\$4,000 IN DIAMONDS STOLEN IN NORWICH

Bandits Also Get \$500 in Cash and \$472 Check - Minister Forced to Lie On Floor.

Norwich, Dec. 12.—(AP)—Two unmasked bandits forced three men including a minister to lie on the floor, face downward for 15 minutes today during a jewelry store holdup and then fled in an automobile with diamonds valued by the owner at \$4,000, \$500 in cash and a check for \$472.

The robbers, armed with sawed-off shotguns, entered the store, located in the Franklin street store of Lee Clegg of virtually full value of diamonds. Police were told they fled from their automobile with New York license plates.

Threatening Clegg and his clerk, A. C. Brian with his gun, one of the robbers ordered the pair to "lay on your faces."

Makes Threat "I'm just itching to do some shooting," he warned. "Don't move or I'll blow your brains out."

While the robbers were collecting their loot, the Rev. Percy A. Kilminster, pastor of the First Baptist church, entered the store, located in the business center.

Unperturbed by the minister's appearance, one of the robbers said "come here, pal."

Mr. Kilminster was then forced to lie on the floor alongside Clegg and Brian.

The robbers who entered the store at 10 a. m., narrowly missed two pedestrians and another automobile during their flight.

FOUR N. E. MOVIE HOUSES ARE WRECKED BY BOMBS

Two in Boston, One in Pawtucket, R. I. and One in Lynn, Mass.—No One Injured.

Boston, Dec. 12.—(AP)—Explosions ripped out the interiors of four moving picture theaters early today, and sent the bomb squads of three Southern New England police departments into action.

The theaters bombed were wrecked by planted bombs and were the Majestic and Tremont in downtown Boston, the Capitol in Pawtucket, R. I., and the Capitol in Lynn, Mass.

Shortly after 4 o'clock this morning an explosion at the Capitol theater, Pawtucket, R. I., wrecked the concrete projection booth and tore great chunks from the walls and ceiling of the auditorium.

Just before 5 a. m., a dull rain came from the interior of the Capitol theater in Lynn, Mass., and investigators found the basement rest rooms torn apart.

JUDGE SCORES UNITED STATES PENAL SYSTEM

Calls It "Purposeless, Hazardous, Cruel and Disgraceful"—Tells of Experiences in Texas.

Washington, Dec. 12.—(AP)—The American penal system was called "purposeless, haphazard, cruel and disgraceful" today by Judge Joseph C. Hutcheon of the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals.

Previously, the attorney general's crime conference heard Scott M. Lottin, president of the American Bar Association, urge annual national conferences and selection of judges for criminal courts who are "fair and unbiased."

He said that in the southern districts of Texas where he examined "two medieval and barbarous and not contrary to the ordinary principles of democracy and social justice that I was shocked beyond expressing my disapproval."

FEDERAL TRADE COMMISSION SITTING IN HARTFORD BEGINS ITS INVESTIGATION

Hartford, Dec. 12.—(AP)—Carrying out a Congressional mandate, the Federal Trade Commission today began its investigation into the activities of the United States here today by beginning with a fact-finding hearing on the activities of Connecticut dairymen and co-operative organizations.

The original resolution leading to the hearing was introduced in Congress by Representative Herman P. Koppenhaver.

Minor exchanges marked the morning session in the Federal building when the first subpoenaed witnesses, Clifford E. Hough, were examined by trade commission counsel as to the activities of the largest milk group in the state, the Connecticut Milk Producers Association of which Hough was general manager until two years ago.

WALLACE DEFENDS ADJUSTMENT PLAN

Secretary of Agriculture Declares Crop Reduction Worked Out Well.

Washington, Dec. 12.—(AP)—Secretary Wallace defended the agricultural adjustment program today in his annual report to President Roosevelt as one of "democracy" aimed at balanced advance.

His report dealt principally with the work of the adjustment administration since June 30, selected work of the Department of Agriculture and emergency activities carried out during the year in cooperation with other government organizations.

Emphasis was placed on the fundamental philosophy behind present activities, particularly those of adjusting farm production.

If restriction of farm production conflicts with democracy it should be abandoned, he admitted, "but man's right to live transcends all other considerations."

