AUTHORIZED NUISANCE

So complete was the Connecticut Senate's failure to attack the problem on the basis of a major social problem, and so unqualifiedly the bill it adopted a mere paltering with various modifications in the hoof of various warring interests, that one may appear to be lacking in sense of proportion to criticize details of that extraordinary legislative measure. Still, even if one had already abandoned hope that the General Assembly would undertake a solution of the problem on any basis other than the lowest level, there might have been left some expectation that the new law would present the average citizen from having the nuisance and verting of thousands of gunnill pierce the walls of his home and drive him into hysterical or nervous prostration. So far as the Senate was concerned, however, any such expectation involved far too great a degree of intelligence and decency to be looked for.

According to the measure approved by that body, while the dulcet whispering of muted violins, played on the premises, would constitute a violation of the law, the howling and banging and orn infernal of the worst calliothumpans ever produced in a hill-billy radio station can be hurled into the air at the top volume of the most blatant loud speaker, to shatter the peace of a square half-mile, all in conformity with and under the protection of the law.

Unless some legislator shall promptly interfere, he is afraid that this so-called "music" provision of the Senate bill will develop into a widespread and unseemly nuisance. Unquestionably, under some system of control that aimed to convert the liquor traffic into a rational public service, good music, so regulated as to be confined to the premises, might very well be regarded as a not undesirable accompaniment to the sane consumption of alcoholic beverages. But to have the legislator in the manner that the cinema sidewalk uses the steam caliope, to attract attention to the protection through the sheer volume of their noise, is to needlessly and callously thrust upon the people of this state a health destroying pastime.

The member of the Assembly with the courage and the perspicacity to either get this radio permission cut out of the bill altogether, or the law so amended as to limit the volume of the noise turned loose, will be doing a greater public service than perhaps any other member of the entire General Assembly has performed during this whole session.

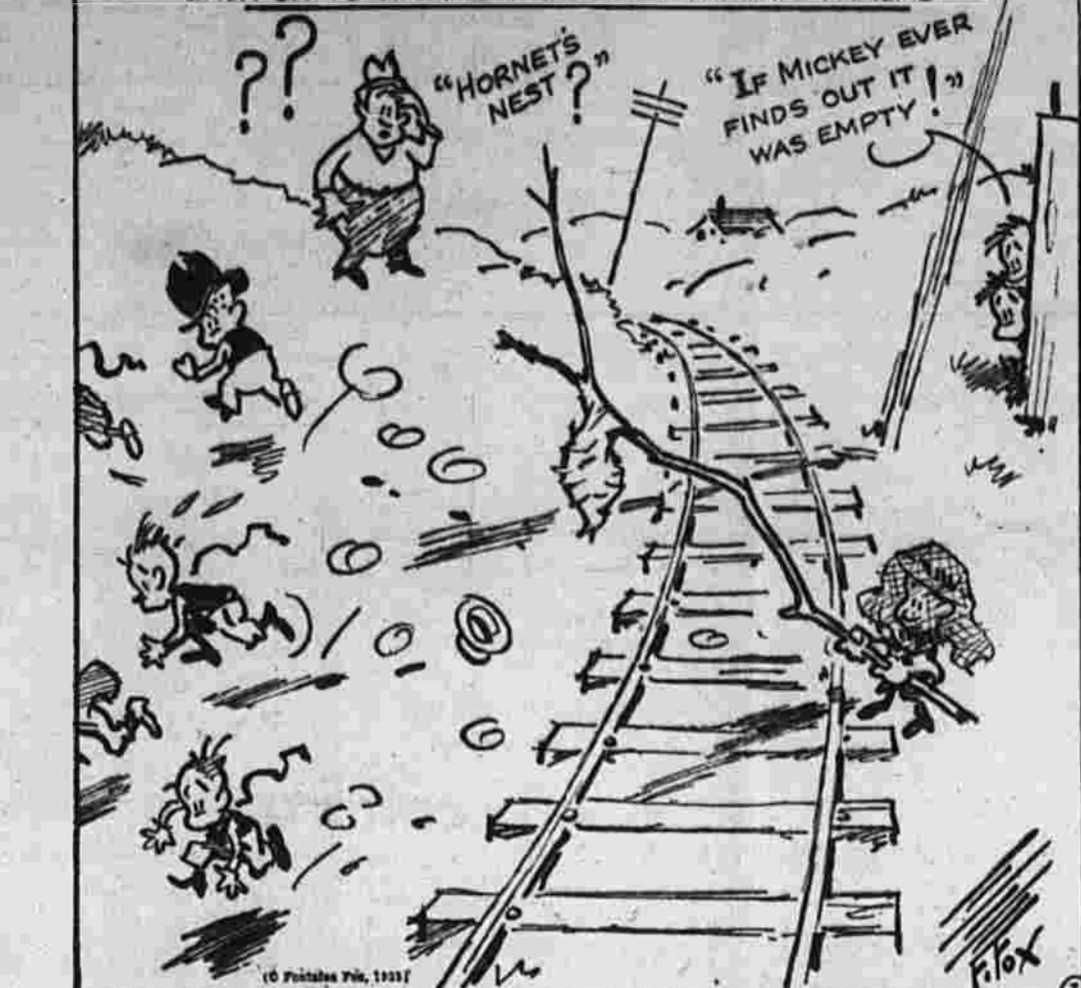
