ASSESSMENT MAY COST TOWN \$31,000 THIS YEAR

Town Meeting Appropriated \$13,000 for Assessors and Then Gave Special Budget of \$15,000 for Re-valuation — Clerical Cost May Add \$3,000.

Unless the FEPA approves of paying for clerical help to assist the assessors, the town will have to pay for the revaluation of Manchester property, it will cost the town a total of \$31,000 for its assessment program in 1935, Town Government officials admitted today.

The Appropriations Committee at the town meeting appropriated \$13,000 for the regular assessment work, and \$15,000 additional for the revaluation survey, making a total of \$28,000. However, it was stipulated by the J. M. Clemenshaw company, in submitting the \$15,000 bid, that if the town employed clerical and stenographic help, the company would charge \$3,000 for the job.

It is not at all certain that the FEPA will pay for the hiring of clerical to assist the professional appraisers in the revaluation work. In that event the town would have to meet the cost, bringing the revaluation expense up to the \$31,000 appropriation for the regular assessment work.

The town's total cost would be \$31,000 to the town if the FEPA bid is live on its expiration.

Expect Some Demands

Taxpayers keeping a sharp watch on town expenditures have indicated today, might demand that if the contingency should arise in which the town would be forced to pay for the clerical help, the \$3,000 extra be taken out of the regular assessment appropriation. Thus the total appropriation of \$31,000 would not be exceeded.

war Congress should write a blank check," Harris replied.

Probably the most significant aspect of medical work in 1934, particularly in the United States, was the increasing attention given by the medical profession and by the general public to the problem of better application of medical care to more people.

This interest culminated in the appointment by President Roosevelt of a medical advisory board with a technical advisory staff. These are given to the President's Committee on Medical Security suggestions as the best means of providing all the people with suitable medical care.

From the point of view of public interest, the most significant occurrence of the year was the holding and successful rearing of five baby daughters of Olive Thomas near Shell, Ont., under the care of Dr. A. R. Dado.

This is the first record of such an occurrence in the history of medicine. Quinlan has been born previously, but never successfully reared for as long as six months.

The Nobel prize award in medicine for 1934 went to three Americans—Mrs. Minot, Murphy and Whipple—for their researches leading to establishment of the fact that liver and liver extracts will save the lives of persons with pernicious anemia, a condition formerly considered fatal.

The most important epidemics of the year were infantile paralysis in California, which affected some thousands of people and waned with the coming of cold weather; dysentery, affecting cities in New Jersey and an amebic dysentery, which originated in Chicago.

Perhaps the most important single medical observation was the determination of the existence in the human body not only of hormones, or glandular principles which affect growth and function of the body, but antihormones, which limit the action of the hormones.

New Serums, Extracts, Found During 1934

Dr. Morris Fishbein, Herald Medical Expert, Reviews Medical Advances During the Past Year in the United States.

By DR. MORRIS FISHBEIN, Editor, Journal of the American Medical Association.

The rise of infantile paralysis, one of the most feared diseases affecting human beings, is a greater cause of search for methods of prevention and treatment. Already centers have been established for collection of blood serum from persons convalescing from this disease. Such serum is believed to have merit in control of the disease.

Anticipating the return of another great epidemic of influenza, investigators throughout the world continue to search for the causative agent and some specific method of prevention.

Serums to control epidemic brain fever, called sleeping sickness, and parrot fever, or psittacosis, were announced, but are still to be suitably evaluated. Investigators also announced serums said to be effective against the bite of the black widow spider, modifications of the serum used against meningitis and against a universal disorder.

At the same time, work leading toward development of active principles from various glands, probably held the center of interest. In Philadelphia, J. G. Rowntree announced in animals an extract of the adrenal gland developed by Dr. A. M. Hanson of Minnesota. This extract produced normal size in dwarfed rats. The work seemed to show that active principle of the cortex of the adrenal gland was a substance found in the extraction from the kidney field was devoted to a substance found in the secretion from the kidney, which was a hormone.

A new antiseptic called phenylmercuric nitrate was found of special value in treatment of infections, the body resistance breaks down with fungicidal, such as the ringworm that causes athlete's foot.

Another chemical substance, sodium formaldehyde sulphoxylate, was found to be an efficient antidote for narcotic poisoning.

In the surgical field, special attention was paid to operations for the relief of high blood pressure of unknown origin. One of these operations consisting of cutting of the nerve roots in the spine, and another of dissecting away portions of the

adrenal glands.

Much attention was paid also to operations on the thyroid gland—some to take strain and push off the heart.

Improvements for studying changes which go on in the body and also in surgical technique were developed in profound. New devices for illuminating internal organs and a thermoscope, as described, that it can measure changes in temperatures between inhibition of the internal organs.

Again it should be pointed out that disease change, exactly as do human beings. A form of anemia called chlorosis, extremely prevalent 100 years ago, has practically disappeared. Epidemic diarrhoea in children are disappearing, due to improved methods in infant feeding and control of infection.

Perhaps because of increasing sobriety, cirrhosis of the liver is becoming rare. Such infectious diseases as yellow fever and plague have been stamped out of the United States, and malaria and pellagra appear in only a few places.

Among the great physicians who died during 1934 was Dr. William H. Welch, a medical investigator, who was the original discoverer of the relation between white blood cells and related diseases with overcoming this relation.
