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Living Five Years In Twelve Months

How Dr. Dafoe and Nurses Won Grim Battle for Babies' Lives in Third Month.

Soldiers were there more dramatic, fearful hours in the young lives of the tiny babies than in those of the mothers in those days when, just past the age of three months, the babies again were brought face to face with the menace of death. Striving events that transpired "behind the scenes" are described below by Louise de Kiriline, the babies' head nurse, in the third of six articles which she has written for this newspaper and NEA Service.

When the quintuplets were a little past three months old and the world believed them long since safely over the danger line, they were actually, all five, still in the hospital. I might even put it stronger and say with truth that they were dying. The nurses were on duty all day long that we had so painstakingly endeavored to make into what it ought to be. Our hope was to start them on the road to the north Northampton winter in that draughty, dark, crowded little nursery with five healthy babies seemed impossible. It was one evening, the beginning of September that Baby Young developed a temperature. The next day Cecilia had one. Then came Emeline and in quick succession, Marie and Annette. The doctor looked serious and prepared for a siege. It was intestinal toxemia from an infection transmitted through the lack of a strict order to boil all the babies' washings.

Two Nurses on Duty at Night That whole time was a nightmare. The nurses were on duty all day long every anxious night for weeks. One was kept busy in the daytime. There were such calls for the doctor at all hours. Temperatures would rise and the babies would be in convulsions. Only quick work again and again with the facilities we had at hand would ward off the end. The senior Dionnes paced the floor, outside the nursery and banged with us with anxious questions. We pitied them but could give little reassurance. It had been such a long time since we had seen the babies and they were not in much better shape. Artificial Light Is Best As a Cure for Rickets

Cambridge, Mass., July 17.—(AP)—The first complete measurement of what it is in rickets that is good for children's bones was reported here today and it brought splashing gleefully in their bath-tubs, cooing, smiling or crying as the mood prompted them. The report was made to the conference on spectroscopy at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and John W. Bunker and Lewis Harris of the department of technology and public health of Massachusetts Tech.

They have measured precisely and completely, the kind of light which prevents and cures rickets in children—on feeding of the bones. The fact is the Vitamin D, whether in food, oil, or from sunshine, cures this malady. It still fails to fully spread in the United States. The sunshine cure is ultra-violet sun tan, light whether from the sun or from artificial light. With

the most precise instruments of Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Dr. Bunker and Dr. Harris have been measuring over several years' experience, the exact wave-lengths of ultra-violet light that cure and the amount of energy in each light wave. The result—the light waves range from 2600 to 3025. These measurements are in Angstrom units, or 250 millionths of an inch. They are made on rats, in which the rickets were induced by a Vitamin "D" deficient diet and cured in ten days exposure to ultra-violet light.

The strange fact is that nearly all the curative light in artificial, it does not come from sunshine. "It happens," says the report, "a biological anomaly which makes of strictly normal habit subjects to rickets, can be cured of this disease by light and especially by light of wave lengths which in nature never reach the earth."

For Dr. Dafoe to move those babies just when he did was the bravest thing I ever knew a doctor to do. "Can you move tomorrow if I can get the furnace in the other house going?" he asked one morning. Those babies had to have their chance. A dim one, maybe, but it was their only hope.



REJECT COLLECTING AGENCY FOR TAXES

Selectmen Frown On Plan Presented by George H. Williams as Impractical.

Personal Collection Agency of George H. Williams to collect back taxes for a 20 cent commission, the Board of Selectmen last night authorized Town Treasurer George H. Waddell to discuss thoroughly with Town Council William S. Hyde the delinquent tax problem with the bank for the purpose and because they believed a cheaper way of increasing collections.

That taxes must be collected better was impressed on the board of Town Treasurer George H. Waddell, who, while explaining he has already borrowed \$200,000 in anticipation of the amount of taxes which the recent indices will be collected this month.

No definite plan for collecting back taxes, which with this year's delinquent list totals more than a million dollars, was proposed by the selectmen. Chairman Aaron Cook expressed regret that at least \$50,000 could be brought in "as easy as falling off a log."

The acceptance of personal collection and keeping forever after tax delinquents was stressed by the board members as the best method of collecting taxes from reluctant payers, the same system as would be employed by the collection agency.

By the agency, the selectmen feared, would "take the gravy" of the accounts easiest to obtain and leave the deadwood to the town.

STATE SUPREME COURT HANDS DOWN RULINGS

Ten Decisions Announced But Error Found in Only One of the Cases.

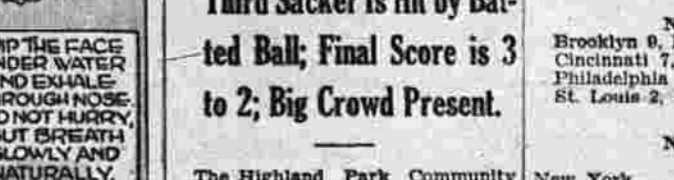
