BANDITS ROB MAIL TRUCK OF \$129,000

Four Machine Gunners Hold Up Car in Heart of Fall River and Escape With Registered Mail.

BULLETIN! Boston, Jan. 22.—(AP)—John J. Broolin, chief of the New England postal inspection division, today announced a \$10,000 reward for information leading to capture of the five bandits who took \$129,000 in the mail truck robbery at Fall River.

Fall River, Mass., Jan. 22.—(AP)—Four machine gun bandits held up a United States mail truck here today and escaped with registered mail valued at more than \$129,000. A post office official who declined to permit the use of his name indicated the loot might exceed that sum.

Postal inspectors of Boston opened an immediate investigation to determine the exact amount involved. It was believed that the loot included a shipment of money from the Federal Reserve Bank in Boston. The bank customarily ships funds to member banks by registered mail, but officials in Boston, refused to comment.

Two men armed with revolvers, leaped aboard the small truck, en route from the railroad station to the post office at the French Hill intersection in the northern section of the city. The driver, Herbert E. Reid of Fall River was ordered to drive up beside street and park alongside a car occupied by two men armed with sub-machine guns.

The original members would serve one, two, three, four and five years, respectively. Subsequently, appointments would be for five years, the commission would be empowered to name a director of old age pensions who would serve as an administrative officer.

The bill set forth the cost of age pensions "shall be borne entirely" by the state, until and unless the Federal Congress shall pass old age pension legislation, granting old age pension laws or old age security.

Should a Federal old age pension measure be passed, the bill provided that the Federal contribution when paid shall be made available to the Connecticut old age pension fund and the appropriation by the state to said fund shall be determined by the amount of old age contributions.

The bill was introduced by Senators J. Kenneth Bradley, Republican, Albert R. Eccles, Socialist, and Julius Tremblay, Democrat, and Representatives Daniel Hickey, Republican, Thomas Shea, Democrat, and Jack C. Bergen, Socialist.

PENSION BILLS, ALL IDENTICAL, FACE ASSEMBLY

Measures Call for Payment of \$7 a Week to Persons 65 or Over; Appropriation of Two Million Is Sought.

State Capitol, Hartford, Jan. 22.—(AP)—Six identical old age pension bills, sponsored by the Connecticut Association for Old Age Security, were deposited today on the clerk's desk in both branches of the Assembly.

The bills introduced by Republicans, Democrats and Socialist legislators at the request of the committee, called for payment not more than \$7 a week to persons 65 years of age and over. Legislation on special cases, beneficiaries may receive additional grants not to exceed \$300 a year.

Payable Weekly Pension would be payable weekly beginning January 1, 1936. To finance the program for the biennium ending June 30, 1937, the measure asks for a \$2,000,000 appropriation.

Although a head tax of \$2 a year was suggested by Governor Wilbur, the bill provides for the creation of an old age pension commission of five members to be appointed by the Governor.

2,000 JAPANESE TROOPS ATTACK CHINESE TOWNS

Airplanes and Artillery Used by Nipponese to Subdue Chahar Province Communities; Surprise Move.

Shanghai, Jan. 22.—(AP)—Chinese dispatches from Kalang received here today said 2,000 Japanese and Manchoukuo soldiers attacked two towns in eastern Chahar Province.

The report said Tuhshou, a town near the Chahar-Jehol border had been bombed from the air and shelled by artillery. Other attacks, the dispatches said, were launched against Kuyuan and Tungchete, described as "places with Chahar Province."

Recent reports from China have expressed uneasiness over the military situation in Chahar Province. The Japanese announced that Sung Chen-Yuan, provincial chairman of Chahar, had sent forces under his command across the Manchoukuo border into Jehol Province, formerly part of China.

A Japanese communique stated that a squadron of Sung's cavalry raided a Manchoukuo outpost near Pailin January 15, and carried off 40 Manchoukuos.

On Jan. 20 an official Chinese spokesman said there had been several hours of fighting on the Jehol-Chahar border between Chinese frontier troops and forces composed of Japanese and Manchoukuos.

