San Francisco, March 28.—(AP) clargely based on average perform—Track coaches eager to get full credit for "developing" star athletes may not like it, but Dr. Horace Gray has the scientific analysis of nearly a thousand 100-yard dashes to back up his conclusion that "sprinters are born, not made."

Dr. Gray, of the Stanford University school of medicine, comments on his technical report that: "It appears speed is a trait that is inborn. You either can or you can't run fast. I doubt if a track coach teaches very much to a sprinter."

One of his conclusions is "the rate of speed in running of which school boys are capable has been shown to be correlated with age and, hence to be one of the phases of general growth which is susceptible to mathematical treatment like growth in size of the body as a whole and of its various organs, systems and activities."


