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CONNECTICUT RIVER BREAKS OVER BANKS

At Hartford It Reaches Its Highest Level Since 1927 With Crest Still Above Capital City.

Hartford, Jan. 11.-(AP)—Freaking over its banks to flood lowlands of the state, the Connecticut river this morning reached its highest point since 1927.

The rate of rise decreased from five to six inches an hour last night to one-tenth of a foot an hour today.

It was expected to reach Holyoke about 2 p. m. today and Hartford about midnight tonight.

At Holyoke, 27 m. in the river was still rising on the average of a foot an hour.

Developments thus far in January, added the survey, "only have served to intensify the brightness of the outlook for the coming year."

"Low inventories" in practically all divisions, the spreading demand for merchandise of good quality, and the rising employment totals will contribute forcibly to accelerated production and distribution even before the current quarter will have closed.

Instead of dwindling, as was expected, demanding the broad scope to which buying developed during December, consumer demand has become constantly stronger thus far in January.

"Running contrary to the trend in December, industrial operations now are being upward at a swifter rate than during the total year."

"The response to January clearance, which featured retail activity, was more generous than reported during the last three years, but below that of the previous December prices contributed heavily to the week's total. In spite of less favorable retail conditions, sales were pushed somewhat ahead of last week's total."

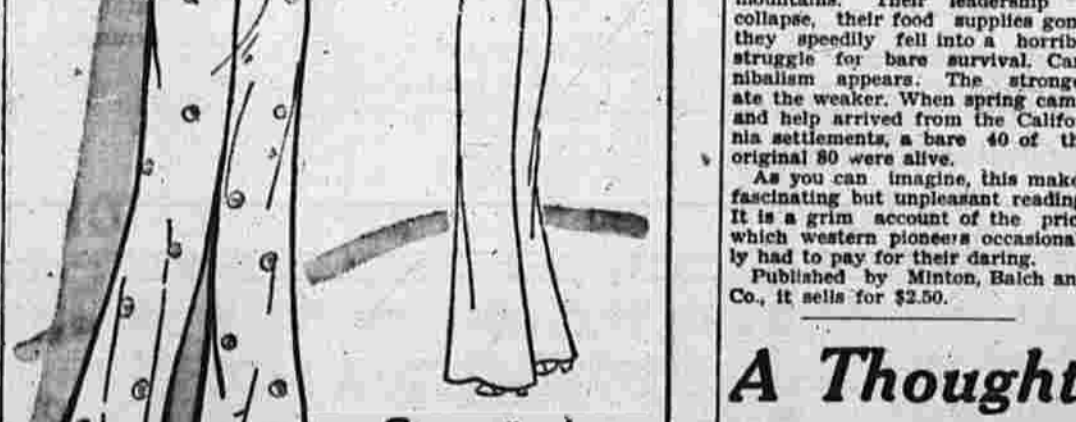
