## U. S. MUST RESTORE WORLD TRADE—HULL

Secretary Tells Farmers If  
Efforts Fail He Shudders  
to Think of What Will  
Follow.

Nashville, Tenn., Dec. 10.—(AP)—Secretary Cordell Hull warned today that if attempts to restore world trade fail there will be an economic "revolution" with civilization slipping back to "lower levels."

Hitting economic nationalism and outlining the State Department's drive to negotiate give-and-take treaties with foreign nations, Hull told the American Farm Bureau Federation.

"The more forward-looking and forward-moving American people are getting themselves for the supreme effort to restore the normal processes and methods and the normal volume of international finance and commerce."

Must Not Fail  
"They must not fail. If they do, I shudder to contemplate the extreme of regimentation as a permanent policy, with a revolution in our economic life—with greater unemployment and lower living standards, and increasingly lower levels of civilization, which would inevitably result."

Picture a world in which trade is stifled by tariffs, quotas, exchange restrictions and other barriers which 80 per cent of the people live "around or below the poverty line," he said sternly everywhere must return to "economic sanity."

World Trade  
Declaring world trade normally should be 50 to 60 billion dollars instead of less than 15 billion, as now, he said the "American people have still enough ingenuity, initiative, vision and determination to secure 15 to 20 per cent of this normal volume."

## JAP FREIGHTER SENDS OUT SOS; 2 VESSELS NEAR

Captain and Two Mates  
Killed by Waves—Vessel  
Helpless in Storm, Mes-  
sages Report.

New York, Dec. 10.—(AP)—Ships stood by the disabled Japanese freighter Victoria Maru, 500 miles north of the Azores today, ready to take up her crew.

The Victoria wallowed helplessly. Her captain and two mates had been killed by smashing waves which swept away the bridge and damaged the radio.

Mackay Radio received a message which said that the Pacific Trader, captained by Karl Chasen, and the tanker Amsterdam, operated by the American Petroleum company, had reached the stricken vessel and were standing by.

The message read: "Motor vessel Pacific Trader, Karl Chasen, and Dutch tanker Amsterdam are alongside Victoria Maru. No one taken yet."

Indications were that the two ships were waiting for the storm to abate somewhat before rescuing the crew of the freighter.

THREE OFFICERS KILLED  
New York, Dec. 10.—(AP)—A headless horseman of the sea, the Japanese freighter Victoria Maru, rode ashore today in a gale today with captain and chief officer, dead, the third officer lost and seven of the crew injured.

O S messages, intercepted by the United States navy, said the ship was wrecked on a reef and was being destroyed by mountainous waves. The last message reported from the vessel was "No danger."

"I am alone but present conditions are not dangerous."

From the starboard story told in a message received from the vessel, it was deduced that the stricken vessel was in the Azores.

Believe Accord Near  
Geneva, Dec. 10.—(AP)—Nicolai Titulescu, foreign minister of Rumania, poured oil on the troubled waters of Hungarian-Yugoslav relations today by telling the League of Nations council that Yugoslavia's appeal against Hungary in no way questioned the national honor of Hungary.

Since Titulescu is a recognized leader in the Little Entente of Yugoslavia, Rumania and Czechoslovakia, his words were regarded as in the nature of an official olive branch.

The statesmen present in the Council chamber were hopeful that Hungary would follow Yugoslavia's lead in accepting a League plan for settlement of the dispute between Yugoslavia and Hungary.

Then France introduced the draft of a treaty providing for the creation of an international Criminal Court for the repression of Terrorism. It would be permanent and would consist of five members.

Then Titulescu, in his speech, delivered an ironic indictment of Hungary in general terms, then evoking laughter from the public galleries. President Vasconcelos demanded silence.

The Rumanian foreign minister scoured Hungary for not preventing the military drill of Terrorists and accused Hungarian authorities of "indifference and negligence."

## CRIME CONFERENCE TO OPEN TONIGHT

Over 750 Persons Arrested  
in Federal Raids Against  
Narcotics Over Week-end.

Washington, Dec. 10.—(AP)—President Roosevelt assumed today the leadership in the Nation's drive against the underworld.

More than 750 persons seized in a "Big Push" against the narcotics evil, unveiled hearings from coast to coast the President wrote a speech on the crime situation for tonight's opening of Attorney General Cummings' crime conference.

Five hundred delegates including some of the foremost criminologists, judges, lawyers, sociologists and officers are here for the four-day meeting. The aim will be a closely knit program to make the country more law abiding.
