There is little ground for belief that the Federal bill for the payment of veterans' adjusted compensation certificates now and in new money, which was finally adopted by the House yesterday, will not be passed by the Senate, probably soon after the Works Relief bill is disposed of.
It has been taken for granted that President Roosevelt will veto it. That conclusion is predicated on the knowledge that Mr. Roosevelt has repeatedly declared his opposition to the cash payment of the bonus and to his now well known anxiety to any form of currency expansion. But it may be remembered that the President has, during his term of office, been known to completely abandon positions which he had proclaimed to be vital points in his economic strategy. His promise to veto a bonus bill have never been held as emphatic as the restoration of the 1926 price level of values—now being squarely back on those promises without batting an eye. What Mr. Roosevelt so bravely and confidently says he is going to do, and what he does, are sometimes very different things.

There is something strikingly admirable about the character of temperance of the American Negro. That there are individuals who are still in the primitive stage of development is true, but that is true of races which have had infinitely more time and many times the opportunity for development. By an average of 20,000 years ago, man had a chance, but the capacity for contentment and happiness on a small scale is not to be denied.
