New York, Jan. 28.—(AP)—American opera singers are crowding the stage for foreign artists as growth in money over unfavorable currency exchange and salary reductions.

"If it were not for other engagements," said Lawrence Evans, manager for several singers, "many foreign artists would find it unprofitable to stay in America."

Evans mentioned Mrs. Elizabeth Rethberg as having made a similar statement to him. Lauri Schwaner, Wagnerian tenor, has expressed the same view.

## WATER MAINS NOT AFFECTED BY COLD

The cold weather during the past few days has not had the same effect on water pipes as it did last February when many water mains were frozen.

To the surprise of the Manchester Water Company, that supplies water north of the Turnpike, has not had one frozen main and the lateral leading into the homes have not given any trouble, like last year.

This condition is considered as being caused by the early falls of snow and the ice that formed. The ground was covered and as it formed a blanket over the earth prevented the frost from sinking into the ground and did not reach the water mains or laterals.

In the territory covered by the South Manchester Water Company, now owned by the town, there has been less trouble in the past than in many other places because of the depth at which the pipes are laid.

The fact, too, that there is no case, a larger water main and that the water supply comes through a cast iron pipe rather than towards a lead pipe, has kept the water in free circulation in the pipes and has prevented a freeze up.
