

EXPERTS IDENTIFY BRINO AS WRITER

Three More of State's Witnesses Positive That Suspect Wrote All of the Ransom Notes.

Flemington, N. J., Jan. 16.—Three more state experts today testified that Bruno Richard Hauptmann was the writer of the Lindbergh ransom notes, but the defense—striking again at the dead leader Fische—scored slightly in a fight to establish differences between Hauptmann's admitted handwriting and that found in the notes.

One after the other Harry E. Cassidy of Richmond, Va., Wilmer Bond of the United States Bureau of Standards, and Albert P. Osborn of New York took the stand and declared if their positive opinion Hauptmann was the ransom note writer, the son of the first, Albert P. Osborn, who gave his testimony last week.

Cross-Examined

Bonder, in cross-examination, acknowledged differences between certain letters and words in the notes as compared to Hauptmann's admitted writings, but insisted "there is no discrepancy which indicated a different writer in all these documents."

His acknowledgment of differences between certain "da" certain "ts" in the writings, and his admission that he had not, though he examined 8,000 papers in the case, compared two writings of the word "Fische," caused the prosecutor to ask him:

"Has anything been brought to your attention by opposing counsel which in any way changes your opinion on the writer of these documents?"

"No," Bonder said.

Strongest Point

The state considers the handwriting evidence one of its strongest weapons for placing Hauptmann in the kidnaping and murder of Baby Charles A. Lindbergh, Jr., who was stolen from his crib on the night of March 1, 1934.

The expert Osborn revealed shortly before the noon recess that it was he who prepared the material for dictation to Hauptmann after his arrest. Three dictated specimens were used by all of the experts as a basis for comparison with the ransom notes.

Here is what the experts said:

Cassidy: "If Mr. Hauptmann wrote those ransom writings and standard writings, I feel compelled to say he wrote those ransom notes."

Bonder: "If Mr. Hauptmann wrote the ransom writings and the admitted writings, he also wrote the ransom documents."

Osborn: "In my judgment, based upon these standards, Bruno Richard Hauptmann wrote all the ransom notes."

The defense, which is openly trying to implicate Fische in the writing of the notes, bore down on the position of Hauptmann's hand in the notes, which, who died in Germany of tuberculosis March 17, 1935, was by Hauptmann as the real owner of Hauptmann's gear.

Secrecy Veiling Fisches' Arrival Pierced By Camera

Washington, Jan. 16.—(AP)—The Department of Justice identified those killed today by Federal agents in a machine gun battle at Oklawaha, Florida, as the outlaw, "Ma" Barker, and his mother, known as "Ma."

Both were wanted for the abduction of Edward G. Bremer, St. Paul banker, a year ago tomorrow. The reports of the department from the battleground said the two Barkers were the only ones who took part in the encounter with the Federal agents.

None of the 15 Federal agents who surrounded the home in Oklawaha was killed or injured.

When "Ma" Barker fell, the department said, she was holding a machine gun in her hand and part of the drum of cartridges had been exhausted.

230,000 Ransom

Bremer was kidnaped on January 17, 1934. Taken from St. Paul, he was released on February 7 near Rochester, Minn., after the payment of \$200,000 ransom.

At that time the department of Justice named Arthur "Doc" Harvey, believed to be a relative of the Barker-Karpis gang, as the man who had been in charge of the Barker-Karpis gang at large in the United States.

Text of the President's message said that the Justice department has practically obliterated the Dillinger and "Pretty Boy" Floyd gangs.

"Ma" Barker has been mentioned as the brain of the gang, and was said to have directed it in a number of bank robberies throughout the middle-west.

The Barkers' home is in Oklawaha, Fla., and was shot up by machine guns, sawed-off shotguns, revolvers and tear gas bombs.

Although named principally in the abduction of Bremer, Justice officials let it be known that inquiries would be made to determine whether the gang had been responsible for the kidnaping of William Hamm, also of St. Paul, Ransom of \$2,000,000.

