

pool projects, modern substitutes for "the old swimming hole," have been started, but communities un-dertaking such projects should make certain that their location is such that they can be kept free from dangerous sewage pollution, have a good circulation in dry weather in proportion of the number of bathers, and not be near sources of con-tamination, the State Department of Health advised in its weekly bulle-

Sanitary Engineering of the de-partment has had supervision of swimming pools in Connecticut and in its experience has discovered that the location of pools in many cases has been based on snap judgments which led to dangerous conditions. One common error was that of basing a swimming pool location on one or two laboratory examinations of the water, whereas analyses over a long period of time and under dif-ferent rainfalt conditions are necessary before the water can definite ly be proved safe. . . . For small bathing pools on inland stream should be free from nearb human sewage poliution and a suffi-cient flow of water should be avail-






