Charge of Tampering Made in Lindy Case

Flintington, N. J., Dec. 24.—(AP)—Demands for a new jury panel for the trial of Bruno Richard Hauptmann for the slaying of the kidnaped Lindbergh baby were contemplated by both defense and prosecution today following charges of tampering with the present panel.

Prosecutor Anthony M. Hauck charged that a pamphlet entitled "No Criminals Exposed. Lindbergh baby kidnaped and murdered" had been mailed to each of the 100 prospective Hauptmann jurors.

The pamphlet author, Mrs. Mary Bell Spencer of Chicago, said it was written two years before Hauptmann's arrest "to poke fun at Prosecutor Hauck's charge that a malicious and deliberate effort had been made to tamper with the panel."

C. Lloyd Fisher, associate defense counsel asserted he would demand a new jury panel and an official source disclosed that the state may join in the demand.

Fisher disagreed with Hauck's assertion that the pamphlet was "prejudicial to the state's case but not to the defense."

"We hold it just as prejudicial to our case for that matter even more than it is to the prosecution," he said.

State's attorneys arranged to meet in Trenton today Hauck said to discuss action on the incident.

REPUBLICANS DENY REPORTS OF 'DEAL'; HAVE OWN TICKET

Senate Probers Report War Department Underbid Private Firm on War Sales to Mexico.

Washington, Dec. 24.—(AP)—Senate investigators of the arm-trading today have uncovered evidence that the United States government has engaged in the international munitions business by selling arms to foreign nations in competition with private manufacturers.

They said they planned to all this bearing in January. One bit of evidence already collected by the committee was sufficient to show that in 1929 the War Department sold rifles and ammunition to Mexico, over the protest of the Winchester Arms Co., which was trying to make the sale.

Committee members said as a surprise to the investigators, in view they said of previous indications that the military departments of the government had cooperated closely with American arms in making foreign sales.

This is not only one case of government sale of arms and ammunition abroad. It is expected that J. Kenneth Bradley of Westport will be picked for leader, with John F. Lynch of West Haven and Kenneth P. Cramer of Waterbury considered for the post of president.