JOIN THE WORLD COURT IS ROOSEVELT'S PLEA

Appeal of President To Congress On Court

Washington, Jan. 16.—(AP)—In a national address to the American people, President Roosevelt today asked the Senate in a special message to ratify American adherence to the World Court.

The brief presidential message said that the United States has been invited to join the League of Nations and the World Court, and that the President has signed the necessary ratification.

Mr. Roosevelt asserted that for years both Republicans and Democrats have favored the World Court. He said that the United States has a special interest in the World Court because of its position as a world power.

The protocol for adherence to the Court was before the Senate as of the date of the President's message. The Senate has not yet acted on the matter.

GOVERNOR CROSS TO ASK QUICK ACTION ON RELIEF

To Send Special Message On Subject to Assembly Tomorrow—Present Act Will End on Feb. 1.

Hartford, Jan. 16.—(AP)—An early attack by the General Assembly on the problem of relief, appeared probable today under the stimulus of a special message from Gov. Wilbur L. Cross.

With the Legislature already facing a busy and possibly a troublesome day, because of committee assignments, the appointment of Senate messengers and doorkeepers and the tedious question of Democratic leadership in the Senate, the Governor's office announced a special message would be sent to the General Assembly tomorrow.

The chief executive said his message would ask immediate enactment of a bill which would extend indefinitely the unemployment relief act which was enacted in 1932.

Under the proposed relief legislation the Governor said he proposed to recommend the creation of a state corporation to utilize Federal funds available for rural rehabilitation and the continuation of the present emergency relief commission headed by Newton C. Brainard.

Socialists Demand

The Socialists were reported as ready to demand that the relief act be extended to include all unemployed persons on the emergency relief commission which was designated January 1, under a bill enacted in 1932.

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REICH TO ACT AS 'NURSE' WHILE SAAR REORGANIZES

Will Take a Long Time Before Territory Can Stand On Its Own Feet, Says German Expert.

Berlin, Jan. 16.—Germany for a long time to come must play the part of "nurse" to the Saar after its reorganization with the Reich, Dr. Oskar Wengler, the government's economic expert on Saar questions, said today.

"Saar workers and entrepreneurs," he said, "will have to be protected and guided hand in hand with the Reich before they can stand on their own feet in the new economic formation."

Dr. Wengler, who is the right-hand man of Joseph Buerckel, the minister for Saar affairs, made no secret of the fact that "regal and economic problems of the Saar will be the most difficult to solve."

Near the border of Saarland, the German government is being prepared to counter the first real obstacle in the one hundred anniversary of the Communist troops led by Generalissimo Chiang Kai Shek to prevent the junction of these Reds with the Communist forces in Southeast Asia.

After tramping their crimson path across China the Communists have been milling throughout Northeastern Kwachuan and Western Hunan seeking weak points in the military barrier thrown up along the middle upper Yangtze River.

Szechuan Provincial forces were reported concentrating in the Wuliang valley, 50 miles east of Chungking, where the main Red thrust was expected. Preparations were being completed meanwhile for a joint drive of Provincial and National armies against the 60,000 Reds in Southeast Szechuan. This area has become an important Communist base as a result of the collapse of the Red domain in other provinces.

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THEATER BOMBED IN PORTLAND, ME.

Estimated Damage of \$1,500—Manager Knows No Troubles With the Unions.

Portland, Me., Jan. 16.—(AP)—A bomb wrecked the Casino Theater, one of the Loew chain here early today and increased police apprehensions that it was another in a series of New England theater bombings. The blast occurring at 3:25 a. m., shattered the window in the theater and ripped off plaster and laths from walls and ceilings in upper and lower lobbies. No one was hurt.

Fire Stone, manager was emphatic that the management had experienced no labor trouble. He said he had received no threats against the theater but in view of the bombings of other New England theaters he had exercised caution.