Farmers were united behind passage of the adjustment act, the secretary declared, and are still supporting and participating in its functions through county associations.

THREE CCC BOYS BURNED TO DEATH

Flames Destroy Camp and Make 200 Others Without Shelter—Four Injured.

Norris, Tenn., Dec. 12.—(AP)—Fire which broke out in 10 degree weather at the Clear Creek CCC camp near Norris dam, early today burned three CCC boys to death, swept through the camp and left over 200 others shivering in their night clothes.

Four CCC workers were slightly burned as they fled from their bunks. The camp is located on a hillside and a high wind carried the fire through it almost before officers could give the alarm.

A tentative check was made by calling the roll and Lieut. L. G. Finger said the following were missing: Jacob Klein of the Bronx, New York City.

END OF DEPRESSION BY NEXT JULY SEEN BY CHARLES DAWES

Former Vice President Makes Prediction After Completing a Survey Made of Former Depressions.

Chicago, Dec. 12.—(AP)—Charles G. Dawes, vice president of the United States under Calvin Coolidge, predicted today that next June or July would mark the death of the depression and the commencement of full business prosperity for the nation.

His confidence shattered by the market crash of October 29, 1929, was restored by President Roosevelt's bank moratorium in March, 1933, said Dawes.

Since that time, he asserted, the general course of business in consumer's goods has reflected no loss in the recovery of confidence.

Dawes, former head of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, and for years a power in the Republican party, issued a long bulletin to address the Chicago Association of Commerce.

Sometimes early next summer, said Dawes, will be a delayed rush for durable goods which will herald a period of great recovery.

"The demand for durable goods, especially heavy durable goods, is in depression, while it always rises last, always rises fastest," said Dawes.

"When that rush comes in the beginning of real prosperity."

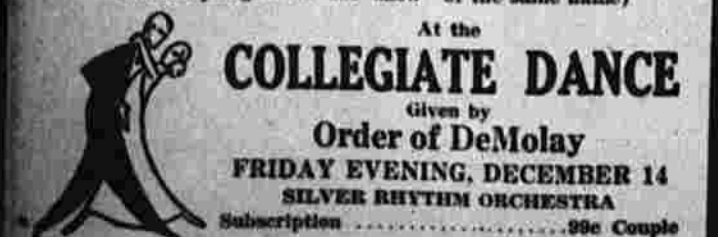

"Rank? Rank? Never heard of  
him."

And yet that same Joseph  
Rank is probably the richest  
man now alive in England. He  
is another proof of the fact that  
the light is not always on the  
stage.

World War, one of the richest  
men in the world. He is the  
owner of "millionaires." He  
is making a fortune more than it does  
in America. In Great Britain it means  
the possession of one million pounds  
sterling—or about \$5,000,000.

With the name of many of his  
country's millionaires the average  
Englishman is familiar. They give  
grandiose parties and are men-  
tioned in the papers. Or they donate  
to famous charities and are  
ultimately rewarded by being given  
a knighthood, a baronetcy or some-  
times even a peerage. But there are  
others who seldom are mentioned in

die and it is announced the British  
treasury has had another big "wind-  
fall." This means that it has re-  
ceived a vast amount of money from  
death duties on the man's big estate.

Rank still lives at 80  
Rank is still alive and at 80  
is going strong. He is one of those  
eccentric stories that in some aspects  
resemble that of America's "self-  
made men."

Rank was born at Hull. His  
father owned a small flour mill  
about 70 years ago when the  
bits of the flour of the land was  
ground in the picturesque windmills  
which then still dotted the coun-  
tryside of the country. At 14, being  
paid a tiny stipend, he started to  
work for his father.

When his father died, he left  
him \$2,000. With that he bought an  
old stone mill in Hull which he  
produced two sacks of flour per  
hour. The thrifty Rank saved \$30-  
40 and then started another mill  
in his home town. But being a wide  
awake, far-seeing young man, he  
perceived that the day of the old  
stone grinders was over. He equip-  
ped his new mill with steam-  
driven rollers he could afford  
and began to do business in a big  
way. It was costly to ship  
London. But it was costly to ship

four to the metropolis. So he opened  
a bigger mill in London. He never  
looked back. Gradually he built big  
mills in strategic points all around  
the island—Liverpool, Cardiff,  
Northampton, Birkenhead and Bel-  
fast over in Ireland.

