BONUS “COMPROMISE”
 As the hour comes when a vote on the bonus is no longer stalled off there pops into the scene a new “compromise” plan which offers a cash payment hope for new subscribers, but it is a plan that payment of some sort can no longer be avoided. Instead of adopting the Palmer bill, which provides for payment in new money, or the Vinson bill which makes no provision for funds of any sort but merely directs that the bonus be paid, the latest scheme is to offer payment in bonds.
 These bonds, payable at face value in 1945, would presumably have a present value of a little less than \$800 in the \$1,000. It does not appear that the plan involves any obligation on the part of the government to purchase the bonds back, even at this discount. It probably would be a market for them somewhere in the banking structure—at some sort of price.
 Probably this “compromise” measure will receive considerable support—quite enthusiastic support, in fact—in quarters where there has been no dissent at all in the past. 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PROPER BREWING MAKES BEST TEA

Investment of Mere Five Minutes Difference Between Good and Best.

That great enjoyment may come from little things is well illustrated by the fact that the investment of a mere five minutes may produce perfect tea. It was pointed out by Mrs. Katharine Baldrige, Home Economics expert, who is lecturing at the state theater this week.

And yet, strange as it may seem, many modern housewives—often, even knowing better—attempt to cheat a little on the time, fooling themselves that the hurriedly made is good enough. Mrs. Baldrige deplored such a habit, saying it is a sad, weak apology for "good."

Three centuries ago Shakespeare wrote "As he brews so shall he drink." I don't know whether that immortal poet had tea in mind when he wrote this, but the lecturer continued, "But it doesn't call for poetic license to say it's perfectly applicable to the preparation of tea. For there is as much difference between improperly and properly brewed tea as there is between a perfect drink made to inspire and enjoy, and an indifferent one which is gulped down and mercifully forgotten."

After scoring those who would deny their families and friends the necessary few minutes to take care to prepare tea that is a delight and benefit, the lecturer pointed out that Mrs. Katharine Baldrige is preferable to pale, weaker tea whose leaves have not been properly sorted and fermented after picking. These black tea leaves come primarily from India and some from Ceylon and Java.

The lecturer explained that proper preparation is not so much an art as it is a necessity. If the rich, fragrant and most delicious and flavor are to be completely drawn from the right tea leaf.

She then demonstrated by brewing tea on the platform before a full audience and explained that all the facts about the choice and preparation of palatable and healthy tea were revealed at a meeting of home economists expert recently when Mrs. Baldrige, director of the India Tea Bureau in the United States, discussed the subject.

The following simple brewing formula is recommended by experts and the lecturer:

"The water must be actively and actually boiling. Merely steaming water is not enough. When the water is mad boiling 'ot the teapot should be held over the fire until so that the pot is completely heated or steamed. Then pour out water leaving exactly the quantity of water for the number of cups to be served. Use the exact quantity of tea leaves as specified on the tin. Let the tea brew for five minutes. At the end of that time, the tea leaves can be poured into another pot for serving—the idea being to separate the leaves from the tea."

The familiar question of why tea is cooling in hot weather and warming in cold was answered with extracts from a treatise by Robert Hutchison and V. H. Mottram of London. They were quoted to the effect that tea warms the body when cold by making the circulation more brisk, as the constituents of tea help to dilate the superficial blood vessels and render the skin moist. For the same reason, a cup of hot tea tends to cool the body in summer by moistening the skin and increasing evaporation from the surface. The same authority, after years of study, declares that the correct time for infusing tea is fully five minutes. Mrs. Baldrige with Director Being that such time is required to draw out all the good qualities with which Nature endowed black tea.

One of the most absurd of the fabrications which have sometimes been mentioned in connection with tea was exploded by the lecturer with a quotation from Dr. C. R. Harter, who says in his book "The Culture and Marketing of Tea," "The idea of the stomach being affected adversely by tea is one to be mentioned only to be dismissed as foolish. It is difficult to see how tannin and its products can exert any important degree of astringency or acidity at any stage. A cup of tea contains no more tannin than a four-ounce glass of claret or a two-ounce glass of an astringent red wine."

Returning to the subject of proper tea brewing, the lecturer emphasized that it takes not less than five minutes for the boiling water properly to infuse or expand the leaves to the necessary point of sending the maximum amount of tea into solution. Three minutes or even four only serve to draw out part of the tea. Underbrewed tea is not only tasteless, but means so much money wasted, she said.

MYSTERY PLANE READY FOR HOP OVER PACIFIC

Crew Wants Sanction to Fly Radio Compass Ship to Honolulu.

Oakland, Calif., March 19.—(AP)—Ready to "fly anywhere," but anxious to make the projected hop to Honolulu, the crew of the government's experimental radio compass plane put out plans for any takeoff today and marked time in an effort to gain official sanction for the 2,400-mile trans-Pacific flight.

Authorization for another test flight 700 miles to sea was received from Eugene Vidal, Commerce Department air chief in Washington, but the fliers felt that if they were to fly that far out they might just as well head for Hawaii.

The authorized test would mean a round-trip of 1,400 nautical miles, or about two-thirds of the distance to the mid-Pacific islands. They pointed out it would be just as difficult as to go all the way.

Capt. James L. Kinney of the Commerce Department staff said the takeoff for any flight would probably be delayed at least 24 hours to allow mid-ocean weather to improve still further and to await the possibility of more liberal flight authorization from Washington. He declared 3 a. m. (Pacific Standard Time) Wednesday probably would be the earliest possible takeoff time.
