TAX EXEMPT REAL ESTATE INCREASED

Total for 1934 is \$67,272,918—918 Than in 1929, Commissioner's Figures Show.

Connecticut real estate, publicly and privately owned, which is exempt from taxation in this state, now totals \$67,272,918, State Tax Commissioner William H. Hackett announced today. This is an increase of \$67,272,918 or 14 per cent over the 1929 total of \$58,549,974. The information covering the subject of tax exemptions will be contained in a published report to the governor which the statistics require the tax commissioner to prepare each year. The statistics are based upon the 1934 figures of the Connecticut municipalities. Commissioner Hackett's report shows that while the exempt real estate has increased, the total land value has increased, the total land value in 1934 being \$1,000,000,000, or a drop of 1.7 per cent. As a result of the exempt property now represents 18.98 per cent of the total land value, whereas four years ago the exempt total represented 15.52 per cent of the total assessments.

Never Higher.—In the twenty-four years since figures have been prepared on tax exempt property in this state, there has been no year in which the per cent of exempt real estate has been as great as that of 18.98 per cent. The tax commissioner points out, "It is significant that during one of the severest depressions which this country has ever had, the tax exempt property of the state, as valued by the assessors, should increase by \$67,272,918." He states:

The figures contained in the report represent values placed by the local assessors of the state on the exempt properties, as required by law. Of the total real estate now declared exempt, \$24,000,000 is publicly owned by federal, state and municipal governments, and \$43,272,918 is privately owned. The total value of exempt property in 1929 was \$58,549,974. It is noted that four years ago privately owned exempt property totaled \$27,298,808 and public property totaled \$31,251,166. In 1929, public-owned exempt property totaled \$30,450,359, the increase in the last twenty-five years being \$17,798,548, or 58.45 per cent. Privately owned real estate values at \$17,449,542 in 1929, the increase since that year being \$39,823,376, or 227.5 per cent.

Problem Serious.—The figures in this report," Commissioner Hackett states, "testify to the seriousness of the tax exempt problem in this state. The exemption of a twenty-four year period of the population of Connecticut has been increasing by 27.8 per cent.
