It is to be hoped that the bill, whose content is a typical one, does not expect any high degree of credit for this measure of sympathy with the old age pension movement, because, if he does, he will probably be disappointed. It is rather difficult to imagine any representative or any citizen, even a veritable Old Bore, who would openly object to state pensions for the aged if they could be provided right out of the air or paid for with money that, like the Biblical manna, fell from heaven—and could not be utilized for any purpose.

There is nothing broad, nothing human, nothing civilized to that willingness granted to the aged a modicum of self-respecting security that would cost the rest of us nothing or so near nothing that we should not notice it. Not until we have reached the plane where we are ready to assume some tangible measure of self-sacrifice in such a cause can we lay claim to any virtue at all in the adoption of an old-age pension system.

Of all the opinions that have been expressed on this subject of pensions none is more convincing, in its sturdy transparency than this one: "Oh, of course, I am in favor of old age pensions—if I know where the money is coming from."
