumption of powers was "a routine matter." Dispatches from La Paz, today, however, indicated that Tejada Serrano's action was a coup d'etat, for they told of his naming a new Cabinet and said there was "great jubilation" at the setting of the new president.

A strict censorship in Bolivia has prevented all but the most meagre dispatches from reaching the exterior. For Bolivia and Paraguay are engaged in what most military observers believe to be a deadlock. It is for this reason that the League of Nations has asked for an embargo on all future shipments of arms to the two countries.

Because of their landlocked position in the interior of South America and the fealty of the surrounding Republics of Brazil, Argentina, Chile, and Peru, there has thus far been nothing to end the war except the exhaustion of one or both of the participants.

THANKSGIVING DAY QUIET FOR POLICE

Old Custom of Drunks Carrying Home Live Chickens No Longer Apparent.

The oldest policeman in the Manchester police department do not recall any night before Thanksgiving with less trouble from intoxication than any other day of the year. In the old days a chicken could be bought wholesale at farms for not more than 50 cents each. Raffles would be held in the old saloons, pool rooms and other places.
