Consolidated Gas, American National and North American managed to recover some of the losses sustained in small fractions, but the market was not very active.

Standard Oil of New Jersey came to the fore as a result of a report that the company was planning to purchase a large amount of stock in the company.

Life insurance stocks were active, with American Telephone and Telegraph leading the way.

Among the industrials, General Electric, Westinghouse and International Paper were active.

The railroads were active, with the Great Northern and the Northern Pacific leading the way.

Foreign exchange rates were active, with the dollar showing a slight gain against the pound.

Gold prices were active, with the price of gold showing a slight gain.
