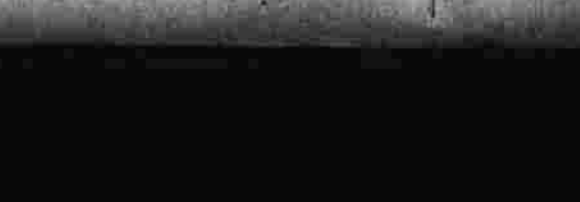

HOMESTEAD PLAN AIDS FARMERS OF ARKANSAS

Gives New Hope to Depression-Beaten Mountaineers—Symbol of New America in Making.

The reaction to a great social experiment in these persons most directly affected by it is described below by Foster Hunt after a visit to the Dyess Colony in Arkansas. This is the ninth of twelve articles which Hunt, who traveled from coast to coast to sound out popular sentiment on public questions, has written for The Herald.

A little over a year ago it was an abandoned tract of swamp marshland and cut-over cypress forests. Today it is a thriving colony of 200 bright, modern little houses with some 1,500 acres cleared and in crops. It is a masterpiece of what imagination and work, coupled with government backing, can really do.

This Dyess Colony lies only a few miles from the heart of the cotton-croppers war in northeastern Arkansas. But it is separated as far in distance and time and thought as the Redwilde Homesteads in West Virginia are separated from the mining belt in Scott's Run.

I sat in the living room of House No. 211 and chatted for an hour and more with Bennett Price and his wife and mother-in-law. This was a neat five-room house, wired for electric lights with bathroom and modern conveniences. With the house went 30 acres of land.

We only had here two months but we were sure that Bennett Price had found his real price. He had done so long ago. He had done so long ago that he was turning in Lawrence County, Poor crops and low prices had really put him on the relief rolls.

"Looks like you make out here fine," he went on. "The house'll cost us \$1,150, and by the time we get the farm equipped and everything going we'll owe the government around \$2,000. That means we have to pay anything for three or four years, and then we get 200 acres to settle up. We can't get it easy. We'll grow everything we eat right here. We should have ten acres of cotton and all sorts of chickens and some hogs. We've already got a community canteen factory where we can put up all our own vegetables, and sell some to the neighbors. And we're going to have a community shop to make money for our furniture and things like that. We'll get our living and around \$100 or more from our cash crops. We'll pay the government around \$150 a week most of the rest we'll pay in cash."

The black-eyed, capable young woman leaned forward and looked over the conversation. "You can't say I'm imaginative, but all this means to us," she said. "We got seven children and Maw there, and we was right down to bob roots. 'Course there'll be a lot of hard work on Bennett to clear the land and get his crop in, but we'll all help. We got a house and we'll have a fine school, and there's already a hospital with 30 beds in it. And we got our own Home Demonstration Club, Mrs. Balyer, who the head of it, is a wonderful woman. And we got a Farm Agent, who's a fine man, too, and we got a club for the boys and girls. It's just about like heaven to folks like us who was down and out."

Then Grassy broke in. "I kin tell you we jes' love this Mr. Roosevelt," she exclaimed. "He's the only President we ever had who was really for the poor folks. We jes' love him."

Members of 1933. I visited a half dozen other homes and heard the same tale of high hope and promise. No plowmen of old days embarked on a search for the Golden Fleece of the good life and freedom with more earnest enthusiasm than these broken homesteaders of the Dyess Colony. Each day brings new families to the settlement in 1935 covered wagons. In these government trucks they are bailed in from every corner of the state. Most of them are so poor that they have nothing but a little household furniture and possibly a single cow and a few chickens. They have been carefully chosen by caseworkers in the different county relief agencies. They are all innocent victims of a system over which they had no control.

Howard Eichenbaum, who has served as architect for all the community buildings and homes and been in on the development since its inception, showed me about the 20,000-acre project. It was started in March, 1934. He explained when W. R. Dyess, States Relief Administrator, and successful business man and planter, in his own right, saw the idea of a great experimental project of rural homesteads for rural southern workers as Harry L. Hopkins' first big step toward getting out-of-town land purchased at around \$2.50 an acre; five portable sawmills were installed and road machinery brought in. Actual work on homes building was started on Friday, July 13th, of last year.

To date there are 250 homes completed, out of a total of 700 that are planned. Fifteen miles of gravelled roads have been built and miles of right-of-way cleared, 40 miles of road-grading ditches finished. The three-room houses have averaged \$800; the four-room houses \$1,075, and the five-room houses \$1,315; the average \$100. All the houses are equipped with bathtub, toilet and

POWER CAPACITY NEEDS OF STATE

Although the Federal Trade Commission has pronounced that the capacity of existing electric plants is not sufficient to meet the country's requirements for power when industrial returns to peak output, this situation is definitely not the case in Connecticut. It is shown by statistics compiled from the annual report of power plant capacity and electrical production issued by the United States Geological Survey, Connecticut's public utilities have built plants, the capacity of which far exceeds any demands that might be made on them, even comparing this capacity with the peak demands of 1929.

According to the current report of the Geological Survey, the rated capacity of Connecticut power plants, including all types, is 396,710 kilowatts. This means that at 100 percent capacity the state's power plants would be able to produce 2,817,780,000 kilowatt hours of electricity annually. The actual requirements for power in Connecticut for the year 1929 were 1,283,891,000 kilowatt hours. The output of Connecticut power plants in 1929 was 2,817,780,000 kilowatt hours, or 1,534,000,000 kilowatt hours in excess of the requirements for power.
