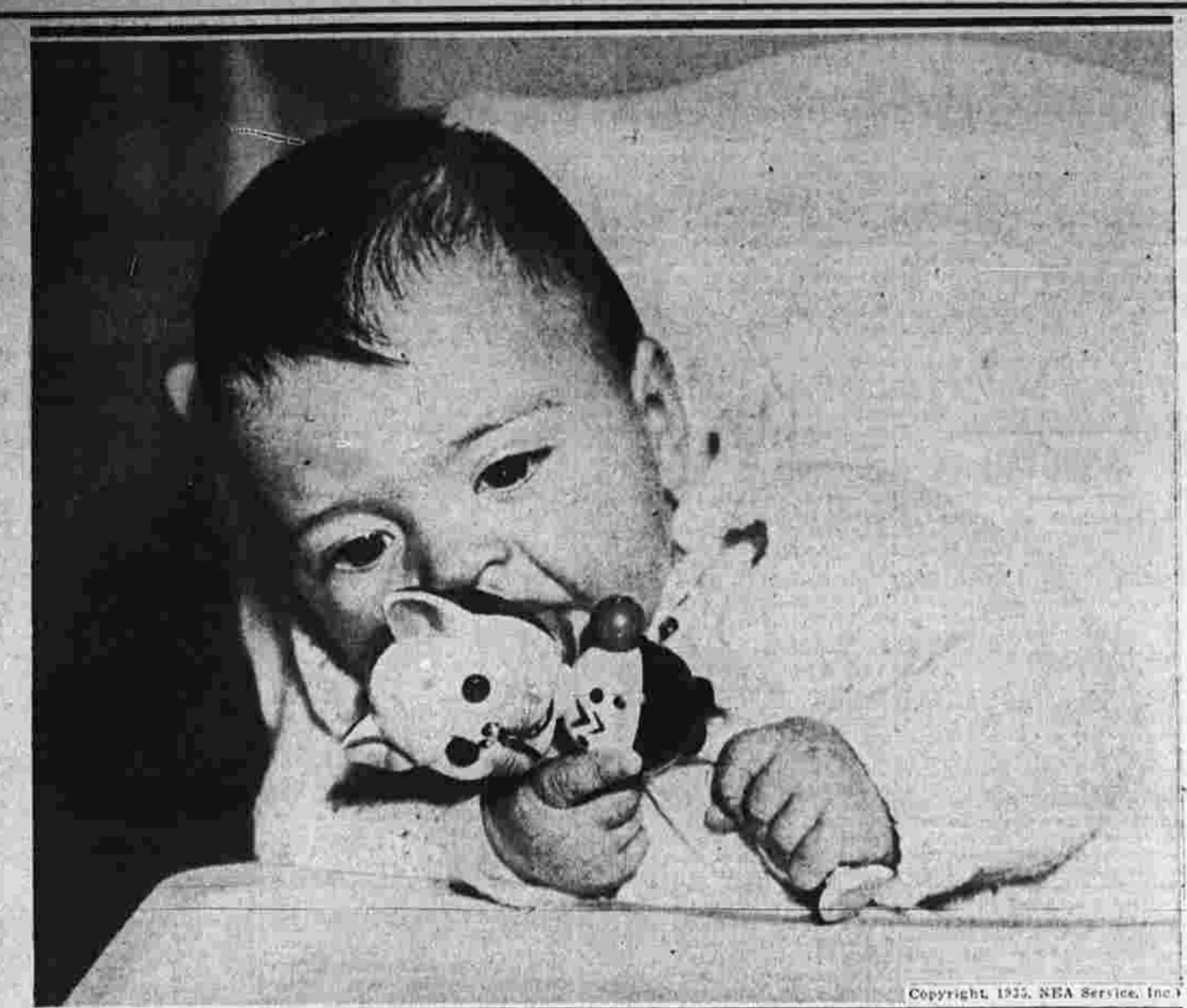

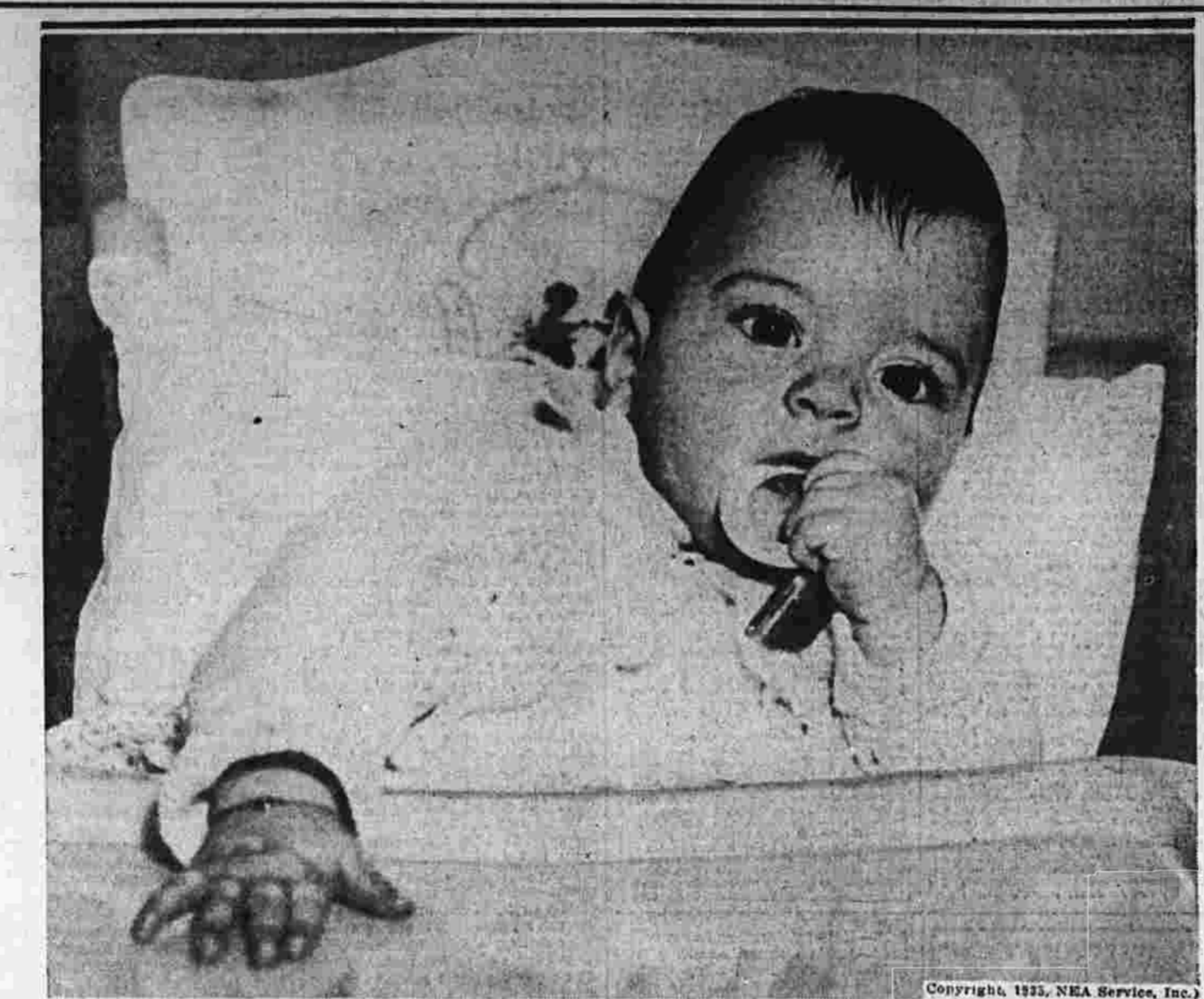

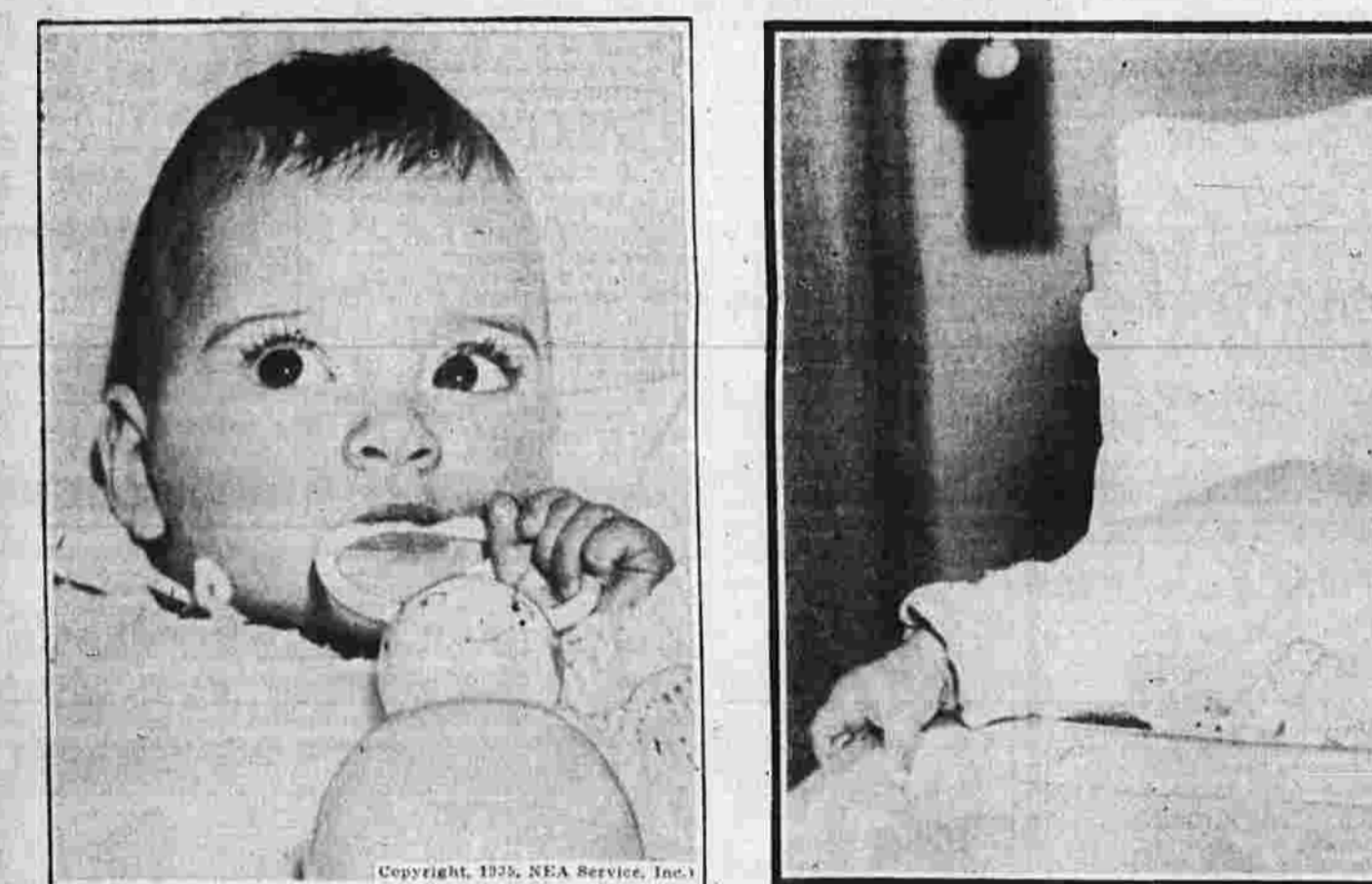

SCIENCE FAILS TO FIND ALCOHOLISM INHERITED. Example of Parents Considered Worse Influence on Children.

Many an old-time novelist and dramatist created an absorbing plot by presupposing that every family which shamelessly admitted that it included a drunkard carried with it a hereditary strain of drunkenness.

Modern scientific students of heredity have come to a different conclusion. One of these specialists says that not just in drawing conclusions concerning men from experiments that have been made on rats in relationship to the administration of alcohol.

This is particularly the case since the dosage of alcohol given to the rats surpasses any possible consumption by human beings.

In one series of experiments, mice were intoxicated with alcohol, and the experiments were repeated out through succeeding generations.

In some cases the mice became so completely intoxicated that they were eaten by the mice which were not intoxicated and with which they were supposed to mate.

Nevertheless, the fact that the habits of human beings, according to one scientist, resemble in many ways those of mice, this situation is certainly never met with among mice.

It is, of course, necessary to distinguish between hereditary influences and environmental influences. The characters studied in the experiments with mice are characters which can easily be heredity.
