MUNICIPALITIES ASK STATE AID

Group Before Judiciary Committee Agrees That Cities Cannot Carry Burden

State Capitol, Hartford, April 10.—(AP)—Unanimous support was given yesterday before the judiciary committee to a bill proposing to extend state aid to municipalities burdened with relief costs.

The measure, given a public hearing before the committee together with the women jury service bill, is one of the chief items in the program drafted by the Special Tax Study Commission.

Mayor James McFadyen of Bridgeport and John W. Murphy of New Haven, were among the speakers in support of the relief bill.

Students Who Obtain High Marks Given Opportunity at Different Institutes.

Scholarship announcements from Oglethorpe University, Georgia; Tennessee College, Murfreesboro, Tennessee; and Drexel Institute, Philadelphia, have been received by the high school vocational assistance department. Oglethorpe offers "Special Honor Scholarships" to be awarded upon recommendation of the principal of the high school to any male graduate or graduates of the year 1933 who have made a general average of 90 or higher in high school courses, who are of good character and ability to merit the endorsement of the principal of the high school.
