



The normal blood pressure of an adult should range between 120 and 130. This is the systolic pressure which means the pressure exerted at the peak of the pulse wave. This instrument contains three hundred millimeters of mercury and when it is properly attached to the upper arm, the blood pressure can be determined by measuring how many millimeters of mercury can be forced up in the column, by the pressure of the brachial artery. 
