**TAXES AND INCOMES**

Perhaps the Connecticut Legislature who defeated the State Sales Tax had been doing some independent reading of the report of the Special Committee on the subject of the tax. They may have found there—not very conspicuously placed but there none the less—some of the reasons based on the 1935 federal returns and census figures.

From that table it is discovered that of the self supporting persons in this state, 64,835 are disclosed, 897,764 were enjoying a total income, in that better time than this, of \$210,728,772. This group containing considerably more than half of the breadwinners of the state, received in no case as much as a thousand dollars a year.

Also it is disclosed that another group, containing roughly one-sixth as many persons, were in receipt of incomes ranging from \$10,000 to \$20,000, to the total extent of \$132,904,061.

In other words more than half the people in the state were living on only a little more than \$1,000 a year again as the prosperous 6,516.

The Legislature may have been struck by these two sets of figures to such a degree as to give attention to the other groups of income recipients up to ten thousand dollars a year. With an eye on that it is found that 1,000,000 persons are enjoyed by people in any circumstances, and on the \$210,000,000 which had to suffice for all the needs of sixty times as many persons. It may have made him a bit unwilling to saddle the weary backs of that people in the state with a tax on their earnings, even in much better days than these, fell below a thousand dollars a year, while doing nothing effective to touch the pockets of people receiving from twenty to three hundred times as much.

So it is probable that in whole the tax paying power of the high-bracket groups has been less impaired than that of the groups in the middle and lower brackets—tremendously less than that of the less-than-a-thousand class who now, in pitiable numbers, have no income at all, or, nevertheless, would have been hit by the sales tax.

**BRONCHIAL ASTHMA**

**LIKE TROUT FISHING? WELL, HERE'S YOUR GUIDE**

Author Exhibits His Art and Tells of Tricks for Amateur's Benefit.

To the impatient disciple of Isaac Walton, champing at the bit to get out and fish, a lot of good will winter's ice and snow keep him in the house. The best thing to do is to read a good book on his favorite sport.

Getting to the bottom of the pile recently, I can across one of the most helpful publications on fishing that I have seen. It was Eugene V. Connett's "Fishing a Trout Stream".

Connett is one of the country's best trout fishermen. He has published several books on the art of catching fish. "Any Luck" being one of them. But his latest work is his best. The author goes about teaching trout fishing the way he himself has learned to catch them. He tells you how to do a thing, but Connett's volume, following the old Chinese proverb that a picture is worth a thousand words, gets over his ideas with illustrations.

The book contains 94 pictures, each illustrating a step in the art of trout fishing. It is a typical stream with letters indicating the likely spots where trout hang out. Others show where to go to get into the market place and hire the waiting lobstermen to equip them with post hole spades and rubber boots and set them to work digging twelve foot channels in the mud and sand.

Instead you put dredging machinery to work—the big floating pump, the dumpy-barge, the low-bird equipment which must be used to haul in the mud and sand.
