ORGANIZATION THE KEY TO POLITICAL SUCCESS

YOUNG G. O. P. IS TOLD

Local Club Attended by Over 250; Notables in State Government Are Guests at Masonic Temple.

Over 250 youthful Republicans of Manchester served notice on the state and municipality last night that a political New Deal based on sound judgment, liberality and all sprinkled with conservatism of the right kind was imminent in state politics at the first annual dinner-meeting of the Young Republican club in Masonic Temple.

Representative Hickey, County Executive, an old friend of Manchester people, stated that Manchester was one of the outstanding Republican towns in the state and during the recent presidential campaign he felt much at home here and always received a warm welcome.

The Young Republicans of today will be the Republican party of tomorrow," asserted Daniel J. Hickey, House Republican leader. "It is likely to encourage the youth, not only of Connecticut, but of the entire country, realizing that all that will bring us out of the present gloom and the future of the country at large is concerted action."

Representative Hickey said that meetings of Young Republicans in the state are held around the state with groups of from 200 to 400 members. 

ELLINGTON HOUSE BURNS AS WATER IS LACKING

Home of Mr. and Mrs. Ferdinand Strick Destroyed; Nearby Buildings Are Saved.

Rockville, May 28.—After a five-mile trip to the home of Mr. and Mrs. Ferdinand Strick at the corner of Mountain Street and Ben Air road in Ellington, the Ellington Fire department was forced to see the home destroyed by fire because of the lack of water. The loss was estimated at \$2,000 with the cause of the fire being undetermined.

Mrs. Strick discovered the fire when she heard an unusual crackling noise and upon going outdoors discovered the roof of the one and one-half story house. She called her husband who was at work in a nearby field and he ran about half a mile to Ellington where he telephoned for the fire department.

Upon the arrival of the firemen the entire upper story was ablaze and there was no water available nearby. The firemen simply prevented the blaze from spreading to other farm buildings, using their "booster" tank which carries several hundred gallons of water.

An Assistant Fire Chief, Charles Hamilton, directed the firemen and some of the furniture removed from the first floor. The house and most of its contents were completely destroyed. When the fire was first noticed, the roof was burning near the chimney. The property was formerly known as the Gustave Nelson property.