Today the man who started  
with a tiny mill which turned out  
two sacks of flour per hour, controls  
mills which turn out 175,000 sacks  
per week or about 6,000,000 per an-  
num. In other words, his flour alone  
would give bread to one in every  
seven persons in the British Isles.

A few years ago he wanted the  
property of Associated London  
Flour Mills, Ltd., which in turn  
owned six other big flour concerns.  
He got what he wanted and he paid  
a cool ten million dollars in cash for  
it.

Most wealth has not changed his  
habits. He lives in a simple house  
at Regent. For years he taught in  
the Methodist Sunday school. Ask-  
ed for the secret of his success, he  
said, earnestly:

"I take anything to prayer, I  
always succeed."

He has been the biggest fi-  
nancial asset of the Methodist church  
in Great Britain. It estimated that  
he has given the church at least  
the money valued at ten million  
dollars. His method of giving is  
simple and princely. A few years  
ago he showed him the rather  
poor balance sheet of the Methodist  
Aged Ministers' Fund. His response  
was to sit down and write out  
checks for \$500,000. If the Methodist  
church today has millionaires in  
need of England's industrial cities  
and in the dreary East End of Lon-  
don, it is largely Rank's money  
which has built them.

PREMIER FLANDIN IS AIR-MINDED

France's New Leader, a War Aviator, Is Still a Reserve Officer.

Paris—(AP)—Keeping up with the modern pace, France, in Pierre-Etienne Flandin, has the most air-minded premier in her history and now has two cabinet members who can fly their own planes.

A licensed pilot in 1912 at the age of 23, Flandin was a war aviator in 1914, participating in the French operations of the Yser. He still holds his license and is an officer in the air reserve.

He's a Sportsman All through his political life he has been an ardent champion of the development of French aviation and has served on numerous international air committees as well as being president of the Aero Club in 1920.

An enthusiastic sportsman, he drives his own car and likes to play tennis with his wife and children. Not only is he the tallest man in his cabinet—he stands almost 6 feet 4 inches—but he is the youngest member and one of the youngest in the history of the third republic.

Only one premier was younger—Leon Gambetta, hero of the war of 1870, who became head of the government at 41. Only two other premiers ranked in youth with Flandin: Maurice Rouvier in 1897 and Camille Chautemps in 1920, all reaching the political pinnacle at 45, Flandin's age.

Silk Hats Scarce The new cabinet is not the "wild hat" model. Most of the members wear fedoras, though Flandin and his minister of marine, Francois Perri, are partial to berets.

At least three of the ministers are noted for their sartorial eccentricities. Louis Marin, minister of the state, always wears a flowing silk tie and in winter wraps a heavy woolen muffler around his neck outside of his overcoat. Pierre Laval, the foreign minister, is noted for his shaggy white tie.

Georges Mandel, minister of posts and telegraphs, wears a high, old-fashioned choker collar with sharp wing that is the delight of caricaturists. Pierre and Henry Roy, minister of public works, also go in for wing collars but of less imposing height.

All of the ministers except Mandel have mustaches while there is only one beard, that of Henriot, minister of agriculture. About half the cabinet is bald.

### STATE'S GAS USE RUNS TO BILLION CU. FT. IN YEAR

Final and complete statistics issued by the American Gas Association pertaining to the manufacture of gas in all of the states in the Union, where manufactured gas is used (many states have natural gas available), reveal many noteworthy facts concerning the manufacture of gas in Connecticut. In the first place, the figures show that last year Connecticut produced a total of 10,023,000 cubic feet of gas, more than half of which or 5,135,000 cubic feet was purchased from the Koppers plant at New Haven and widely distributed by means of a long distance transmission pipe line.

The total gas manufactured at the plants of Connecticut utilities, not including the purchased supply from the Koppers plant, amounted to 4,898,000 cubic feet. Of this amount, 3,768,000 cubic feet consisted of "water gas" and 1,130,000 cubic feet of "blast gas," both methods of gas manufacture being widely used in Connecticut.