Today's dispatches were the first reports, however, of any organized fighting using airplanes and artillery. The reported hostilities came as the Japanese navy was engaged in a campaign to dig itself out of the face of steadily falling stocks that promised to continue all day. More than \$200 million—half of the regular garbage removal force—was lost.

EXPERT LINKS LADDER WITH BOARD IN ATTIC

SAYS PRESIDENT GIVEN HITLER'S POWER BY RULE

Liberalized "Gag" Rule for Consideration of Huge Public Works Resolution Adopted by House.

Washington, Jan. 22.—(AP)—The liberalized "gag" rule for consideration of the \$4,880,000,000 public works resolution was adopted today by the House.

The procedure adopted permits offering of amendments to limit the President's power but bars any affecting his right to administer the funds as a lump sum.

Although Republicans and some Democrats demanded that Congress pass on now the measure, administration leaders held enough Democrats in line to put the rule over the top.

Charges that the measure gave Roosevelt the power of Hitler and Mussolini were made by Representative Lathrop (R., N. Y.), during the debate.

Capital Active Under the capital hummed today with activity surrounding such of President Roosevelt's special projects as social security, \$4,880,000,000 for work relief and World Court adherence.

The President himself stated to the press emphatic opposition to the proposal of Senator Norris (R., Neb.), that a two-third Senate vote be required on any proposition affecting this country to be submitted to the World Court.

At the Capitol, Secretary Perkins assailed the To-morrow old-age pension plan with its \$200 a month payments to persons over 60 as "fantastic." Saying it would take half the national income and reduce the surplus to zero.

ARTHUR J. KOEHLER TESTIFIES

One of Uprights and Wood from Floor in Kidnap Suspect's Home Were One Piece and Cut in Half.

BULLETIN! Flemington, N. J., Jan. 22.—(AP)—Arthur J. Koehler, government expert, testified this afternoon that one of the Lindbergh kidnap ladder uprights and a board from the attic floor of the Hauptmanns' Bronx home "at one time were one piece and they were cut in half."

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After acknowledging that he had examined an upright from the ladder known as "rail 16," Koehler said: "I found the nail holes in the attic joists corresponded and the grain of the wood was the same as the board there."

The board he referred to was an exhibit in the evidence. It came from the attic of Hauptmann's Bronx home and had been next to the place from which the state charges the ladder upright was sawn.

Defense pique at the testimony could not cross-examine Koehler on his qualifications. Luncheon recess prevented this being done immediately.

Trooper Lewis Bornmann of New Jersey and two New York police carpenters testified that a rail fitted into a space from which a board had been sawn in Hauptmann's attic. The nails, they said, could be pushed into the railing holes with the fingers.

Prosecutors feared the defense fight on Koehler's qualifications, if prolonged, might delay their case and prevent their resting until tomorrow.

FEEL RELIEF BILL WILL GO THROUGH

Foes of Secretary Ickes, However, Claim Victory in Arbitration Fund.

Washington, Jan. 22.—(AP)—The foe that Secretary Harold Ickes has made on Capitol Hill claimed a victory today on reports that he would not be the arbiter of the \$4,880,000,000 fund to transfer the institute from the dole to public works.

This was a major program of Roosevelt, in which dissenting House Democrats wrung from the party leadership a compromise on a plan to run a \$4,880,000,000 relief and work measure through Congress, under strict party rules.

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MCLEVY ASSAILS REHABILITATION

Denounces Program Advanced by Gov. Cross as Creating 'A Favored Class'

Hartford, Jan. 23.—(AP)—With Mayor Jasper McLevy's denunciation of the proposed rehabilitation program for Connecticut as one that would create a "favored class" still ringing in their ears, legislators today could not forecast when the bill would be reported.

The measure and the need for rehabilitation was greater in the rural communities. Several witnesses before the committee described the creation of a Connecticut rehabilitation corporation, the proposal contained in the bill, as a fundamental requirement if the state would be eligible to receive Federal funds for rehabilitating certain classes of needy families.

Major McLevy said the plan as outlined was too limited and aided only a few people. Dring that the proposal should be given every serious consideration and deeper study" he said further.

