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HARTFORD BAKERIES TRY TRADE-CRASHING HERE

Salesmen Pester Homewives, Report to Deviants Tricks to Supplement Local Concerns.

High pressure men have recently introduced in Manchester by salesmen for Hartford baking concerns are strongly resented by local homewives. It was learned today that these salesmen habitually knock at the doors in the morning, when the women are usually engaged in their household chores, or in the early afternoon. As soon as the door is opened the salesman enters into a rapid-fire salutation of the merits of their baking products. They refuse to take "no" for an answer, and about the only effective way to get rid of them has been found to shut the door in their faces.

A most irate woman called Thursday and Friday by salesmen for one large Hartford firm. The salesman left behind containing "hot cream" buns at the house of persons they knew were not regular customers. This might have been excused had the buns been free, but instead they were unmissably stale.

Monday the salesmen came around to collect, but first explained the buns had been left by mistake. They anticipated payment for them despite their statements that the buns were not used. The housewife was asked to sign a note informing the company she had received the buns through error.

The Hartford salesmen, however, report, attempt to disparage the products of Manchester bakeries and suggest that the local salesmen be passed up and the Hartford baking products be given a trial.