In Business Section

Occurring in the heart of Portland's business section, the explosion awakened residents in nearby apartments and hotels.

Captain Harry B. Powers of the Portland police department said the bomb had been made of gunpowder and placed behind a fire extinguisher on the second floor near the projection booth.

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HANNIBAL BEGINS TWINN CELEBRATION

Home Town of Famous Historian Starts a Year Long Memorial Event.

Hannibal, Mo., Jan. 16.—(AP)—Hannibal played anew today with the memory of its beloved son, Mark Twain—and of his creation, Tom Sawyer and Huckleberry Finn.

From the summit of Center Hill, the home of many of the Tom Sawyer antics, a 75-foot light house cast its rays on homes below by Samuel Clemens, who as Mark Twain, the humorist and philosopher, was the plaudits of the world.

The memorial light house was illuminated last night in a centennial ceremony by President Roosevelt as he touched the golden key to the White House at Washington, D. C., on the one hundred anniversary of the birth of Clemens.

From his place atop the hill the light shines down on the boyhood home of Mark Twain and on the spot where stood the home of Huckleberry Finn.

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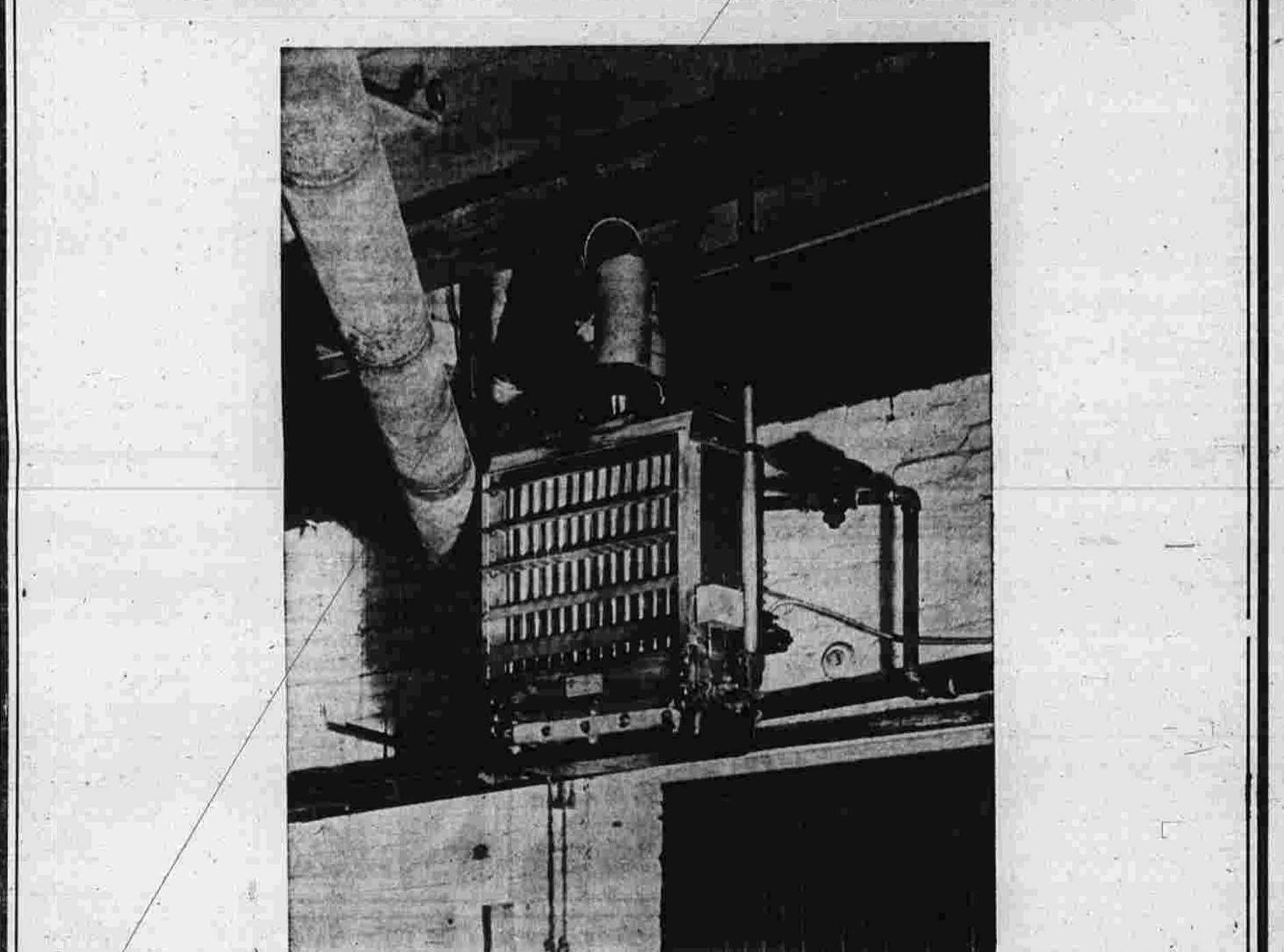