The Socialist said he favored aiding distressed families already on farms but suggested a program of home building and repair for the urban centers would help city dwellers more than transplanting them on subsistence farms.

"The proposal," he said, "builds up a favored class and forgets the masses."

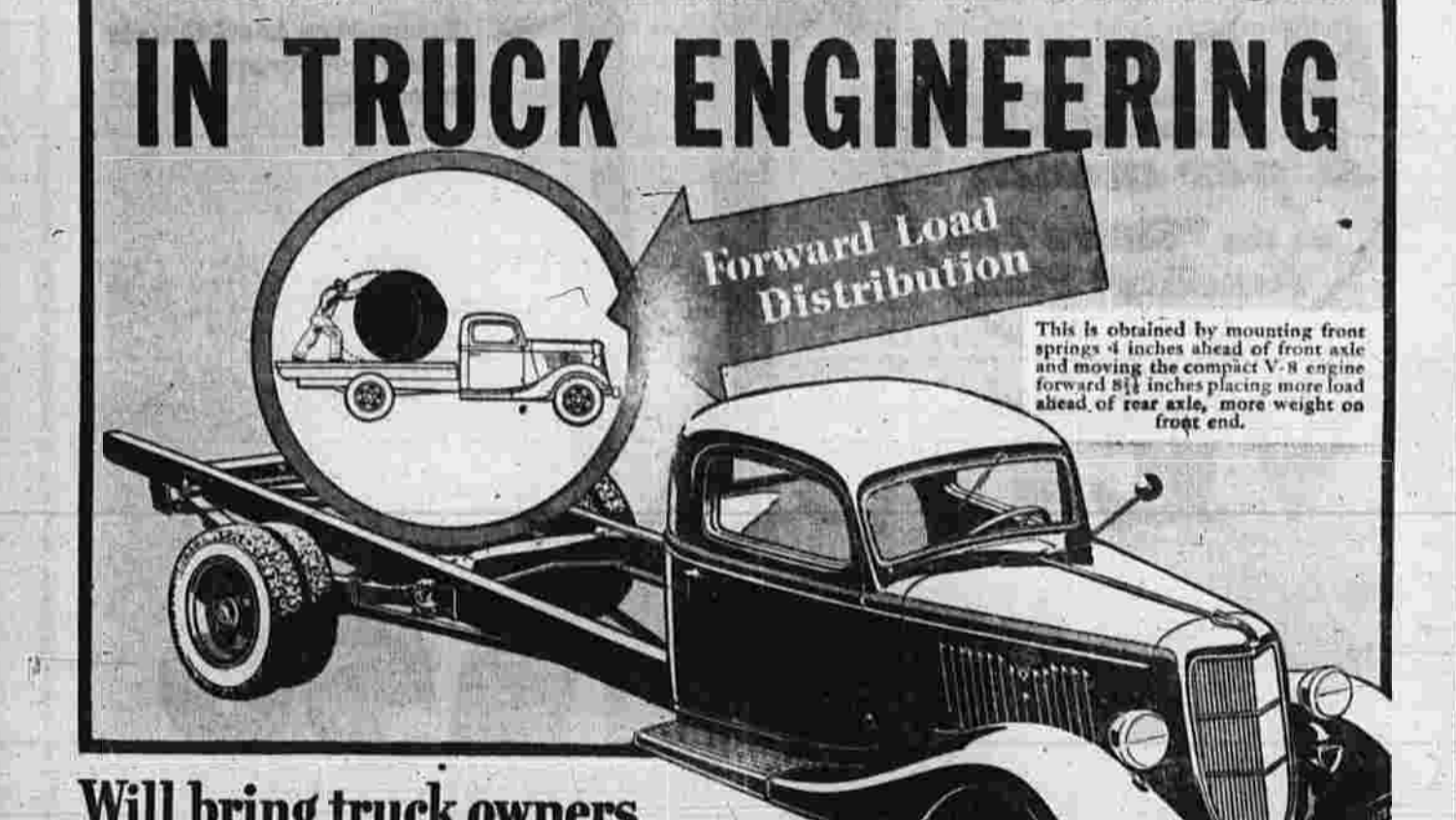
