Does Not Label Men as Criminals Says Chief Grogan Refuting Miss Little. Bridgeport, May 22 — (AP) — State FERA officials were criticized by the Connecticut Police Chiefs Asby the Connecticut Police Chiefs Association meeting last night in Stratford for their failure to allow fingerprinting of all enrolled members of Federal transient camps in the state.

"Fingerprinting does not label men as criminals," Joseph Grogan, chief of the West Hartford police department said, after referring to a statement attributed to Miss Eleanor H. Little, State Relief Administrator, that camp members abould not be "treated like criminabould not be "treated like criminals."

The matter is to be referred to the annual convention of the International Police Chiefs Association in Atlantic City in July. County Sheriffs who assume office June 1. will be invited to the group's June meeting in Norwalk to hear details of the proposed fingerprinting plan. All prisoners placed in county jails should be fingerprinted, the police chiefs declared.
