RATE OF STREAM FLOW SUBNORMAL AT RESERVOIRS

Spring Overflow General In Surface Water But Ground Surfaces Are Low from Rain Shortage.

Although Connecticut's surface water supplies in general are at present in good condition, with reservoirs and storage basins filled and overflowing their spillways, the ground water supply and the rate of stream flow during the recent showery period are not on a par with their usual condition at this season of the year, a check-up of public water sources revealed today.

The situation is the result of a shortage in rainfall in every winter month with the exception of January and February. The deficit is considerably in excess of 1.56 inches of the normal for the winter months of the year. In heavy snowfall in that month, in December and February, the precipitation was slightly below normal. In March and April, the precipitation was 1.17 inches as compared with the normal. The excessive precipitation in January brought the total for the winter month within half an inch of the normal for the winter period. The succeeding decline in February and March, however, left the ground water supply and stream flow below average for the season. Although the recent rains have fallen intermittently for the past two weeks, precipitation in April is still lagging behind the normal.

Should the sub-normal rainfall continue through May, it would mean that the water supply would approach the ordinary dry summer months. Although the height of low levels, since, with a depleted ground water supply, stream flow would tend to a minimum and no fresh water would be fed to the reservoirs. Even in such an event, there would likely be no actual shortage in the water supply, Connecticut, however, water supply utilities have been constantly enlarging and improving their storage systems to insure sufficient water in seasons of good rainfall to meet requirements of the dry periods.

During the past ten years, the capacity of Connecticut's water storage systems has been increased 56 per cent, or from 100,000 to 156,000 gallons in 1925 to 950,000 gallons in 1935. This increase has come both from the construction of new reservoirs, standpipes, and storage tanks, and from the expansion of older facilities by such means as raising the height of dams so as to impound more water. All of this increased capacity has been developed in the past ten years by privately operated companies, which more than doubled the capacity of their storage facilities. Most notable development of the New Haven Water Company is its 15-million-gallon North Branch reservoir in Connecticut.
