NEW INTERPRETATION OF STATE LIQUOR LAW

Individuals Buying Tickets to Dance Are Regarded as Patrons, Not Guests.

Hartford, Feb. 25.—(AP)—Deputy Attorney General Charles McGowan has advised State Police Commissioner Anthony Sweeney that when a club buys tickets for individuals who purchase public tickets without paying for entrance, such individuals are "patrons" rather than "guests" and are within the meaning of the liquor control act. In instances where a member of the club or club trustee specifically invites a person or persons for the purpose of entertaining, that person does not constitute an individual who is invited into the club and consumes wine and beer on the premises. The clause in the act which reads: "who enters the club as an individual or individuals," is interpreted to mean that the individual is invited into the club as an individual and not as a member of the club.

New York, Feb. 25.—(AP)—Financial markets opened with both the bulls and bears today, with the latter apparently receiving the most attention. Stocks were moderately active in the early hours, and with the exception of scattered utilities, the list pointed somewhat lower. 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BOARD NAMES AS PROFITING SURVEY SHOWS COMPANIES

Ability to Reduce Hours, Increase Wages Without Suffering Loss in Sales.

Washington, Feb. 25.—Reporting on earnings in the silk and rayon industry in 1934, and the first eight months of 1935, the Federal Trade Commission said today that the industry has shown an ability to reduce hours, increase wages without suffering loss in sales. The report covered four out of the six largest rayon companies. It found that the industry had reduced its operating hours by 25 per cent during the second half of 1934, but had not reduced its production. The report also found that the industry had increased its wages by 10 per cent during the same period, but had not increased its production. The report concluded that the industry had shown an ability to reduce hours, increase wages without suffering loss in sales.

SELL "BABY BONDS"

AT P. O. HERE SOON
 Offering Begins March 1, It Is Announced—To Bring 2.9 Per Cent.

Postmaster Frank C Crocker today was in receipt of instructions from Washington regarding the sale of United States Savings Bonds, Series "D" known as "Baby Bonds," which will be available on March 1 at the local office.

The issue price of the bonds will be \$25.00. The rate of interest will be 2.9 per cent. The bonds will be redeemable on the date of maturity, but may be cashed at any time after they have been issued for one year.

The bonds may be redeemed before the date of maturity, but will be subject to a 5 per cent penalty if cashed within 90 days after the issue date, at the option of the purchaser. No interest will be paid on the bonds, but the purchase price will be refunded as soon as the investment yield of 2.9 per cent per annum, compounded semi-annually if the bonds are held to maturity.

If the owner exercises his option to redeem his bond prior to maturity, the yield will be less, varying with respective redemption values. The savings bonds will be transferable and will be payable only to the owner whose name is inscribed on them. They shall not be subject to any state or local laws or regulations unless specifically exempted therefrom by the United States or hereafter imposed by the United States or hereafter imposed by any local taxing authority except estate or inheritance taxes, graduated income taxes, known as surcharges and excess profit taxes.

In Springfield the bonds will be purchased by postal employees through the Post Office Employees' Credit Union, which will handle the financing for the bonds outright. There is no such union in Manchester, however.
