Washington, Feb. 11.—(AP)—A surprise witness told the Senate subcommittee today that it is the opinion of the "Big Three" ship building companies that they had not consulted with each other before 1923 naval contracts were let.

William M. Flook, former chairman of the board of New York Shipbuilding Corporation, called as the main witness, stated that in the middle of July, the time that the Cord corporation came into possession of a 99 per cent share of the organization.
