## ALOISI, LAVAL, EDEN IN SECRET SESSION

Conference May Result In EXPECT RACES Black Empire; Haile Selassie Moves Troops.

Paris, Aug. 16. — (AP) — A British spokesman said tonight that Premier Mussolini's unwillingness to specify his demands on Ethiopia was delaying the negotiations of the Anglo-French-Italian conference on Ethiopia's fate.

The three negotiators resumed their secret talk, their accompanying experts remaining outside in case they were needed.


After three hours of negotiations. Baroa Aloisi and his experts left the office and Laval and Eden talked three-quarters of an hour more.


