MERIDEN MAN SHOT IN DINER HOLD-UP

Bandit Orders Proprietor to Turn His Back Before Shot Is Fired — Not Badly Hurt.

Meriden, Dec. 3.—(AP)—Four armed and unmasked bandits held up the Yankee Clipper diner on the Boston Post road at the Meriden-Wallingford town line about 1:15 o'clock this morning and escaped with about \$112 in receipts which they took from the cash register. Jerry A. O'Brien of Rocky Hill, proprietor of the diner, was shot through the right shoulder just before the robbers left and suffered muscle wounds. His condition was reported as fair at the Meriden hospital today. His injuries, which included a fractured rib, were not considered serious.

Elaborate Parade Is Held Here With Weather Bad; Brilliantly Colored Uniforms Add to Spectacle.

SON OF U. S. JUDGE HELD FOR MURDER

Many Conflicting Stories Told Of How the Victim Met His Death.

Tulsa, Okla., Dec. 3.—(AP)—The 19-year-old son of a Federal judge became the center of a strange, death mystery. Facing arraignment in connection with the Thanksgiving day slaying of young John Gorrell, his father, Judge Kenneth Gorrell, admitted slaying but pleaded that he shot Gorrell in self-defense. Such a confession of stories have been told to investigating officers that they are slow to commit themselves to a statement of any single theory as to just what happened. Gorrell's death, Kennerly said, was the father in Franklin E. Kennerly of the Federal Court here, would say only that the shooting of the 23-year-old dental student was an act of self-preservation. He declined to amplify this, saying only that the story would be told at the proper time in court.

FLOODS IN AUSTRALIA MAKE 8,000 HOMELESS

Forty Dead in Worst Disaster in Country's History— Damage Over Five Million.

Melbourne, Australia, Dec. 3.—(AP)—Flooded rivers in the state of Victoria were receding today, leaving thousands of frightened residents isolated, 40 dead and some 8,000 homeless. The state had feared the worst disaster in its history during the rise of waters from the Yarra and other rivers. Damage was estimated at 1,600,000 pounds about \$5,000,000.

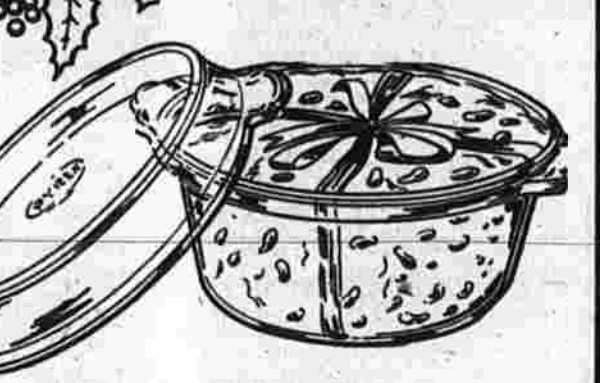
