



Addis Ababa, July 25.—(AP) — Life is held chesply. Owing to Amid the hunger and poverty which are often their lot, most of the 10,00,000 inhabitants of Ethiopia are a gay and vivacious people.

The average agricultural laborer in Ethiopia receives eight cents a day, out of which he must buy his food, clothing and other needs. In the small towns, the natives live like Gypsies in shacks and shanties.

The Ethiopians, nevertheless, are a lively folk. They love to eat, and to drink — when they can afford it — the native wine called tej, made of honey, fruit or corn.
