New York, July 12—Wool goods markets were quiet but steady last week, says the New York Wool Top Exchange Service. It is general opinion in the industry that machinery operations and wool consumption will be maintained at or near current levels for the next four to five months at least. Expectations of continued good business are based, according to the aunimary, on prospective large government contracts for overcoatings and blankets for the Army.

The sagging tendency in retail prices evident since the May, 1934, sigh, continued during June, according to the Fairchild Publications retail price index. Prices on July 1 at 85.9 (January, 1831—100) are the lowest since Sept. 1, 1933. 



The number of miles served by motor coaches has thus increased from 494 a year ago this time to 557 at the present time. In the same period, the mileage served by aftered cars has decreased from 291 to 274 miles. The general increase in the total mileage operated, which took place during the year, amounts to 5.8 per cent.

Growth in the number of miles of road upon which buses are now used has necessitated the addition during the twelve-month period of 36 new motor coaches, a gain of 12 per cent, which brings the total number of buises now owned by the

36 new motor coaches, a gain of 1 per cent, which brings the total number of buses now owned by the company to 332. The company has added 80 new motor coaches to its rolling equipment in the past tweether the company to any the motor of buses and the milesge over which the operate has gained greatly, the street car still furnishes most of the service and carries the bulk of the passengers, although the number of the latter has suffered drastically on both types of vehicle. Of the total number of fares collected by the company today, 62.1 per center paid on street cars. A year ago, however, the trolleys' portion of the fares was 64.7 per cent and two years ago 75 per cent. Thus more than a third of the fares comfrom bus passengers today.

A similar trend is found in the percentage of vehicle miles operated by each type of vehicle. The street cars operate more than half of the vehicle miles traveled, exactly 53.4 percent. A year ago the trolley mileage was 59.5 per cent of the total, while two years ago it was 64 per cent.