Also shown in the American Gas Association's official statistics was the fact that at the end of the year Connecticut utilities had 288,290 customers with a total of 289,520 meters. The population served by these companies was estimated at 2,501,000, reached by 2,652 miles of main.

To manufacture the ten billion cubic feet of gas made in Connecticut last year, the public utilities, exclusive of the Koppers plant, used a large amount of fuel of various types. The fuel most consumed in the manufacture of gas is "water gas" which was 91,000 tons, followed by "blast gas" which was 25,000 tons. The remainder of the gas was made in various plants in burning coal and 21,800 tons were purchased. Anthracite coal in burned was 7,900 tons.

### MUNITIONS PROBE RUNS UP CURTAIN ON SECOND ACT

Washington. — With the second act of the munitions investigation show now in progress on the side of Capitol Hill some idea as to probable policy of the government toward this industry should be forthcoming before the hearings are concluded on December 21.

What is it to be?

Should there be created a government monopoly? Should Uncle Sam attempt to half or regulate international traffic in arms? Or should the government curb profits of American arms and munitions manufacturers?

Senator Nye of North Dakota, chairman of the senate's special committee conducting the inquiry, feels that the government should not merely exercise rigid control, but should own and operate munition plants.

Nye's convictions are so strong that he has served notice that if his special committee refuses to recommend legislation to this end he will do so personally.

Another view of the question is that to receive serious consideration is that expressed by the E. I. du Pont de Nemours Co., one of the nation's largest manufacturers of munitions.

The du Pont company objects strongly to a government monopoly. It suggests legislation permitting the export of arms from this country only after the view of orders by a federal government commission as to the conditions may determine international traffic in arms, declares the du Ponts, can be done away with only by agreement between all producing nations.

Acting through Hugh R. Wilson, minister of Switzerland, the department already has presented to the bureau of the disarmament conference at Geneva a draft treaty providing for international licensing and supervision of the manufacture and traffic in arms.

The administration's belief, as expressed in this treaty proposal, is that such a move should "shed light into murky corners" and "go far in eliminating many of the evils" of the arms traffic.

### USE FHA LOAN TO CUT HEAT COSTS

#### Poor Construction Causes Ill Health Through Drafts.

Poor construction and inadequate insulation result in increased heat costs, drafty conditions and consequent ill health. Funds procurable at private financial institutions under the Federal Housing Administration's Modernization Credit Plan are being used to correct these conditions through alterations, repairs, and modernization.

Studies made by experts have shown that heat loss occurs in all portions of the building, in some instances greater than others. For example, tests have revealed that of all escaping heat, 40 to 60 per cent goes directly through walls, floors and roofs; 15 to 30 per cent leaks through cracks and crevices, and 20 to 25 per cent is conducted through windows and doors.

In order that the building may be airtight, it is essential that the walls of the superstructure and the roof be carefully inspected and repaired. Insured modernization loans for doing this work are available under the terms of the Federal Housing Administration.

Cracks in stucco and masonry walls should be caulked; broken blocks, stones and bricks replaced; and disintegrated mortar joints pointed. Wooden walls may be tightened up by nailing and replacing old and worn-out pieces. If the siding is old and has not received proper attention, so that it is in bad condition, it should be replaced.

When installing new siding insulation placed under the siding or between studs gives added protection against the transmission of heat and cold.

All cracks and holes in and around door and window frames should be caulked. Defective parts should be replaced and in many cases new window frames should be installed. Weather-stripping is one of the best methods of preventing heat and cold transmission around windows and doors. Storm sash gives much added insulation and prevents condensation of destructive moisture on the inner window panes.

Many cracks and crevices can be closed by a new coat of paint. If properly put on at the same time. All warped, cracked, broken and loose roofing, irrespective of type of material, should be replaced, and if the roof is in a bad condition, it should be covered with new roofing material. A new roof can be placed directly over the old one, thus increasing the insulation properties of the roof. Insulating material placed under or between the rafters assists in preventing heat losses through the roof.

