make the trip in 20 minutes, cer-tainly not over 25 minutes. Those extra minutes count in the morn-ing, and they count even more if a commuter is hurrying home to an engagement in the evening. This is due, without a doubt, to the Connecticut Company's system of reporting an operator for being late on any of his runs.

In other words the policy of the company would indicate that speed and schedule are more important than patronage.


