

# NO WORD RECEIVED OF PACIFIC FLIERS

## 27 Planes and 35 Naval Vessels Aiding in Search for Three Aviators Believed Lost.

Honolulu, Dec. 5.—(AP)—Into a dark drizzling dawn 31 planes took off from Wheeler Field today to resume search for Flight Lieut. C. T. F. Um and his two companions, with only a "bare chance" they could find the Australian fliers who were forced down at sea yesterday in their flight from Oakland, Calif.

Twenty-four naval planes and three Army ships were sent into the open sea. Aviators, experienced in flying the stretches of water between the islands, said they would be "a miracle" if the search planes were able to sight the lost fliers, considering weather conditions.

One aviator doubted that, except by accident, the searchers would find the men, even if they were certain to be within a known area of 50 miles square, adding "the 20,000 square miles to search over. There's just a bare chance, no more."

### SHOW SURPLUS IN WATER DEPT. IN FIRST YEAR

#### Maintenance Cost Is Kept 33 1-3 Per Cent Below the Engineer's Estimate; Interest on Mortgage Paid.

The Manchester Water and Sewer department has completed the first year under municipal ownership with a surplus, after all expenses of maintenance and allowance for depreciation have been deducted, of \$13,812.18, Fred H. Parker, superintendent, said today.

When the utility companies were placed under municipal supervision estimates of probable expense for the year beginning Sept. 1, 1933 and ending Sept. 1, 1934, were given by Bennett & Terry, appraisers of the former Cheney Brothers properties and by Superintendent Parker.

Bennett & Terry estimated that the probable average monthly bill for maintenance would be \$2,446, and Superintendent Parker's estimate was \$2,350 per month. The water and sewer department, in its first year of operation, has effected a saving in maintenance costs of approximately 33 per cent less than the engineer's estimate.

A total of \$54,250 interest on first mortgage bonds, assumed by the town when the utility companies were purchased, and interest on the \$500,000 issue of bonds floated to the purchase, have been paid. This amount, a fixed charge each year, amounts to a little more than \$1,000 a week.

## 200,000 Ton of Rock Topples at Niagara

Niagara Falls, N. Y., Dec. 5.—(AP)—A slice of rock estimated to weigh 200,000 tons dropped from Table Rock of the Canadian Falls here late last night to change the contour of the huge escarpment for the second time within five months. No water was falling over Table Rock when the huge block broke and plunged into the gorge on the Canadian side. The new break was believed to have been from 20 to 60 feet long and about 100 feet wide. The rock which fell was part of a second big fall five months ago, brought down rock 100 feet wide and fifty feet or more deep when they came to the Niagara river. It was estimated the new break was probably caused by erosion by wind and rain.

Had changed the contour of the falls from convex to concave. The pile of rock in the water was visible where it fell when mist and spray cleared momentarily in gusts of wind.

It was the third slide at Niagara Falls in recent years. A large curve developed in the two escarpments in 1931. At that time a slice of rock 150 feet deep and 300 feet wide fell into the Niagara river. It was estimated to weigh 50,000 tons.

# LABOR RACKETEERS SCORED BY KOHLER

New York, Dec. 5.—(AP)—Walter J. Kohler, former governor of Wisconsin, speaking today before a Senate committee on labor racketeering, warned that "labor racketeers" may destroy the economic progress of the United States.

"There is grave danger today that the combined efforts of the possibly sincere theorists advocating the fallacies of spreading employment and making extravagant governmental expenditures, together with labor racketeers who are obsessed with a rule or ruin program x x x may disrupt and destroy the unparalleled economic progress our nation so far has made," he said.

It is essential for our future industrial program that the right of employment be dealt with their employers collectively, in majority groups as well as majority groups.

"It is axiomatic that no general economic recovery is possible if industries are to be held in a state of paralysis by the past year and a half of Germany."