FRANCO-SOVIET ARMY PACT LIKE PRE-WAR LINEUP

Balance of power, that old European device which failed to consolidate peace sufficiently to prevent the world tragedy of 1914, again has reared its head across the Atlantic. Statements in the French Parliament that France and the Soviet Union have a military understanding, that the Red army will be at France's disposal in Germany attacks, constitute the clinching evidence so far as many observers of foreign affairs are concerned. "Russia has a strong and well-equipped army which she offers us in case of conflict with Germany," said Leon Archenbald presenting a new war budget to the Chamber of Deputies. "These men were shown as think-

ing in the terms of 1914 rather than those of 1920 when there had followed and their determination of peoples had become as yastatic and the world hoped that the "war to save democracy" had accomplished its object. Today dictators take the place of monarchs. Hereditary power still is at a discount but the daily lives of millions are, in some cases, as closely ordered as in the time when "divine right" reigned.

Twenty years ago when the world conflict was in the making there were fears and forebodings, military secrets and spy scares. So today. Political opponents fled across frontiers in those days, plotted the overturn of administration, justified the use of arms against "tyrants." So they do today. The most question, then as now, was to have become an international terrorist, subject to extradition, trial and sentence.

Old Alliances Respear There were closely similar backgrounds to the crime of Sarajevo in

1914 and the assassinations at Marceller on October 9. In pre-war Europe there existed the triple entente of France, Russia and Great Britain. ASKS DOCTORS TO HELP CUT LABORATORY COSTS

Hartford, Dec. 12.—(AP)—Dr. Stanley H. Osborne, state commissioner of health, has asked the physicians of the state to cooperate with the department in an effort to cut down the expense of laboratory work. Physicians are asked to complete and forward to the department a questionnaire in which they indicate the number of specimens, if the examination is essential, and further whether it could be sent to a city or local hospital laboratory.

Dr. Osborne points out that if the volume of specimens continues through December at the rate indicated thus far in 1934, the examinations will total 193,317, an increase of 11 per cent over 1933, and 36 per cent over 1932. The increased work has been carried on, Dr. Osborne states, with no increase in laboratory personnel since 1931, although examinations have risen 35 per cent during that time.

NEW HOUSING PHASES GIVE PLAN IMPETUS

Important developments in the administration of the National Housing Act are expected to give decided impetus to the Federal Housing Program during the winter months, the construction industry believes.

Coupled with new building anticipated under the long-range mortgage insurance program of the Federal Housing Administration, business men believe the threat of competition from new housing will have the effect of stimulating widespread repair and modernization of existing properties in owners—particularly landlords—seek to combat the inducement offered by these newly built homes.

Shop, Look And Listen In Manchester

Under the revised regulations an entire family's gross income may be taken as the basis of a modernization loan. Heretofore, it had been required that the borrower have a "some-thing" source of annual income at the time of application at least five times the annual payments. This section now reads: "The maker (or husband and wife jointly, or other members of the family, if agreed) must have a stated bona fide gross annual income at the time of application, or sufficiently in prospect, to satisfy the financial institution, equal to at least five times the annual payments."

Improve Vacant Land

Another important change permits the construction of property up to \$2,000. Previously, loans could be made only for the improvement of property on which some sort of structure already existed. The number of pieces of property on which an individual borrower may negotiate loans is now unlimited, whereas before the maximum was five.

Loans of this type may now be extended over a period of five years at the discretion of the lending institution. Heretofore, final maturity has been three years, with a possible five-year term allowable by specific authorization of the Federal Housing Administration. Delinquent taxes no longer are an absolute bar to modernization credit. The regulations now provide that the bank may use its own discretion in extending credit, the status of taxes, assessments and payments on principal and interest of mortgage not affecting the eligibility of a note for insurance.

CONSTRUCT FIRE RESISTING GARAGE

The hazard of fire in a garage is ever present, although few property owners appear aware of the fact. The partition walls between the garage and the house should be built of a fire-retarding material and the windows, doors and frames should be fire resisting.

The walls to be fire-retarding should be of brick, tile, masonry, plaster on metal lath, or other fire-retarding material. If wood frame construction they should be fire-stopped at top and bottom by placing wood or chain between the studs. Where left open these hollow spaces act as a fire and spread the flames. No insulation placed between the studs or on to close these spaces will also help. The clear walls of the garage may be studded treated to further prevent this hazard.
