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ANDERSON-SHEA VETS SWEEP PARADE HONORS

Manchester Post of Veterans of Foreign Wars Takes Three Firsts in New London Saturday—Fifth Year Local Group Has Taken First Place.

Anderson-Shea Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars won the silver cup Saturday at the Department Convention of the V. F. W. for having the best appearing unit in the convention parade. It was the fifth consecutive time that the local post has won this distinction in annual State conventions.

In addition to the prize for the best appearing unit in the parade, the post won the prize, a silver cup, for having the largest number of veterans in the post's marching unit. The Manchester Post Band was also awarded the prize for the best band in the parade, which was one of the best ever held in New England.

The local delegation was dressed in uniform style. The outfit was white trousers and white shirts, red sashes, blue sailor ties, black shoes and red and white novelty hats. The Manchester Post Band with its red and black uniforms, marching with the marchers white and red were cheered all along the route of march, which was on Broadway and State streets. 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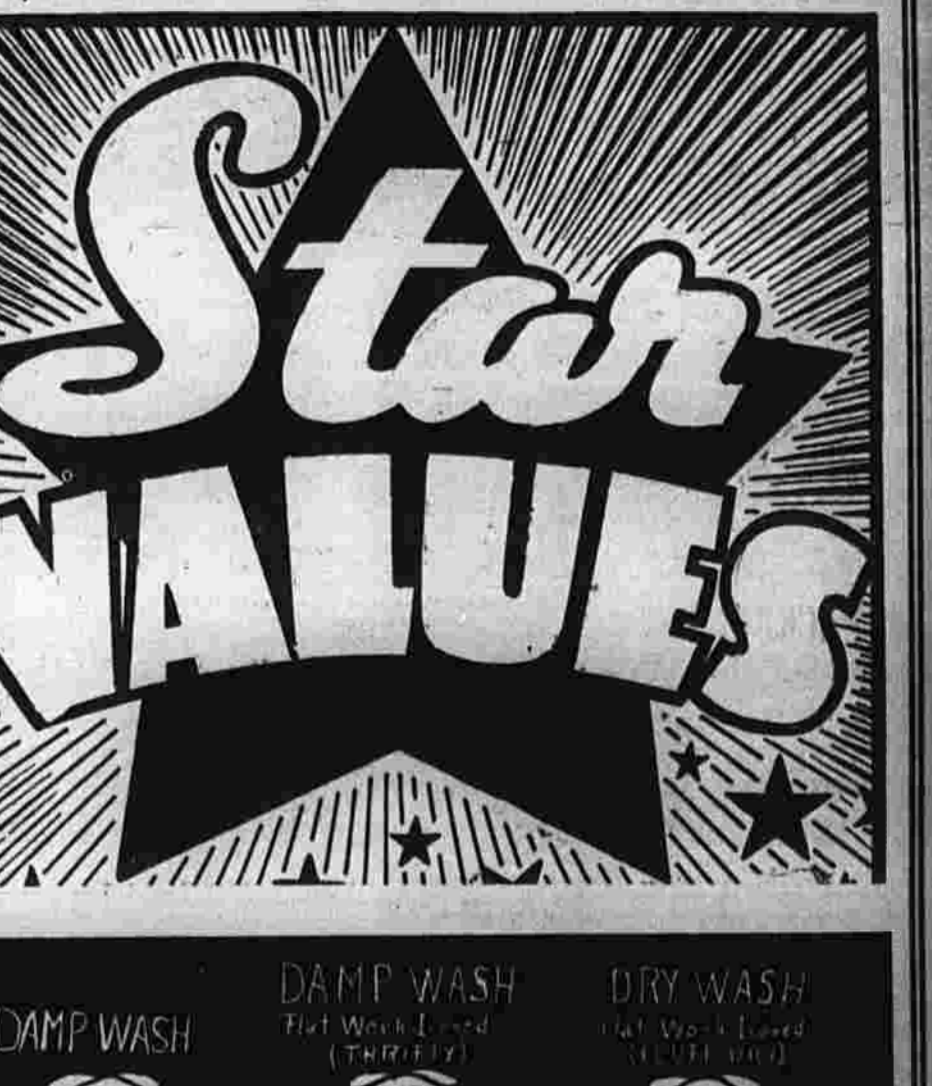

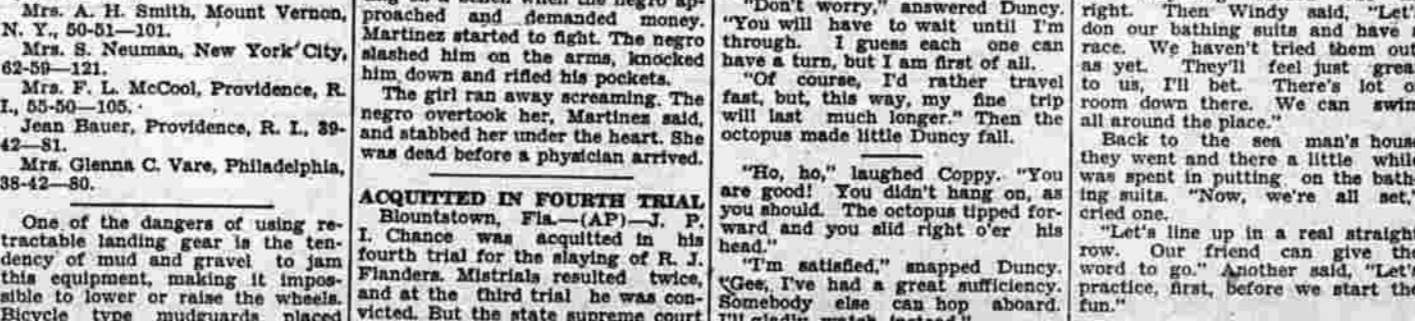
