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SMITH'S GARAGE
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WAPPING PEOPLE PLAN A FIRE DEPARTMENT

Believe Several Costly Blazes in Last Year Could Have Been Stopped by Apparatus.
The number of fires occurring in Wapping during the past year in which houses and barns have burned without any chance of their being saved because of lack of water, has resulted in a movement toward the formation of a fire department.

It is possible now to purchase fire fighting apparatus of light construction, especially adapted to rural communities, which will carry in containers water of sufficient quantity to do much good if used in time. People in Wapping recall a number of fires during the past year where the buildings could have been saved if there had been such a supply of water. A fire on the Windsorville road about a year ago which destroyed a residence, a tobacco barn and a warehouse was one case where a supply of water such as is carried in one of these small fire fighting machines, would have saved the home and warehouse.
