FRIEND OF GANGSTERS GETS STIFF SENTENCE

Two Years and \$10,000 Fine for Chicago Lawyer - Helped Dillinger.

Chicago, June 27.—(AP)—The severest penalty possible under a new law—a sentence of two years in prison and a fine of \$10,000—was imposed today upon Attorney Louis B. Figgitt, convicted Tuesday of harboring the late Homer Van Meter, Dillinger gang leader.

Figgitt's punishment was fixed by Federal Judge Philip L. Sullivan after he overruled the motion of defense attorneys for a new trial. Figgitt, once a city prosecutor, under former Mayor William Hale (Big Bill) Thompson, was charged by the federal government with arranging a "hit" for the Van Meter and Van Meter's chief, the late John Dillinger, in the summer of 1934.

CHENEY OVERHEARD
One of the most revealing points in Ward Cheney's talk to the Kiwanis club on Monday was his assertion that Cheney Brothers have reduced their overhead costs 80 per cent in the past three years. Cheney only was an amazing statement, but the fact that such a great decrease in overhead has been accomplished in most recent years is the result of the recent conference between the firm's executives and employees representatives.

The so-called "white collar" class of employees at Cheney Brothers has long been a bone of contention among the workers on straight production. Installation of the "system," the task and bonus method, wages computation, two decades ago, necessitated a greatly increased overhead. Cheney's "white collar" employees did not gain the good grades of the employees who were producing Cheney goods. As the task and bonus system was made to encompass more and more of the plant activities the clerical class continued to be in bed upon the production workers.

As a result of this, the clerical staff grew between the "efficiency" group and the body of production men in the number of the man at the loom and the woman at the winding frame. The idea that the man of clerical help was just a "hand" on the shoulders. They felt that for Cheney Brothers a good piece of it paid the cost of the "system." The demand for textile union officials that Cheney Brothers cut their overhead below reducing the wages of the producing class is a consequence of that feeling toward the clerical class.

In view of this situation it is important to know that the firm has its overhead costs 80 per cent in the past three years. That tremendous reduction could not possibly have been done without many sacrifices. As Ward Cheney expressed it, the "white collar" process was painful. A glance also at Manchester shows that many formerly employed in the non-production class at Cheney Brothers are either walking the streets or are not now residents of this town. It is a tragic experience for a man to reach advanced years and then find employment, no matter what type of employee he has been. Loss of regular weekly income marks a crisis in one's life and a great many here in Manchester have suffered that experience.

As great as have been the wounds for these employees who have lost their jobs quite comparable have been the hurts the members of the Cheney family have felt in executing their needs. The firm's executive who had to undergo many pangs of torment and mental anguish. It would have been immensurable upon other men. The firm has been fortunate in having an executive head—a man of brain and vigor, who can guide the fate of his company without suffering too great from the emotional stress such a crisis entails.