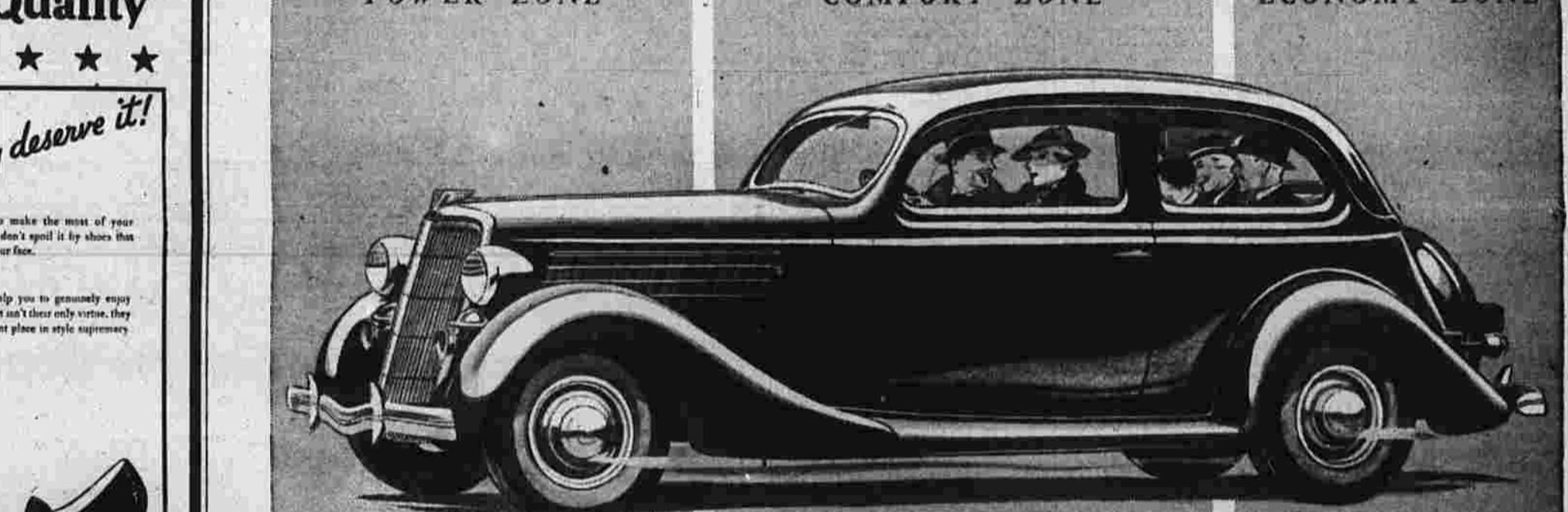
