



The plke perch eggs are being batched in temporary equipment set up at Candlewood Lake, Fairfield County, and Waumgumbaug Lake, Coventry. The fry will be planted only in Alexander Lake, Windham County; Waumgumbaug Lake, Coventry; Zoar Lake, New Haven County, and Candlewood Lake, Fairfield County.

The yellow perch have been secured from eggs rescued along the shores of the Connecticut and Thames River. Each spring great quantities of the egg masses are left exposed by receding flood waters. The eggs are literally picked from the bushes and kept in suspended baskets until just before hatching when they are liberated. The black bass are being collected in the fry stage from spawning beds at Wangum Lake reservoir, Norfolk, where angling is not permitted. This project is made possible through the cooperation of the Norfolk Water Board and the U. S. Bureau of Fisberies. E. P. Thompson, foreman of the Federal Hatchery at Hartsville, Massachusetts, is in charge of the work.
