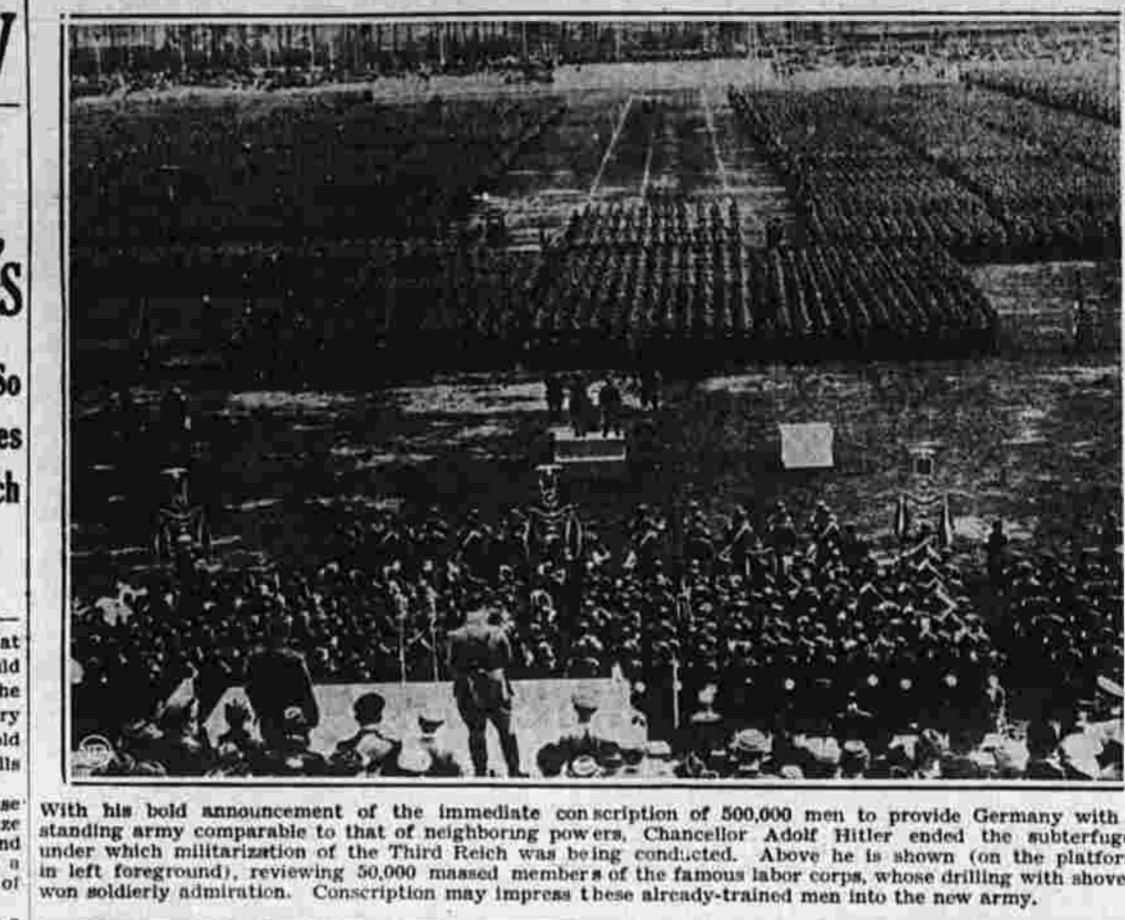

Richard B. Harrison, "The Lawd" of "The Green Pastures" to be Buried Tomorrow in Chicago.

New York, March 18.—(AP)—Accorded one of the most remarkable tributes ever paid an American actor in death. The body of Richard B. Harrison, "The Lawd" of "The Green Pastures," was taken to Chicago today for burial.

NATION-WIDE DRIVE ON CRIME KEEPS UP

Moonshiner Arrested After He Killed Police Officer—2,350 Arrested Since Friday.

Washington, March 18.—(AP)—The government today sought gangland den, hunted for moonshiners' hidden nests and swept the seas for smugglers in its announced intention of putting the "war of the revenue officer" into the hearts of criminals.

Using fast radio trucks and airplanes, Treasury agents aided by state and local police captured yesterday a mountaineer wanted for the wounding of a Federal officer and the killing of an Alexandria, Va., policeman.

The mountaineer, bearded Thomas Quisenberry, possessor of a deadly aim with a powerful rifle—was found asleep in a ditch near Leesburg, Va. after a long search through the tree-studded slopes of Catoctin mountains.

Earlier agents said he had changed more than 50 shots with pursuing officers one of which killed Clarence J. McCarry of the Alexandria police force. Word of Quisenberry's capture was flashed to Washington by a radio truck which was being used in the search. Only a short time before Secretary Morgenthau had received report that 2,350 had been arrested since the Nation wide anti-crime drive started Friday. Morgenthau said:

"The united forces of government agents are determined to meet the challenge of these crime syndicates and to stop robbery of the American people."

ONE PERSON IN TEN IN STATE ON RELIEF

ERA Supervisor Speaks at Center Church Lenten Institute Last Night

"It is not giving people enough to eat we could get them off relief," asserted Miss Helen Hart, supervisor of relief of the ERA in Connecticut, before a large gathering at the Lenten Institute of the Center Congregational church last night.

"I am not giving people enough to eat we could get them off relief," asserted Miss Helen Hart, supervisor of relief of the ERA in Connecticut, before a large gathering at the Lenten Institute of the Center Congregational church last night.

Stanger Driving Force

"Many a successful man has gone hungry," she added, pointing out that often hunger is the driving force that spur men on to improve their condition in life.

Miss Hart said that although employment in private industry is picking up the number of people going on the relief rolls continues to increase. This constitutes the great problem facing the ERA officials, she said.

There are at present about 22,000 persons on emergency relief in the United States, according to Miss Hart. Then she turned her attention to the situation in Connecticut and paid tribute to the selectmen in the 160 towns of the state as "the finest and ablest set of public officials I have ever known."

She said Bridgeport, with 4,500 families on relief, was the most seriously hit of all the cities, but that an average of one person in every ten through out the state was being aided.

Have Done Good Work

Miss Hart declared the selectmen of the different towns "in a word out a marvelous piece of social service work in handling the cases of persons who wanted work but not charity."

After explaining how the ERA functions in the matter of distributing relief funds, Miss Hart emphasized that no money is turned over to towns which do not plan their relief work systematically, which fail to spend their money carefully or which neglect to treat their charity recipients decently.

Declaring it had been found that many good CWA jobs which were not really in need, the state supervisor made it clear that under the new work relief program only those discovered after careful investigation to be destitute are given work. Of all cases on relief in Connecticut right now, 98 per cent are in towns having work relief programs.

Million a Month

Miss Hart said the ERA in Connecticut cost approximately \$1,000,000 a month from the government which is divided among about 100 cities and towns in proportion to the number on relief and to the amount spent for relief by the towns. She denied the ERA was partial to cer-

tain towns and stated that monthly allotment was "a formula that operates mathematically." One exception was made in the case of a bankrupt mill town in the eastern part of the state which was given a "special grant." Occasionally special grants are permitted for essential statewide work projects.

Toucing upon the rural rehabilitation bill sponsored by Governor Cross which was turned down in the House, Miss Hart said this bill had been misinterpreted by the press, that it merely meant persons would earn part of their sustenance from the land and part by working in factories. Defeat of the bill means Connecticut has lost \$4,000,000, she said.

Since the Presidential message of January the ERA officials have not known what will happen next, Miss Hart said.

All For Wage

One hundred per cent of the money is now going into wages and not a cent for direct relief except in unusual cases.
