



(AP) — More than a year after the Victorian government bought a cottage here as the "boyhood home" of Captain James Cook famous eighteenth century explorer, the local parish council says Cook never saw the house.

The Australian state paid \$4,000 for the house, tore it down stone by stone, and shipped it to Melbourne for reserection as a part of the centenary celebrations.

The parish council's doubts about the cottage have just been voiced as an obelisk was to be unveiled here marking the site. It lept its allence before because it wasn't consulted when the sale took place.

Capt. Cook joined the British navy in 1755, the year when the parish council claims the house was built by his parents.

"It is doubtful," the council has said in a statement, "whether Capt. Cook ever visited the cottage during his parents' residence there."




