NO TIME FOR DEADLOCK

Yesterday's all-day battle over the resignation of the Connecticut Senate, while conforming to tradition—even historic conceptions of correct party loyalty and honorable determination to fight to the finish for practical political advantage, was decidedly questionable wisdom; its continuation to the point of a real deadlock would be, in the existing state of affairs in the state and country, exceedingly unfortunate.

This newspaper is frankly Republican in its party sympathies. It is, however, willing to face the fact that the voters of Connecticut, by a substantial plurality, last November elected a complete Democratic administration and that, at the same time, they left the Republican party in a minority in the Senate, with the Democrats in possession of the largest representation in that body.

There would seem to be, therefore, a question that such mandate as was given in that election, for the administration of State affairs, was bestowed upon the Democratic party.

This being the case there is excellent reason to deplore the wisdom of any movement on the part of the Republican party calculated to take away from the successful Democrats the full powers of administration—or the responsibility.

During the two terms already served by Governor Crohn—with it may be remembered, that the majority of the chief executive has had a perpetual ail for the inadequacy of his administration in allegations of hamstringing and interfering with the Republican body in the Senate. Nothing can be much more certain than that, in the event of a deadlock or a compromise of obligation of a Democratic free hand in the administration and Senate, we shall have two years more of this same hamstringing—and nothing accomplished.

It is an open question whether the Republican party in this state will not be doing better service to the state of Connecticut, and to its own eventual credit, if it yields to the logic of the situation and permits the Democrats to govern the Senate without condition or compromise; to assume sole responsibility for the administrative end of the state government for the next two years. Perhaps the wisest thing that could have been done yesterday would have been for the Republicans after the first ballot for Senate electors, to switch their entire voting strength to the Democratic candidate. Necessary this is written before the convening of the Senate today and will not be printed until after regular legislative hours, but at the moment our hope is that this will be the course adopted today.

It is, in some ways, even to be regretted that the Republican majority in the House of Representatives is so large and so immutable; because never until the Democratic party of Connecticut has been granted the complete control of the affairs of this state for at least one two-year period for the people of the commonwealth receive a full and convincing demonstration of the incapacity of that party to govern and affairs of a state like this—of the quality and purpose of the men who steer its course, and direct its policies. And such a demonstration is very badly needed indeed.

Against any proposal to hang on, by trick or device or technicality, to state offices to which new incumbents have been legally elected should be discontinued by Connecticut Republicans; and of course will be if the matter is not already settled.

His economics is as simple and as primitive as that of Robin Hood, consisting of just the one principle—take it away from the rich and give it to the poor. He is a pronounced proponent of the poor. Huey is a very devil of a fellow with the mass and for the time being, he appears to be inflexibly entrenched.

The man is an oak, a clown, a demagogue—but if any politician believes he has a useful type to be made of, he let that man get hold of a copy of the Congressional Record of January 7 and read the speech he made on the Senate floor relative to the implied Presidential threat to withhold pay from the judges if some of the so-called "Long" laws were not repealed.

Like most of such people, who do not in the least appear to be interested in the rights of the citizenry or departing from it for the furthering of their own purposes, the Kingfisher doesn't in the least care for the rights of any movement or any movement of the citizenry. Whether the Justice Department could get rid of 3,000,000 job grabbers or other beneficiaries who have got rid of one-third that number is less important than the fact, which pretty much everyone will accept, that it would get rid of a lot more undesirable than the Labor Department ever would.

To the politicians of Mr. Dies measure we heartily subscribe.
