

HAUPTMANN SEEN IN HOPEWELL

EXPECT SOCIALIST SENATORS TO VOTE WITH REPUBLICANS

Will Do So Unless Democrats Revise Their Slate to Meet Approval of Gov. Cross, Is Report.

Hartford, Jan. 8.—(AP)—Unless the Democratic slate of Senate offices is revised to meet the approval of Governor Cross, the three Socialist Senators were reported today as disposed to cast their three votes with the fifteen Republicans tomorrow and enable the latter to organize the Upper House.

The three-day convention will meet tonight to decide on a course of action if the early balloting in the Senate tomorrow indicate that both the Democrats and Republicans intended to stand by their respective slates indefinitely.

In that event, it was said in Socialist quarters, it is expected that the Democrats and Republicans would solicit Socialist support with promises of desirable legislation and if they failed to do so, they probably would "deal" with the Republicans.

This situation was conceded as probable by some Democrats, who nevertheless had not abandoned hope that Secretary of State John A. Danaher would rule that a plurality vote was sufficient to elect a slate or that the Republicans would decide to negotiate with the Democrats rather than the Socialists.

Aged Man Saw Suspect in Auto on Day Child Was Kidnaped and Slain, Turn Into Road Leading to the Flier's Estate—As He Points at Hauptmann Lights in Courtroom Go Out—State Fails in Attempt to Get Ladder Into the Evidence—Fingerprint Experts Testify.

Bulletin: Flemington, N. J., Jan. 8.—(AP)—John Pymore, New York taxicab driver, today identified Bruno Richard Hauptmann as the man who hired him to take a sofa to Dr. John F. Condon during negotiations for the return of the Lindbergh baby.

Flemington, N. J., Jan. 8.—(AP)—An aged former neighbor of Colonel Charles J. Lindbergh pointed a finger at the accused Bruno Richard Hauptmann today and declared he saw him near the Lindbergh home on the day Charles Augustus Lindbergh, Jr., was stolen from his crib and slain.

The witness, Amasaus Lindbergh, 87, identified Hauptmann as a man in a dirty green automobile who parked his home on March 1, 1932, turned into the Lindbergh road and "stared at me as if he saw a ghost."

The dramatic surprise—brightened by the extinguishing of the courtroom lights just as the old man pointed his finger at Hauptmann—was sandwiched between two other highlights of the morning session.

The state failed in its second attempt to get the ladder down which it contends the baby was carried to its death into evidence, and the defense pursued a vigorous attack on the efficiency of the New Jersey police after two state troopers testified they could find no fingerprints on the Lindbergh nursery, on the ladder, or on the ransom note which Lindbergh found on the nursery window sill.

BALANCE OF POWER

Probably there never before has been an occasion when, on the very eve of the inauguration of a President, the General Assembly, informed politicians were so far apart as to expect in the way of party ascendancy.

As everybody knows, the Democrats have seven members in the Senate, the Republicans fifteen and the Socialists three. The possibilities are that party or what coalition will be able to organize that body and control the immediate Senate patronage and indirectly control the appointments in the state government.

Apparently everything depends on the course of the Senate. We know nothing of what is in the minds of new legislators, but the New York Times correspondent in Bridgeport, where the caucus takes place, says with relation to the caucus non-nonsense for present pro-tempore and clerk of the Senate, that the Socialists are opposed to the Democratic slate.

If all three Socialists could cast in their lot with the Republicans they could, of course, knock into a cocked hat all the Democratic plans for the filling of several very important commissions. This Democratic coalition, however, now occupied by Republicans, with Democrats for their appointees, though nominated by the Governor, must be approved by the Senate before they can become office holders. Also there would be a sudden alteration of the scheduled displacement of any Republican office in the event of a change in the majority of the Senate.

Whether there is really any likelihood of this kind of coalition between the Republicans and Socialists we have no idea, but in this we may be pretty sure of one thing—that the Socialists will expect a good deal more than a "thank you" for their services.

One thing they may be pretty sure to demand would be the repeal of all ripper legislation affecting their own city—an objective to which they are naturally committed in any event since they are continuously bampers their Socialist confere, Mayor McLevy, in his efforts to administer the affairs of Bridgeport.

Altogether, the situation at the opening of the 1935 Legislature is an odd one, with actually the major interest and the greatest amount of speculation centering on the behavior of a third party which has no members at all in the lower house and only three in the Senate.

WARNING TO CONGRESS

In declaring unconstitutional that particular section of the National Recovery Act which delegates to the President the power to prohibit the exportation in interstate or foreign commerce of petroleum or its products in excess of permitted quantities, the Supreme Court has rendered a decision whose implications doubtless will be widely misinterpreted.

Nowhere in the opinion is there even the remotest intimation that the government of the United States has no Constitutional right to create laws to effect such a control over the oil industry or any other. What the court does find unconstitutional is the complete delegation of authority to effect such control to the President without even setting up a definite standard of purpose by which he must govern himself, or other words—the Constitution.

Congress in this particular section abdicated its law-making powers in favor of the President, and against its kind of proceeding the Supreme Court sets its face with practical unanimity. The only dissenter, Jus-
